### FIRST DAY

#### WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 18th, 1933

The Wiseman Baptist Association met in its Forty-Second Annual Session with the Baptist church at Rocky Mound, Macon County, Tennessee, at ten o'clock on this date. Services were opened with singing "Keep Me Close To Thee," and "Amazing Grace." After remarks by the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, prayer was offered by Elder R. O. Sanders, followed with singing "What If We Fail To Get There?" The Moderator read as a lesson Psalm 23. and prayer was offered by Elder William Norman. Song, "There Is No Depression in Heaven," was sung. The hour having arrived for the preaching of the Introductory Sermon, and Elder W. T. Taylor, the appointee of last year, not being present, it was moved to appoint Elder C. B. Massey of Enon Association to preach the sermon. #### RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

One of the greatest problems before our people is that of getting information to the members of our churches. Of more than

300,000 white Baptists in Tennessee, only about 20,000 have any regular source of information as to what we are doing as a people.

What we read has much to do with what we believe. Therefere, we recommend that pastors of the various churches urgs our people to do more reading, and that church leaders try to see that some good book or religious paper finds its way into every home. We find in many homes, trashy literature, much of it teaching a soul-destroying doctrine. We, therefore, recommend sound books and papers, ones that set forth the doctrine and practices of the Bible as Baptists teach them. #### SECOND DAY

#### THURSDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1933

The Association assembled with singing, and prayer was offered by Elder R. Thompson. The Assistant Moderator, Elder R. O. Sanders, read as a lesson Psalm 121. After the calling of the roll and the reading and approving of the minutes of yesterday, the

Moderator, Elder N. C. Faqua, announced the Association ready for business.

The report on Ministerial Education was read by Brother T. C. Harrison as follows:

#### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

We, your committee, submit the following report: Education means to draw out and develop the talent and powers of man, mentally, morally and spiritually. Our ministers should study the, word of God with a prayerful desire to understand it. David said: "Open thou mine eyes that I may behold wondrous things out of thy law." We recommend that our ministers study to show themselves "approved unto God, workmen that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." James tells us that "if any among you lack wisdom, let him ask God who giveth liberally to all men and upbraideth not."

There is no sweeter place to learn the truth than at the feet of Jesus, whom we may approach in humble prayer. The man with an open Bible and an honest heart to know the truth will always feel safe amid the storms of life. Respectfully submitted.

#### MISSIONS

Foreign Missions is one of the most important subjects on which we may make a report as Baptists. It is true that Missions is badly neglected today. By missions we mean the sending of the Gospel to all the world. To the enlightened and to the poor heathen who is dying in his ignorance and going to hell. Brethren, let us think serious about this. Should we be so selfish as not to send the Gospel to the nations in darkness? When Christ said in Matt. 28:19.20 "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations," He left us a task as wide as the world and as lasting as time.

Some have an idea that the heathen will be saved and carried to heaven on his ignorance. The Bible condenms this idea for Paul teaches us in Romans 10:12-13 that those who are saved must have the Gospel preached to them and that they must hear before they can pray. How can a heathen repent toward a God of whom

he has never heard? And how shall they hear if the Gospel is never sent to them? We believe that God has no respect of persons and the enlightened man must hear in order to repent and so must the heathen.

Let us all co-operate together in our mission efforts and let a greater degree of brotherly love prevail. Let us thank God that we have been reared in a Gospel land where all may be saved who will come to Him. But let us not forget our brother in darkness beyond the sea. Let us support the missionaries on the foreign fields with our means and our prayers. Let us pray for the poor condemned man who knows not God. Let us fight the good fight of faith until every nation, people, kindred and tongue shall have heard the old, old story of Calvary and God's love to a lost world.

#### OLD, MINISTERS AND ORPHANS' HOME

We have a good building and good farm near Camden, Tennessee, that are being used at present as a home for dependent children and also for old ministers and their wives or widows. However, twenty-four children at present constitute the inmates of the home. Elder J. Robert Paschal, a sound Baptist minister, is in charge of this institution.

Let us support this Home with our means, our prayers and our loyal support. For we feel this is a part of the work enjoined upon us by the Lord. The children are well cared for and are being trained religiously and for the affairs of this life so they may leave the Home prepared for life and for the world to come. Let us not withhold our support from this institution and whatever we do for these children in the right spirit will all be repaid to us in some way.

Tennessee Baptists have another home near Franklin, Tennessee, with more than two hundred children cared for at present. Dr. W. J. Stewart is superintendent of the Home. This institution is owned and controlled by the Tennessee State Convention and is one of their best features of work. Let us all work for and sup-

port both Homes. Then when life's work is over, we shall all meet again where our Lord shall reward every man according to his work. May God bless both Homes and their inmates.

#### NOTES BY ASSISTANT CLERK

At eleven o'clock, the Moderator presented Elder A. J. Sloan, the appointee of last year, to preach the Doctrinal Sermon. He read the second chapter of second Timothy. After some striking statements relative to women preachers, he chose for a text 1 Thes. 5:21 and preached the sermon. He literally side-tracked Holy Rollerism as a false doctrine, showing that God gives an abundance or fullness in all his dealings with the children of men whom He saves. He showed that there was no room for a second definite work of grace nor Scripture for such a position. He gave some of the most legical reasons and plainest Scriptural arguments against this modern heresy we have ever heard. The congregation was moved to tears and amens during the whole sermon. "God Is Keeping Me," and "How Firm a Foundation" were sung while the hand of love and fellowship was given Brother Sloan amid the shouts of God's saints. It was indeed a wonderful sermon.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under consideration and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such

other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.
