FIRST DAY

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1934

The Wiseman Baptist Association met in its Forty-third Annual Session with the Baptist church at Pleasant Hill, Sumner County, Tennessee, at ten o'clock on this date. Services were opened with singing "When The Roll Is Called" and "The Promised Land." After some remarks by the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, Elder W. W. Bowman led the Association in prayer, followed with singing "I Am Thine, O Lord." The Moderator then presented Elder R. O. Sanders, the appointee of last year to preach the Introductory Sermon. After remarks Brother Sanders read as a lesson, 1 Cor. 14th chapter in which he exposed the practice of the Holy Rollers in speaking in so-called tongues or rather "jabbering." He chose for a text John 3:8 and preached a great sermon on the theme: "The Unseen Power of God." He exhorted the brethren to preach, pray and sing in that power. He closed his discourse with an account of his travels from nature to grace and how God had stood by him in his work as a minister. At the close of the sermon the congregation pressed forward to give their hands as a token of their endorsement of the sermon, while "Amazing Grace" was sung.

The roll of the churches was called and the Moderator appointed Brethren J. D. Cook, J. W. Hammock and L. L. Gregory as a Finance Committee.

Adjourned one hour for dinner. Dismissed with prayer by Elder F. W. Lambert.

SECOND DAY

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 25, 1934

The Association came together with singing, followed with prayer by Elder Calvin Gregory. The roll was called and the minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The report on Orphans' Homes was read by Brother Wrenzy Wheeley as follows:

BAPTIST HOMES

We Tennessee Baptists have two Orphans' Homes at present. One of them is located twelve miles south of Nashville. This Home is under the control of the Tennessee Baptist Convention. The other Home is located near Camden, Tenn. This Home also cares for aged and dependent ministers and their wives or widows as well as orphan children.

We feel that all Baptists should support these Homes with their means and with their prayers. We feel that we should have a special interest in the Camden Home because it cares for old, worn-out minister and their wives, who have given the best years of their lives to the cause of God, and who in life's evening, have no place to call home. May God bless these Homes and their inmates.

The Clerk read a letter from Brother T. L. Blalock, Chinese Missionary. On motion the Moderator and the Clerk were appointed to write Brother Blalock a letter in token of the love and esteem we have for him and his great work in China.

The report on Missions was read by Elder N. C. Fuqua as follows:

MISSIONS

Although this is one of the most important causes and one of the greatest questions concerning us as Missionary Baptists, it is one of the most neglected of all by us. By missions we mean the sending of the Gospel to all nations. Christ said: "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations." Matt. 28:19. Since this commission was given after His agony and cruel death on the Cross for us, how can any child of God be indifferent to carrying it out?

It seems that the great commission is being placed last among our Lord's commands and our church work. Christ's order is being reversed in spite of the fact that He died for us and we say we love Him. He put the lost soul first and we are putting it last. When He said: "What shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" Jesus knew the real worth of a soul. Jesus laid aside the glory he had with the Father and came to this world on a mission of salvation to the lost, suffering the shame and dreadful agony of death on the Cross for poor lost sinners. The tremendous sacrifice made by the Lord should stir the hearts of all the members of the churches of this Association toward their duty to help spread the gospel of salvation to a lost world.

Sinners here cannot be saved without the Gospel, neither can they be saved in heathen lands if they have never heard of the Christ who saves. Paul said that the Gospel was the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth. Rom. 1:16. All are lost, Rom. 3:19, God loves all. John 3:16. Christ died for all. Heb. 2:9. He commands all to repent. Acts 17:30. Paul tells us that "Whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord, shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed, and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they hear without a preacher?" Rom. 10:13-14.

The churches are the institutions which the Lord has commanded to preach the Gospel to all the world. So we need to wake up along this line and hear once more the command to go as it comes from our Master in Heaven, and to do our best to get the Gospel to the lost of our own land and to those who know not God in heathen lands; for if they fail to get the Gospel, they will die and be lost forever. If we fail to use the opportunities that God is giving us to reach the lost, many that would have been saved will be lost. May God help us to do our best.

We have a number of Home Missionaries and also some

who have said goodbye to home land and have gone to heathen lands to preach the Gospel to those who have never heard it and they are depending on us for support while they preach.

At its close "The Promised Land," "I Want to Love Him More," "O How I Love Jesus" and "I'll Be At Home Some Day," were sung while the hand of endorsement was given the speaker amid shouts of joy.

Paul also taught us how to finance the Lord's work in 1 Cor. 16:2 when he said: "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by Him in store as God hath prospered him." "He which soweth sparingly shall also reap sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver." 2 Cor. 9:6, 7.

The report on Education was read by Elder Calvin Gregory as follows:

EDUCATION

Paul wrote Timothy to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." Tim, 2:15. Peter said of Paul: "As also in all his epistles, speaking in them of those things, in which are some things hard to be understood which they that are unlearned and unstable, wrest as they do also the other scriptures unto their own destruction. 2 Peter 3:16.

Paul was one of the most highly educated men of his day and time. The grace of God, using this learned man, gave us fourteen books in the New Testament, and gave to us the deep and unsearchable truths of God on many, many points. His superior education enabled him, through the grace of God, to meet successfully every heresy of his time.

We have fallen upon perilous times and the rankest of heresies prevail almost everywhere. Can ignorance and a lack of knowledge of God's word enable our ministers to meet the champions of error. Our preachers as almost never before need a deep and thorough understanding and knowledge of God's word. The prevailing attitude seems to be that all one has to do is to open his mouth and God will fill it with words of wisdom. That this is an error is evident for Paul said to Timothy: "Give diligence to reading."

1 Tim. 4:13. We believe that the successful minister of today should at least know the word of God and it is well that he know how to express himself in language that will enable both the educated and the uneducated to understand his message. Let all our ministers study the Bible as never before and do our best to magnify the highest, noblest and grandest of all callings by thoroughly preparing to meet every foe of the truth and vanquish error until finally the truth prevails and the earth becomes "full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under consideration and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.

- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.
