FIRST DAY
WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 1930, 10 A. M.

The Wiseman Baptist Association met in its thirty-ninth annual session in the meeting house of Haysville Baptist church at Haysville, Tennessee, September 24, 1930, at 10 a.m.

The session was opened by singing "Amazing Grace." Prayer by W. K. Johnson, followed by song, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," after which Elder L. A. Stewart read the 12th chapter of Romans, and Elder N. C. Fuqua offered prayer for the Association, followed by song, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

The hour having arrived for the introductory sermon, Elder F. W. Lambert, the appointee, was introduced by the moderator to preach the sermon. Brother Lambert, after some remarks, chose for a text Matthew 5:8, and preached a fine sermon, stressing two points: The heart made pure by the blood of Christ, and all who had a pure heart would see God. At the close the congregation sang and pressed forward to give the preacher their hand in token of their endorsement of the sermon.

PLACE OF MEETING

Place of meeting in 1931 was taken up at this time and Capital Hill church, Barren County, Ky., three and a half miles northwest of Fountain Run, Ky., was selected as meeting place for 1931. A. J. Sloan was chosen to preach the introductory sermon and N. C. Fuqua, alternate.

On motion of Elder N. C. Fuqua, Elder A. J. Sloan was chosen to preach the doctrinal sermon for this session on the morrow at 11 a. m.

On motion the clerk was ordered to give a page in the minutes to the memory of Elder John F. Overton, deceased.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The report on Religious Literature was read by Elder H. C. Oldham as follows:

We, your committee on religious literature, submit the following report: We recommend first of all the reading of the Bible, then the Fore Runner, and all other sound Baptist papers. We would also recommend the reading of the Histories of Baptists. Elder H. C. Oldham, T. L. Hughes, D. N. Stanley, Committee. Discussed by Elder H. C. Oldham, Charlie Burrow, W. K. Johnson, N. C. Fuqua, L. W. Stewart, R. O. Sanders, and others, and adopted.

The committee on divine services report that Elder N. C. Fuqua would preach at this place tonight. The messengers and visitors were assigned homes, after which the body adjourned to meet on the morrow at 9 a. m. Prayer by Elder J. E. McDonald.

SECOND DAY THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The Association convened at 9 a. m. The devotional services were conducted by the moderator. Prayer was offered by J. W. Marish. After roll call of messengers and reading of the minutes of the two sessions of the first day the moderator declared the body ready for business.

REPORT ON FUNDAMENTAL DOCTRINES

The report on Fundamental Doctrines was read by Elder W. M. McDonald as follows:

Your committee on fundamental doctrines beg leave to submit the following report: Baptists are opposed to every kind of evolution. We believe that man is a direct creation of God. Baptists alone have stood for the great doctrines of John the Baptist. We believe in salvation by grace, not of works. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are church ordinances set in the church by the Lord. We believe that Missionary Baptist churches were set up or established by the Lord when He was here on earth.

MISSIONS

The report on Missions was read by Elder J. E. McDonald as follows:

This is one of the most important causes among us today, and one of the most neglected, as the letters show that there has been but little done during the past year for this great cause.

By missions we mean the sending of the gospel to all the

world. Christ said: "Go ye therefore and teach all nations," Matt. 28:19-20. Many say they believe in home missions but don't believe in foreign missions. If everybody in the past had have been that way we would have been heathen today in this country. Sinners here cannot be saved without the gospel, neither can the heathens. All are lost, Rom. 3:9. God loves all, John 3:16. Christ died for all, Heb. 2:9. He commands all to repent, Act. 17:30. Christ organized His church and told it to go teach all nations. It is a fact that the heathen will die and be lost forever unless they hear the gospel. God has made the plan, has given His spirit to guide us, and told His churches to go, so the churches are the institutions which the Lord has commanded to preach the gospel to all the world. So, we need to wake up on this line and hear the command go as it comes from our Master beyond the skies, and then say, here am I, send me. O! that we would lift our eyes and get a vision of the condition in our country and see the millions in heathen lands dying without Christ. O! how horrible as they come to the end of life, must die and be forever lost. O! how we love the name "Missionary," but can the world tell by our actions that we are missionaries in deed and in truth.

We have a number of home missionaries who are worthy, consecrated men, also a number who have said good bye to their home land and have gone to heathen lands to preach the gospel to those who have never heard it, and they are depending on us for their support. We need to rally to their support by praying for them daily and contributing regularly to their needs. Brethren of the churches, do not wait until about the time for the Association meet to take a collection for this great cause. Our missionaries need support in the spring as well as in the fall. People are dying all the time, so let us hear the call of God to send the gospel to all nations.

Elder J. E. McDonald, W. W. Gent, W. K. Johnson, Committee. Discussed by J. E. McDonald, Alfered Cook, Calvin Gregory, J. D. Cook.

The hour having arrived for the doctrinal sermon, this report was tabled to be taken up again in the afternoon, and Elder A. J. Sloan took the stand and after some remarks chose for a text Luke 1:1-4, and preached the sermon. His theme being the things

most surely believed by Baptists, and the Baptists seemed to enjoy it, but the rest of the people seemed to have the limber neck.

The session was closed by song and hand shake. Prayer by L. W. Stewart.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

Came together by singing and prayer by Elder F. W. Lambert.

The discussion on the mission report was continued by Elder W. T. Taylor, A. J. Sloan, H. C. Oldham, A. W. Jenkins, and others, and adopted.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

The report on Ministerial Education was read by W. T. Taylor as follows:

We, your committee on Ministerial Education, submit the following report: Preaching the gospel is the greatest work given to man. We, therefore, recommend that every minister prepare himself to rightly divide the word of truth by using every aducational advantage that his intelligence would help him in this, the greatest of all callings.

Elder W. T. Taylor, W. O. Johnson, J. D. Cook, Committee. Discussed by W. T. Taylor, and adopted.

OLD MINISTERS' HOME

The report on Old Ministers' Home was read by Alfered Cook as follows:

We, your committee on old ministers' home, submit the following report: We have a home near Camden, Tenn., Elder J. Robt. Paschal, a Baptist minister, in charge. This home is for old ministers, their wives and orphan children. We now have six children in the home and every church in this association ought to contribute regularly to the support of these children. This home stands for what all true Baptists stand for. This Association has given to this cause this year \$143.28, which is an increase over last year of \$43.000. This Association ought to give \$500.00 per year to this worthy cause.

The committee on divine service reported that Elder H. C. Oldham would preach at this place tonight. On motion adjourned until 9 a. m. Friday. Prayer by J. E. McDonald.

THIRD DAY FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Came together by singing and prayer by Elder F. W. Lambert. After reading the minutes of the previous day the moderator declared the body ready for business.

NASHVILLE ORPHANS' HOME

The report on Orphans' Home was read by L. L. Gregory, as follows:

We, your committee, beg leave to submit the following report on the Baptist Orphans' Home near Nashville, Tenn.: We have a home 12 miles south of Nashville, Tenn., well located on highway from Nashville to Franklin, Tenn., with electric railway running by the home. It is well equipped with good buildings. One building was destroyed by fire September, 1929. We hope same has been rebuilt by this time. We think it is one of the grandest institutions in the state. There are over 200 children in the home. They are taught nearly every avocation of life. They have a good Sunday School and preaching every Sunday. We know of our own knowledge of seven children from Wiseman Association in this home. All seven of these are from Macon county. We insist on every church in this Association to help in this worthy institution. Part of your committee, if not all, have had the pleasure of being in this home at different times, and have carried orphan children there when they were at the mercy of the people. We know Dr. W. J. Stewart personally and will say his whole heart is in the work. We find in the minutes of 1929 out of 27 churches in Wiseman Association only paid to this home \$36.85. We think all our churches should wake up to their Christian duty and contribute more to this worthy institution.

PASTORS' SUPPORT

The report on Pastors' Support was read by L. L. Gregory as follows:

We, your committee on pastors' support, recommend that we have a more business like method in supporting our pastors. After looking over the reports from different churches represented in this Association we find that our pastors are very poorly paid for their work. It takes a man from fifteen to twenty years to prepare himself for the ministery and he never gets to where he don't have to study to keep up with the times, if he does any good in the ministery. We recommend that our deacons see the members of their churches when they call a pastor and have them to agree on a fixed amount to be paid their pastor for his service, and then see that it is paid into the treasurer's hands so that he can pay the pastor each month for his service.

L. L. Gregory, A. H. Hodges, Lit Carter, Committee. After being ably discussed by W. K. Johnson, W. T. Taylor, N. C. Fuqua, Dr. J. Y. Freeman, Calvin Gregory, R. O. Sanders, J. R. Jackson, and many others, adopted.

At this point a number of visiting brethren were recognized and invited to seats with us, whose names you will find in the list of visitors. Adjourned one hour for dinner. Prayer by H. C. Oldham.

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Came together by singing and prayer by Elder N. C. Fuqua.

PROHIBTION

The report on Prohibition was read by Elder N. C. Fuqua as follows:

We, your committee on Prohibition, submit the following report: We are glad of the progress that has been made on prohibition. We are glad that we have a national law that prohibits the making and selling of intoxicating drinks of any kind. But we find that the wet element of our nation are trying to have that law repealed. So we urge every Baptist and God loving Christian and citizen to use all their influence in support of the bone dry law and do our very best to rid our land of this poisonous stuff.

Elder N. C. Fuqua, Arthur Russell, B. B. White, Committee. Discussed by N. C. Fuqua, H. C. Oldham, W. T. Taylor, W. W. Gent, Mrs. Bettie Johnson, and others, and adopted.

PRAYER MEETINGS

The report on Prayer Meetings was read by Elder F. W. Lambert as follows:

The Bible teaches the great need of prayer. Men of power of all ages have been of prayer. Christ prayed before He organized His church. Paul prayed for the conversion of his Jewish brethren. We recommend that all of our churches have a mid-week prayer meeting. Paul commanded that first of all that prayer be made for all men.

Elder F. W. Lambert, J. W. Parker, Committee. After being discussed by F. W. Lambert, and J. W. Parker, adopted.

STATE OF RELIGION

The report on State of Religion was read by Elder J. R. Jackson as follows:

Our gain during the past year has not been what it ought to have been. Some of the churches report good gains, but others have not done so well. We recommend the faithful preaching of the gospel and much prayer that there may be a great revival among the Christians and a great awakening among the lost.

OBITUARIES

The report on Obituaries was read by Elder R. O. Sanders as follows:

Many of our brethren and sisters in Christ Jesus and co-workers in the Master's vineyard have been called from earth during this associational year, and we come now with sorrowful hearts at this memorial hour to lay the flower of tender memory on their graves. Some have left us after long years of faithful labor and no doubt welcomed the message, "Enter now into the rest prepared for you." Others have fallen when they had just reached the meridian of usefulness, and the Grim Reaper did not forget the fair and young; and though our earthly pilgrimage is strewn with fragments of blighted hopes and broken hearts, we do not sorrow as those without hope, for we know God's children have entered into the glad sunlight of unending day. RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and Clerks shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under consideration and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.
Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Associaciation shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sabbath in September, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except upon charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any

other visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

ABSTRACTS OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

- 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith.
- 3. We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.
- 7. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.
- 8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance except such as are regularly baptized and come under the hands of the Presbytery.
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgement, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
