"Try me," sayeth God, "and see if I will not pour you out a blessing." With these gracious facts and promises before her there is need of the many homes without the Bible and with every means to facilitate her spiritual prosperity. Her Secretary reports \$2,000 behind on State Missions. One denomination of work paid by one over-draw on another part of the work, while the whole amount asked by the Board is but meague and a mere nothing for the Baptists of Tennessee. One hundred thousand (100,000) Baptists in Tennessee pay about \$9,000 for State Missions. There is about twenty (20) Colporters now at work organizing Sunday schools, prayer meetings, and distributing by sale and gifts Bibles and interature, trying to supply 100,000 perishing souls with the truths of the Gospel of the Son of God. The Wiseman Association contributes usually about \$55,00 of this amount, while her membership is over 1,500. Brethren this is deplorable. Let us bestir ourselves and make Wiseman Association one of the first on those lines, thereby helping our State to move forward, that she may be won for Christ.
