But we are glad to know that nearly all the ointa have enjoyed precious revivals and large ingatherings. The destutions are still great, both in the country, villages and towns. If the eans were at hand all these destitute places in a short time could be made to blossom as the rose. Now brethren, let us give it our hearty co-operation.

Twenty of them have been adopted in good homes. There are about thirty now at the home. These are tenderly cared for by the matron and the charitable ones who have made donations for them. Those of school age are at and all have religious training. Contributions are needed for the rt of the home and for the purchase money fund. We recommend
