FIRST DAY

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 19, 1938

The Wiseman Baptist Association met in its forty-seventh annual session with New Bethel church, near Goodlettsville, Tenn., at ten o'clock a. m. on this date. Services were opened with singing "The Unclouded Day" and "Holy Manna." After some very touching remarks by the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, prayer was offered by Elder Paul Wilburn of New Salem Association. Prayer was followed with the singing of "When the Roll Is Called." The 100th Psalm was read by the Moderator, after which Elder C. B. Massey of Enon Association offered prayer. Song, "Take the Name of Jesus With You," was sung.

At this point the Moderator presented the appointee of last year, Elder F. W. Lambert, to preach the Introductory Sermon. He read as a lesson Rom. 1:1-20 and chose the 20th verse for a text, his theme being the power of God. The sermons showed that God gives His ministry power to preach Brother Lambert seemed to be entirely under or in that power as if he were hidden in Christ and the listeners could hardly fail to see that power manifested. SECOND DAY

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1938

The Association came together with singing, followed with prayer by Brother J. D. Cook.

The Roll of members was read by the Clerk, and the Minutes of yesterday were also read and approved. The regular Order of Business was taken up.

The report on Prohibition was read by Oakley Cook as follows:

PROHIBITION

We, your committee, submit the following report: We, as a people, ought to take a firm stand for Prohibition. Government-sponsored beverages are ruining this great nation. They are causing vice, crime, poverty and the debauchery of our people. Degradation and shame are upon our nation.

National prohibition ought to be made the law again and then enforce the law.

We are taught in the Scriptures to abstain from strong drink, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." It is not wise for our people to be deceived by this damnable stuff which is advertised all along our highways and in nearly every public place. We ought to take a strong stand against this evil of drink. Hab. 2:15 says: "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that puttest thy bottle to him." Just consider the meaning of this passage of Scripture. Those who put the cross mark on the wet ticket are putting the bottle to their neighbors' lips. Woe unto the man who upholds the evil stuff, who votes for it, or even tolerates its existence. In our churches are many members who not only do not oppose this evil, but even buy and sell it as well as to drink it. The line of discipline should be drawn so as to put a stop to such conduct or to withdraw fellowship from them.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

We, your committee, submit the following report:

By Religious Literature we mean literature which, when read, will increase our knowledge of the principles that pertain to a godly life in Christ.

Therefore we recommend none other literature than that which bases all of its subject matter directly on the sound and unmistakeable teachings of the Bible.

We earnestly urge our people, especially fathers and mothers, to keep the right kind of literature before their children at all times, as what children read and have taught them before they reach their teens, is usually the foundation of their life. As Solomon said: "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it." We feel that good sound Bible literature proves an important part in sound religious training. Now by sound Bible literature we mean sound Baptist literature.

First of all books we recommend the Holy Bible which is

the standard by which all doctrines, principles, conduct and creeds should be weighed and tried.

We also recommend all sound religious papers, such as the Forerunner and American Baptist.

In conclusion we want to advise everyone to "buy the truth and sell it not." W. T. RUSSELL,

NOTES BY ASSISTANT CLERK

The hour having arrived for the preaching of the annual Doctrinal Sermon, the regular Order of Business was suspended and the Moderator presented the appointee of last year, Elder A. J. Sloan, to preach the sermon. After a few very touching remarks, Brother Sloan read the 87th Psalm as a lesson. He chose the third verse of the lesson as a text and preached a great sermon. He showed that glorious things are spoken of the city of God. Brother Sloan preached with power as he told about the wonderful things of God. He showed that Baptists have a wonderful heritage and that

some day we shall meet thee Lord on high. His hearers were made glad by the comforting promises of God to His people. Many tears were shed and many shouted aloud for joy at the close of the sermon as good songs were sung while the hand of fellowship and endorsement was given the speaker. A number of excellent talks were made after the sermon. Moved to adjourn forty-five minutes for dinner. The benediction was offered by Elder L. A. Stewart.

AFTERNOON SESSION

After another fine dinner the Association came together with singing. Prayer was offered by Elder W. T. Russell, following with singing.

The report on Missions was read by Elder F. W. Lambert as follows:

MISSIONS

We have a large number of missionaries who are being supported on what is known as the Bible or direct plan of mission work. From the letters from the churches of Wiseman Association, we learned that little has been done for missions. Just a few churches reported anything given to the spread of the Gospel to all nations. How did we get the oldfashioned Gospel? By the sacrifices of faithful ministers who came here and preached the Gospel in our bounds. There are yet scores of communities in the bounds of Wiseman Association that are without the true Gospel of Christ. Then the field broadens and grows wider and wider until it covers all the world. Jesus said: "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8. The world is dark with sin, the lost being in sin and spirtiual darkness. Blinded by the god of this world, they are on their way to destruction, led captive by the wicked one at his will. God will not change His plan. The lost must hear in order to know. They must know in order to do. They must do in order to be saved; that is, meet the conditions required of them by the Lord. They cannot believe without hearing the Gospel, and somebody must carry the good news of salvation to these millions of starving souls.

Brethren, let us wake up and do something for missions. The church at Jerusalem stopped its work of "going" until God moved it out by persecution. And the brethren went everywhere preaching the word of the Lord. Let us fear God

and give our money for the spread of the Gospel lest we be driven by persecution to do what God has commanded. Now the task is ours. Christ gave the Commission to His church to tell the lost of the whole earth the old, old story of His love for the children of men, and of their great need of Him who died for all men. He waits to save and bless. Brethren, do not fail during the coming year to give to missions.

The report on Pastors' Support was read by Elder G. L. Hughes as follows:

PASTORS' SUPPORT

We note from the letters to the Association that most of the churches are doing a fair part toward their pastors' support. We believe that pastors can help much by encouraging the members to do their part and thus bring about a better spirit of giving to the support of the ministry. This would effect far greater results than discouraging remarks and abuse. At least once or twice each year the pastor should preach a sermon on the duty of the members to support their pastor. Not only should such financial matters as pastors' support be presented, but the duty of the brethren and sisters to give to all other worthy causes should be stressed. SUNDAY SCHOOLS

From the letters to the Association we learned that less than fifty per cent of the churches have Sunday Schools. The Sunday School is a wonderful place to study the Bible; and if the Bible is rightly taught by born-again Baptists, it will lead our boys and girls, men and women to repentance which makes the new birth possible. The Bible says: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you." The wise man said: "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

Now we believe that a real, live Sunday School in every church, with Baptist teachers, is one way of carrying out the commission at home as given in Acts 1:8, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me in Jerusalem." We recommend that each messenger go back to his church and earnestly and prayerfully try to have a Sunday School in his church.

Therefore, we recommend to all of our churches in this Association to maintain a weekly prayer meeting, and that we pray specially that God may give us an old-time revival throughout the bounds of Wiseman Association.

We need to ask the Lord to direct and then follow where He directs us. We need to ask God to send preachers into these destitute places where they could accomplish much good. Let us take courage and try to do more for this cause in the future than has been done in the past.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- $2.\ A$ Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association when assembled. Any member violating this rule shall have his name stricken from the roll of messengers, or any committee on which he may have been placed.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.

- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock a.m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox, and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger or messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.
