- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall while speaking confine himself to the subject under consideration, and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject, and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall airly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.

  5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body.
- d. Every motion and second shall come under immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.

  7. No member shall whisper, laugh, or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.

  8. No member shall address another by any other, appellation than that of Brother.

- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any sociation be equally divided:
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved, or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

## Report on Religious Literature.

ing report:
Too high an estimate can not be placed on good literature and we should be careful in selecting the same as the soundness of our faith depends greatly on what we read. Your committee recommend the Bible first, and the Baptist Flag. Haptist and Reflector, and Western Recorder; we also recommend the Foreign Missions Journal and the free literature furnished by each one of the boards.

On motion Brother C B Massey was elected to preach in the grove on account of lack of room in the building to accommodate the congregation.

#### Report on Prohibition.

.The word prohibition in this report has reference to the abolition of the demon whisky traffic now legalized and protected by the laws of our State. As the years come and go the temperance wave grows and spreads and by the help of christian men who vote as they pray this foul business will find itself without

atatutory protection in sunny Tennessee. The last fifteen months furious and hotly contested battles have been fought within the borders of our State. In these battles prohibition gained signal victories in Bristol, Knoxville, Winchester, Clarksville, Jackson, and other towns, driving out saloons. Since the passage of the original four-mile law (the best and most effective temperance legislation in the history of the State) its provisions have been enlarged until the saloon has been driven out of ninety-two of the ninety-six counties of Tennessee, leaving only four counties where the traffic is legalized. Nashville, Memphis, Chattanooga and LaFollette are the only cities now allowed to sell whisky in Tennesses and it is only a question of a few months when state wide prohibition will sweep the State from one end to the other and this vile despoiler of men's character, woman's most relentless foe, this I cherous cancer of iniquity, fattening at the expense of purity and righteousness, will be driven from Tennessee forever. God speed the day when our Senate and Legislature will extend the four-mile law to the whole State and crush to death and hell every saloon in it. We are cheered in our fight for state-wide prohibition by the signal victories in which every saloon in the States of North Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Oklahoma have been ordered to take up their beds and walk. Let Tennessee be the next. The whisky power is marshaing its forces as never before in our State. The final struggle is on. With good sober mon in our next Legislature the legalized whisky traffic is at an end in Tennessee. The fight is now raging. Let us use all laudable efforts to elect sober upright men to represent us. If we are faithful in November the victory is ours.

Resolved, I. That we favor the abolition of the saloon in the cities of Nashville, Memphis, Chattanooga, and LaFollette and the overthrow of the infamous lug trade.

## Report on State of Religion.

Your committee find by comparison that our increase in members to the various churches in 1904 was 41; 1905, 130; 1906, 72: 1907, 101; and 1908, 120. This increase is too small and we ask the cause. There are several. Churches are not aroused to a sense of their duty in regard to prayer meetings and Sunday schools. It is noticed that the greatest interest is where Sunday schools are kept up the year round. It is a sad mistake that our various churches rely solely upon effort meetings to invite souls to Christ, for it is a fact that men and women are dying every day, and we urge pastors to give an opportunity at every favorable service for sinners to accept Christ. Our churches seem to be sound in doctrine but very inactive in the salvation of souls. There also seems to be a tendency for men to convert sinners instead of waiting on God to do the work, thereby creating an unconverted membership. Brethren, this ought not to be.

# Report on Sanday Schools and Colportage.

Your committee submit the following report:

We have had three colporters—C B Massey, I N Knight, and W J Summers—who have done work as follows: Bibles and testaments sold, 134, 2104.25; Bibles and Testaments donated, 81, 820.65; other books sold, 220, 860.60; sermons preached, 343; miles traveled, 2,425; received for work 8340; conversions, 76; haptens, 52; Sunday-schools organized, 2; pupils, 60; average attendance, 45. We are sorry to note the fact that there are but few Sunday-schools reported in our letters this time, and would be glad if all of the churches would maintain Sunday-schools. Brethren, let us rally to the cause.

#### Report on State Missions.

The commission as given by our Lord Jesus Christ after he rose from the dead was: "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo I am with you always even unto the end of the world." The State of Tennessee is a part of the world, hence the obligation rests on the Baptists of Tennessee to see that every neighborhood has a Baptist church in it. There are in Tennessee fifty-two associations with a membership of 158,081; 1,200 ordained preachers, and 1,577 churches, yet there are whole counties and a number of towns without Baptist churches in them. Brethren, what will the answer be of those who fail to do the bidding of his Lord when he comes to make up his jewels? We find that the churches of this Association have given to State missions during this associational year \$133.13. In Jesus' name let us rise up in our might and take our State for Christ.

Report on Home Missions.

Report on Home Missions.

The work of our Home Mission Board is increasing from year to year. We have destitute fields within the bounds of our home missions that are calling for men to preach the Gospel to them. A number of men have been sent out to meet this call, but there are fields yet unoccupied on account of insufficient means to send men. We are glad to say that we are still increasing. Last year closed with \$11,237 to the home work; received this year up to September 17, 1908, \$13,373 37. Brethren, is this all the Haptists of Tennessee are able to do? We should feel a greater responsibility to-day than ever before on account of the great tide of emigration that has turned to our Southland.

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Report on Foreign Missions.

Nearly two thousand years ago the Captain of our salvation issued his final command. This command is recorded in God's Holy Word, and reads as follows: "All power in heaven and earth is given unto me. Go ye therefore and make disciples of the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever! I have commanded you, and lo! am with you even unto the end of the world." This is the commission under which we profess to work. During the Lord's personal ministry his disciples were commissioned to preach to the Jown and their rainistry was confined to Palestine. The last commission enlarged their territory to "all nations," as expressed by Marthew, and "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," in sexpressed by Mark. In the giving of the commission the Lord commanded the disciples to tarry at Jerusalem until they were endowed with power from on high, at which time they became witnesses of Christ not only in Jerusalem but also in Samaria, and "unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Under this commission Baptists have been working for centuries. As a people we have great reasons to rejoice for what God has wrought through the Baptists in the great mission movement now challenging the attention of Christendom. Baptists have the honor of organizing the first foreign missionary society of modern times for the preaching of the Gospel in all the world. To-day we have missionaries in Japan. Chima, Africa, India, Italy, South America, Mexico, Cuba, and Australia. Plattering reports come of glorious results. We are happy we have a part in the examgelization of the world. Wiseman Association claims to be a body of Missionary Baptists, but we are sorry many of our churches have contributed but little to the furtherance of the Gospel among the Children of men. 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Statistical Table of Wiseman Association for the Year Ending September 25, 1908.

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# CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three measengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence

Article VII. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church or claim, any ecclesiastical powers or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock, a.m., after the third Sabbath in September, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting:

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and delegate or delegates, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the delegate or delegates present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly in practices.

Article XIII. The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethren present to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their lights, but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XIV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular annual meeting, by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present.
