Foreign Missions

We your committee, beg to make the following report:
We are glad to report that our missionary, Bro. John A. Abernathy of Tai An Fu, Shantung, China. is doing a great work. He has learned the language sufficiently to begin preaching. He has had a goodly number of conversions and has baptized twenty-three persons up to his last report. He is a fine young preacher. We have paid him up to July 30, 1921, \$629.74. This does not mean that Enon and Wiseman Associations have paid all of this. But these two Associations have paid the larger part of this sum. There is considerable money on the way to Bro. Abernathy that has not yet reached him. There are ten other missionaries at the same place with Bro. Abernathy, all working together. All these have been paid to date. We have, also, Mrs. Jennie Lamas, Mariel, Cuba, who is doing good work in taking care of some orphans.

Wiseman Association has given to the cause of Foreign Missions this year \$266.36. Brethren let us all give something to carry on

the good work.

3. Only one person shall speak at a time who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator and shall while speaking confine himself to the subject under consideration and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophristry or criticism.

4. No member shall absent himself from the Association with-

out leave of the Moderator.

5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speakers of five minutes each. speeches of five minutes each.

6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who

No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper

while the Association is in session.

8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.

On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read

the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.

11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.
