FIRST DAY Morning Session

The Messengers' composing the Wiseman Association of Missionary Baptists, met with Mt. Zion church, one mile south of Holland, Ky., on Wednesday, September 23, 1925 at 10 o'clock A. M., in the thirty-fourth annual session of this body. The session was opened with singing "I Am So Glad He Saved My Soul" and "The World Can't Take It Away", and prayer was offered by L. D. McGuffee. Another song, "I Want To Be There" and prayer by Elder C. B. Massey, followed by song, "How Beautiful Heaven Must Be", after which Eld. E O. Sanders, after some remarks, read Matthew 6:1-12 and chose for a text John 1:17, and preached the Introductory Sermon. The sermon was an earnest exhortation to the people to serve God the old time way and for the sinners to seek God till they found Him. After the sermon the congregation sang, "I Am A Soldier of the Cross" and "Floating Down the Stream of Time" and the congregation pressed forward to give the preacher their hand in token of their endorsement of the sermon.

Report on Religious Literature

Report on Religious Literature was read by J. E. Cole, as follows:—

We your committee submit the following report:

What a person reads goes to form his character to a large extent. It becomes important, therefore, that he should read good literature of a pure and wholesome character. Baptists ought to read Baptist literature. They have the finest literature in the world because they have the purest and noblest principles. We recommend as literature wort'y to be read by the members of this Association, the Bible, first of all, which is too often neglected. The Baptist books and tracts published by our various Baptist publishing houses, the Sunday School literature published by the S. S. Committee at Texarkana, Ark.

After being ably discussed by J. E. Cole, P. S. Dyer, G. L. Hughes, C. B. Massey, Paul Willburn, J. A. Carter, F. E. Whit-

low, J. H Holland, Alford Cook, was adopted.

Report on Ministerial Education

We, your committee, submit the following report:-

We believe that a man in order to preach the gospel must have first of all, a divine call. We believe a called man can preach without very much education; but in order that he be more able to defend the doctrine, he needs at least a common school education.

Therefore we recommend that our preachers who feel the need of an education, attend our country schools to be enabled to use the language so that our critics cannot cast reflections on His teachings, that would hinder the Word from having free course, remembering that Paul told Timothy to study to show himself approved unto God a workman that need not be asliamed.

—2nd Timothy, 2:15. Some Baptist schools have come so correct that they are wrongly dividing the truth, therefore, it is dangerous for our young preachers to attend them. We recommend that our preachers attend a good Bible class and study the first of all the Bible, asking God in humble prayer to guide them.

The Report on Foreign Missions was read by C. B. Massey as follows—

Report on Foreign Missions

We, your committee on Foreign Missions, beg leave to submit the following report:—

Foreign Missions means missions abroad, more properly with us, missions in China. Our Missionaries in China are T. L. Blalock, Mrs. T. L. Blalock, Miss Gladys Ashworth, Z. Oaks and others of Tai, An Fu, Shantung, China, nine in all. We have 66 other Missionaries in other parts of the world, making 75 in all, that are being supported by us. None of our missionaries receive any set salary, but go out directed by the Holy Spirit. Sent out by the churches and the Holy Spirit, as Paul and Barnabas. Acts 13:3-5, and supported direct by the churches as they were There has been sent through our Treasurer, C. B. Massey, Pleasant Shade, Tenn., \$1122.33. There has been a number of converts on the Foreign field. Eld. J. A. Abernathy went to the board. He brought in a book on Evolution and because he was not allowed to teach it, he left us. But Brethren, let us not shrink from our duty because some have played the part of a traitor to us Christ worked His way through the world with many opposing Him, also Paul did his work in great opposition. Therefore let us rally to the support of Bro. Blalock and his China Mission. C. B. MASSEY, J. H. EDEN, J. H. DOWNING, Committee.

The report on Home Missions was read by H. C. Oldham as follows:—

Report on Home Missions

We have two missionaries in this section of the country, Elds. Calvin Gregory and C. B. Massey. They have preached about 240 sermons, baptized 74, witnessed 146 conversions, traveled about 3500 miles. Bro. Massey organized one church in Bowling Green, Ky., and baptized 70 persons into it, received 30 by letter, and 12 approved for baptism. They have a house on which they owe \$800.00. They have paid this year on their house \$700. There has been \$300 sent through C. B. Massey for this work. We have two other home missionaries in West Tennessee, T. F. Moore, S W. Joyner. Brethren we should rally to the support of our home missionaries, at least in this part of the country. Bros. Massey and Gregory have received for their work \$130.00 and collected some on the field.

Report on Baptist Home

We have bought a home in West Tennessee, near Camden. We have paid on the home this year \$1000.00, and have some money in the bank to pay on the last note that will be due in December the 1st,1925. We recommend that the pastors speak to their churches about this home and get funds to finish paying for the same. The home will be opened Jan. 1, 1926 for old ministers and orphan children. Now is the time to rally to our home, and support our home cause, till we can take in a large number orphan children and fold ministers.

Report on District Missions

We recommend that we cooperate with Enon Association in selecting a district missionary for full time work in the bounds of the two Associations and that we pay as our part of his support \$50.00 per month.

Report on Pastor's Report

We, your committee, submit the following report:—
Many of our pastors are being neglected and possibly all of them. There are but few what what could support a pastor for full time, if they would only take the matter up as the Lord dictates. The most of our churches have adopted the plans of men instead of God's plan in supporting their pastors. If all of our churches would do as the Bible dictates—1st Cor. 16:1-2, "Let every one of you lay by in store on the first day of the week as the Lord prospers you" Many pastors are suffering, let the churches all rally to the support of their pastors.

tors will do this, there will be an increase in this great work, We urge that our pastors do their very best next year and we feel that we will make the best report next year that we have ever made.

The Report on Prayer Meetings was read by I. N. Sloan as follows :--

Report on Prayer Meeting

We your committee on Prayer Meeting, make the following report:-

The secret of our power in the church, in our homes and in the community will largely depend upon our devotions to God. The men of power in the Kingdom building were men of prayer. Paul exhorted Timothy that first of all prayer, giving of thanks and intersessions be made for all men.

In these modern times as we view the unmistakable condition of our country, and the world seems to be terned up-side down. which shows there never was a greater need for praying men and women ..

We need more spiritual and less formality. Therefore we recommend that the messengers from the various churches urge and insist that their church maintain a regular prayer meeting through the year.

Report on Prohibition



Adjourned to meet with Old Hopewell Church three miles north of Castalian Springs, Sumner County, Tennessee, on Wednesday after the third Sunday in September, 1926.

Thus closed one of the very best sessions of this old landmark body. The brethren feasted on the love of God from the first to the last. Brethren this Association should encourage us to live closer to God during the year 1926 and pray for a greater Association at Hopewell than this one was.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION

OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a consice manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.


1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith

3. We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature by his own free will and ability.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.



We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that hey will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.

We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.

8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance except such as are regularly baptized and come under

the hands of the Presbytery.

We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sabbath in September, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business in

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory. The state of the same and and

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Asset iation, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on exam ination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

: Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterdox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which snall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their lights, but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

RULES OF DECORUM
