RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE FORTIETH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE WISEMAN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD WITH THE CAPITOL HILL BAPTIST CHURCH NEAR FOUNTAIN RUN, KY.

FIRST DAY WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 23, 1931, 10 A. M.

The Wiseman Baptist Association met in its fortieth annual session with the Baptist church at Capitol Hill, near Fountain Run, Ky., on this date. The services were opened with singing "Saviour, More Than Life," followed with prayer by Eld. Calvin Gregory. Song, "Pass Me Not," was sung, followed with the reading of the twelfth chapter of Hebrews by the Moderator, Eld. L. A. Stewart. Prayer was offered by Eld. J. Robert Paschal. The Moderator then presented Eld. A. J. Sloan, the appointee of last year, to preach the introductory sermon. Eld. Sloan chose for a text Ps. 91:1, 2, his theme being "The Special Providences of God." The sermon was followed with song and a handshake by the Association in token of endorsement of the discourse.

FUNDAMENTAL DOCTRINES

We, your committee on Fundamental Doctrines, submit the following report:

First. We believe that the Bible is the inspired word of God, and by it all human creeds and conduct should be tried.

Second. We believe in a converted church memebership.

Third. We believe that Christ is the Head and Founder of His church and that it was set up or established during His personal ministry.

Fourth. We believe that the ordinances should be observed just as they were given, and that they are only two in number: Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

Fifth. We believe that John's baptism was Christian baptism. Sixth. We believe that the ordinances were committed to the church.

Seventh. We believe that the church has continued in an unbroken line of succession from Christ to the present time.

We, therefore, urge our preachers to preach more on the doctrine that the people may know what it is.

The report on Missions was read by Eld. Calvin Gregory as follows:

MISSIONS

This is one of the most important subjects that concerns the Master's cause today, the chief business of the Lord's church being to preach the Gospel to all nations. Matt. 28:19, 20. Missions

means the spread of the Gospel and includes all the Scriptural means necessary thereto. We have stressed the idea that missions means nothing more than the giving of money at certain times, but we should get away from that idea and should begin to look upon missions as the proper spreading of the good news of salvation. It is true that money has its place in mission work but this feature of the work will care for itself when our members' hearts are filled with love for God's cause and with zeal for lost souls. We need God-called men to preach the Gospel to all nations. We need men who are willing to sacrifice themselves on the altar of God's service, and who are willing to hazard their lives for the Master's cause. We need churches that are missionary in spirit as well as name, churches that will pray for more laborers in the vineyard of the Lord, churches that will pray for those who labor on mission fields and churches that will contribute of their means for the support of the workers on the fields. We feel today that we have part of the needed equipment in the form of God-called men who are already giving their lives for the cause, but we doubt if the burden of a lost world falls very heavily upon the heart and conscience of the average church member. We need more praying churches and we need more liberal churches that will give of the wealth with which they have been blest by the great Giver of all blessings.

The churches of the Association have given but little to missions this time, many of them not giving a penny in a whole year. It is true that money is not the whole of missions but money given to or withheld from this Scriptural cause is a fair indication of the missionary status of a congregation. Judging Wiseman Association by this standard, we are forced to the conclusion that our people are missionary in name rather than in practice. Let us suggest that our pastors give their churches the proper Scripture teaching on this subject and put the mission needs before the people in the hope that a steady improvement may be noted. We have mission fields almost in our doors as well as all over the world. The need is tremendously great. Let us wake up, brethren, and try to do our part to reach the lost with the Gospel of Christ.

OLD MINISTERS' AND ORPHANS' HOME

We have a home near Camden, Benton county, Tennessee, which has been established and opened in a small way as a welcome refuge for aged dependent ministers, their wives or widows, and dependent orphan children who are not otherwise provided for. During the short time this institution has been open for the reception of inmates, we have had the pleasure of caring for sixteen children and two aged ministers. We now have fifteen children, consisting of eight boys and seven girls ranging in age from 6 to 13 years. We are grateful to all who have had a part in supplying our needs, although even our most vital needs have not been fully supplied. We are behind with our grocery bill and with some expense incurred in enlarging the building and supplying furniture. We need a cook room and it will be necessary also to build a feed barn before we can store what we have grown J. ROBERT PASCHAL, on the farm.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The Association came together with singing. Prayer was offered by Eld. W. T. Taylor.

After remarks the Moderator presented Eld. C. B. Massey to preach the Doctrinal Sermon. Eld. Massey choose for a text Jude 3, and preached a strong and able sermon on the faith once delivered to the saints.

The report on Pastors' Support was read by Eld. R. O. Sanders as follows:

PASTORS' SUPPORT

The churches of Wiseman Association have paid their pastors a total of \$3,444.28 during the past year. This is an average of \$127.56 per church. Counting four churches to each pastor, we have the sum of approximately \$500 as the support of the average pastor of the churches of Wiseman Association. How any man can be expected to live on such a sum and keep up his

family, run a car if he has one, or feed a horse and keep up a buggy is one of the questions that cause ministers to have gray hairs and become old before their time. Another very serious question with the pastor is this: "If I can hardly live at all now while I am in my prime and cannot lay up even one cent in my best days, what am I to do when I get old?"

Nearly all our pastors have to do other work to live and this work keeps them from having time to study and prepare themselves for their greatest usefulness. So it is no wonder that many of the members say their pastor is making no improvement. The poor fellow has no time to study that he might improve his talents. It is a positive command of the Bible that ministers study to show themselves approved unto God, rightly dividing the word of truth. But the stinginess of the churches forces the pastors to disregard this command and compels them to entangle themselves with the affairs of this life in order to have bread for their families and shelter over their heads, which entanglement is a violation of the Bible and contrary to God's will. Who is to blame? We answer: Both the pastors and the members of the churches. The pastors are at fault in that they have not in most instances taught the brethren and sisters their duty under God to support the shepherd of the flock, and the members are at fault because most of them do not take to heart what God has said about supporting His ministers. Many of them know their duty but will not perform it.

The following suggestion is offered: Let the churches purpose as to what they will pay their pastor. 2 Cor. 9:17 "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give." If the pastor is unable to preach for what the church is able to pay him, let him go elsewhere. By the church's saying what it will pay or purposes to pay during the year, the pastor will know what to expect, and will be able to make his financial arrangements accordingly.

There are 3,365 members in this Association. They have paid an average of about \$1.00 each during the year for their pastors' support. This makes eight and a third cents a month for the average member. Eleven churches paid their pastors during the year an average of only \$54 per church. Let us do better.

Let us pray God that our people may be temperate in all things.

Moderator and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under consideration and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the second Sunday in July, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except upon charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have

liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPALS OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

- 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith.
- 3. We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.
- 5. We believe that sinners are jutified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.
- 7. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.
- 8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance except such as are regularly baptized and come under the hands of the Presbytery.
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.
