RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A Moderator and Clerks shall be chosen by the members present.

3. Only one person shall speak at a time who shall arise and address the Moderator by the Appellation of Bro. Moderator and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under consideration and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticsm.

4. No member shall absent himself from the Association

without leave of the Moderator.

5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.

6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one

who made it.

7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.

8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.

9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.

11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

Report on Religious Literature

We are living in an age of much reading, but indications are that by far the greater part of the reading matter found in the average home is of a very inferior, or even vicious kind. Probably there has never been before so much heresy circulated by zealous advocates of error, and this kind of literature finds its way into many homes where its perniciouns influences is not recognized until great harm has been done.

Let us beware of the flood of free literature sent out by all kinds of schools of heresy. Let us guard our rising generation from the evil effects of reading filthy, vile and vicious literature by putting the very best of reading matter before our people.

The greatest of all books is the Bible. However, it is hardly called literature in the ordinary sense of the term, being the production of men inspired of God, instead of being the product of the finite minds of man as is that produced as literature in this day. We ask our people to read first of all the Bible. We recommend as periodicals The Baptist and Commoner of Little Rock, Ark., and The Forerunner of Norwood, Ky. We further urge our people to read all other sound Baptist papers and books. Let us buy the truth and sell it not.

There has been a falling off in missions for the want of a paper that is specially interested in our work. Our people are not informed as they once were in the days of The Baptist Flag. Our people are slack on their duties that they owe that part of the Lord's work. We should remember that it's more blessed to give than to receive. We beg all, from the least to the greatest, to give as Paul says in 1st Cor. 16:1-2: "Let every one of you lay by in store upon the first day of the week as the Lord has prospered you." Paul was our apostle; he said all the churches ought to do that.

Brethren, we have another missionary going out—Brother W. B. Randall. He is a good man. Let's make an effort to do more in this cause and the Lord will bless us.

Sheridan, Ark.

country is Alfred E. Smith; and,

Whereas, His record as a member of the New York Legislature does not meet with the approval of good citizens who hold to prohibition and other features of good government; that he is a friend of the liquor interests, an opponent of prohibitin, a believer in unrestricted immigration, a habitual drinker and a member of an institution foreign to the highest ideals of American citizenship and its free government, free schools, free churches, free speech and free press—'The ROMAN CATHOLIC Unurch.

Therefore, be it resolved:

- 1. That we go on record as opposed to the candidacy of Mr. Smith.
- 2. That we urge our people to make good use of the ballot to bring about the defeat of the candidate of the whiskey crowd, Tammany Hall and Political Rome.

Adopted without discussion.

The report on Fundamental Doctrines was read by Elder G. N. Crow, as follows:

Fundamental Doctrines

We, your Committee on Fundamental Doctrines, report as follows: First, all things that are called fundamentalism are not fundamentalism; second, Baptists are opposed to every kind of evolution, and stand flat-footed for man and matter as a direct creation of God; third, Missionary Baptists only and alone have stood for the great doctrines of John the Baptist, Jesus the Baptist, and Paul the Baptist; fourth, all men are lost and totally depraved: the sufficiency of the soul to deal directly with God; fifth, salvation by grace through faith without works; sixth, that Baptists alone are authorized to administer baptism; seventh, scriptural baptism and an orderly walk as necessary before coming to the Lord's Supper; eighth, Missionary Baptist churches as the only true churches on earth; ninth, the scriptures an all sufficient rule of faith and practice.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association. Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article II. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messen-

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power

or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A.M., after the third Sabbath in September, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that hese meetings will be mis-

sionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Modeartor giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly

in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in at-

tempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV| The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it out duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the

Son and the Holy Spirti.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith.

3. We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto

obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature by his own free will and ability.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God

by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works

are fruits of faith and follow after justification.

7. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.

8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance except such as are regularly baptized and come under

the hands of the Presbytery.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.




