We, your committee, rejoice that ignorance is no longer a universal stigma upon, nor the beasted pride of Baptists, but that as a matter of fact, the Baptist denomination has schools, colleges and universalities for both male and female education second to none in the world for general, specific and universal education, while our theological seminaries offer the best facilities to our ministers for training along that line.

It is with a feeling of humble pride that we can say to the world that the Baptists have more money invested in educational institutions than any Protestant denomination in this government. We would also suggest that our brethren would be more diligent in sending their sons and daughters to our own schools for we do not believe there is anywhere a better place to be educated than in our own schools.

While we are proud or all our schools, we only mention the Southwestern University of Jackson, Garson and Newman College of Jesterson Gity, Brownsville Female College, and Bethel College, at Russellville, Ky.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND COLPORTAGE.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools and Colportage Work submit the following report: We are sorry so few churches report Sabbath schools. It seems to us too important a work to be neglected, as it seems to be from the reading of the letters from the various churches. We would recommend that the measurement home and try to work up a live Sunday school in each church in our bounds so each church may report a good Sabbath school at the next Association.

As to a colporter, we believe that there is a great work that could be accomplished by a wide-awake colporter in our bounds. We would say that the Executive Board tried the past year to arouse the churches to the importance of patting a colporter in the field, but received little encouragement from the churches. They wrote A. J. Holt, of Nashville, on the subject and he proposed if the board would do a little he would turnish the literature and do the rest; but we could not get any means to do our part. We would recommend that the messengers of this Association, when they return home, will work up an interest in this cause.

REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS.

We, your committee on District Missions, submit the following report; The hoard has done but little work the past year. We have done what work that has been done at Sweet Home; while this is a district field, there are other places that have been asking the board for help, and while we feel that they needed help, yet the board was unable to render them any assistance for the want of means. The hoard had on hand from the last Association \$7.55, and received from the churches this year \$15.63: Total, \$23.18, for services rendered by J. J. Dyer at Sweet Home we paid \$8.00; for services by C. B. Massey, \$5.00; for postage, 67c; total, \$13,67. Balance on hand, \$9.49.

Your board hopes that during the next associational year the churches will take more interest in the district work so as to help our weak places to become stronger.

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REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We, your committee submit the tollowing report: There is an adage, "Charity should begin at home," and while we would not say anything to detract from foreign or home missions, we feel that our own beautiful state, of which every Tennesseean should be proud, has been sadly neglected in the amount contributed to state missions.

This Association in 1899, with a membership of 1,600, only paid \$27.04, and in 1900 only paid \$35.00 for state missions. We urge upon the brethren to let thier donations be more freely for state missions so that the state can be taken for Christ by the Baptists of Tennessee. We notice from the papers that the Mormons are getting a follow-lowing in this state, and we ask that the brethren discountenance them in every instance, thereby stopping their purpose in the state as much as possible.

We, your committee on foreign missions submit the following report: we regret to have published in our minutes and send out to the world our report that we have given only \$29.42 this year to foreign missions and only \$109.82 to all mission departments, an average of less than one cent per member per year. We do hope and pray that our churches may be aroused from their lethargy and that we may greatly increase our contributions to foreign missions the next associational year.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We, your committee on home missions, which includes the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention and Guba, report there was in 1900, Missionaries employed, 671; Churches and stations, 2168; Baptisms, 5698, Total additions, 11951; New churches established, 195; Sunday schools organized, 639; Teachers and pupils, 24675; Bibles and Testaments distributed, 18412; Tracts distributed, 1534740; cash received, \$79366.68. Tennessee has received in cash from the home board, \$2500.00.

From the foregoing we see there is a great work being accomplished by a great people with whom we as an Association by resolution years ago, agreed to co-operate. Upon examination of the reports from the letters from the churches, composing this body, we find, however, that only 7 churches out of a total of 23, gave anything to this cause, and the total from the 7 churches was the exceedingly small sum of about \$25, an average for the whole body of 1½ cent per member. Indeed for all the mission interests, we contributed for 1901, the sum of 7½ cents per member.

Brethren, what shall we do to arouse our people to a sense of duty with reference to this all important work? We need something practical, a move that will result in causing us to do instead of to say and do not.

We recommend that our fifth Sunday meeting be continued and that our ministry be usged to organize in connection therewith a ministers conference, and that our day at these meetings be devoted by the ministry, together with the members present, looking first to an awakening of our teachers to the vast importance of these interests. This accomplished, we believe it will be only a question of time when the churches will begin to respond in a way never witnessed before.

REPORT ON ORPHANS' HOME.

No one will question the absolute duty of all human beings who are able, to help the helpless. James tells us that in this consists pure and undefiled religion. But this should not be limited to religious people. The ordinary instincts of human nature prompt us to help the helpless. In seeking to comply with this noble instinct, there have been established by all benevolent governments, asylums for the blind, deaf, dumb, instance, and the putpers. But the state makes no especial provisions for orphan children, so Christian and benevolent organizations are building orphans' homes. Baptists have always lead in this noble work of charity, as the largest and most successful orphans' homes in the world have been founded and managed by Buptists.

There are fourteen orphanages in Tennessee, the most commodious of which is the Tennessee Baptist Orphans' Home. Value of the house and furnishings, \$25,000; capacity of the house when full 200. Orphans' Home family at present, 25. This home is entirely unsectarian in the bestowment of its charity, as it receives any white orphan

child 12 years old or under which is sound in mind and members, legally committed to its care. The children thus committed are fed, clothed, sent to school and trained in habits of industry and taught in principles of honesty, obedience and Godliness. It costs about \$50 a year to feed, clothe and school each child.

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

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Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated and dead since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VII. These Associations—shall never interfere with the independence of any church or claim any ecclesiastical powers or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the unity of the faith of the gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock 4, M. after the third Sabbath in September and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It will be expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association who shall petition by letter and delegate or delegates, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the delegate or delegates present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly in practices.

Article XIII. The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethren present to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their lights, but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XIX. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular annual meeting by a two thirds majority vote of the members present.

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 2. The stouctator and Gerk shan be chosen by the members present.

 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall use and address the moderator by the title of Brother Moderator, and while speaking shall confine himself strictly to the subject in question, and shall not be interrupted unless hedgress from the subject, and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker so as to make remarks on his slips, taltures or imperfections, but shall fully give his views of the case without sophistry or criticism.
 - 4. No member of this Association shall absent blinself without leave of the moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak on any subject more than 3 times without leave of the body.
- 6. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the immediate consideration of the body unless withdrawn by the person making it.

 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper during the session of
- - 8. No member shall address another by any appellation than brother.
- 9. On each day of the session it shall be the duty of the clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and can the roll of members.
- 10. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, should the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating the Rules of Decorum, or at any other time manifesting a spirit contrary to the mildness of the gospel, shall be reproved, silenced or such other course taken to warn him as the moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the behavior of another member.

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
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
