# FIRST DAY

Wednesday, October 18, 1939

At ten o'clock a. m. on this date Wiseman Baptist Association convened with Union Baptist church, three miles north of Fountain Run, Ky., in its forty-eighth annual session. The services were opened with singing "Standing On The Promises" and "If I Could Hear My Mother Pray Again." The Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, offered a number of remarks, after which Elder C. B. Massey of Enon Association led us in prayer. In his petition Brother Massey thanked God for this old-time body and prayed that it might continue in the old paths. The congregation sang "Amazing Grace," after which the Moderator read the 121st Psalm as a lesson. Prayer was offered by Elder Lewis Mince, followed with singing "How Firm A Foundation." At this point the Moderator presented Elder R. O. Sanders, the appointee of last year, to preach the Introductory Sermon. After some remarks, Brother Sanders read as a lesson Ecclesiastes 12:1-5 and chose for a text the first verse of the chapter. His theme was "Choosing God Early in Life." He showed that the sinner had the power of making a choice. He preached with power and demonstration of the Holy Spirit. There were many hearty amens from the brethren which showed their endorsement of the sermon. At the close the congregation sang "He Loves Me" and "A Country Where People Don't Die," while the brethren and sisters shook hands with each other and with the speaker in endorsement of the discourse.

We suggest, first of all, the precious pages of the Bible as the very best of literature. We also recommend the Forerunner, the American Baptist and the Independent Baptist Voice. We say in conclusion: "Buy the truth and sell it not."

# **PROHIBITION**

We, your committee on Prohibition, submit the following report: Every Baptist ought to be a total abstainer from the use of strong drink as a beverage. Strong drink is not only detrimental to the peace and morals of the country, but it is also detrimental to the health of those who use it. And

it affects the mind and health of the offspring of fathers and mothers who use it. It causes the death of thousands of innocent people who do not use it, by wrecks and by murder and in other ways. It makes fiends out of parents. It causes husbands to beat and mistreat their wives. It makes widows and orphan children by the thousands. Beer is the worst form of strong drink because children and women can and do buy it.: The head of our nation believes in it, the first lady of the land thinks that the young women ought to be taught how much they can drink and get away with it.

Strong drink is not a matter of politics but of principles that ought to affect every God-fearing and God-loving man and woman, and especially every Baptist. We cannot hope to remedy this strong drink evil as long as we vote for men who believe in its legality and use. We can never be able to control this evil as long as we vote in its favor. We should always ask God to direct us in our voting and then go as He directs.

# THIRD DAY

# Friday, October 20, 1939

The Association came together with singing, followed with prayer by Elder E. A. Jones. The minutes of yesterday were read, corrected and approved. The moderator requested all to abide by our rules.

The report on Missions was read by Elder A. J. Sloan as follows:

#### **MISSIONS**

The Great Commission of our Lord continues to ring in the hearts of His people as it did in the apostolic age. The command, "Go Evangelize," is the most important command He gave to His disciples and followers, because it has to do with the future of His kingdom. Paul and Barnabas waxed bold in speaking the Lord's command, "I have set thee for a light to the Gentiles, that thou shouldst be for salvation unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Acts: 13-47.

Christians everywhere should feel that they have the responsibility of proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ to all the world. For convenience we call one section of the world the Foreign Field, and in this department of work we seek to minister to those of other lands. Today some of these foreign nations are in great commotion and we know not what a day will bring forth; but let us keep in mind that the Lord of all power still lives and rules, and will guide amid the distressing affairs of men and nations. We have no right or authority to slacken our efforts or reduce our contributions because of these disturbances. On the other hand, if there ever was a time when the gospel of Peace and Love and Mercy needed to be emphasized more than the present, history does not record it. If Peace is restored it must be restored upon the terms of the gospel of Christ, and this gospel must be heard to be believed, and men must be sent to proclaim it in order that it may be heard. "The field is white unto the harvest, but the laborers are few." Are you praying that the Lord of the harvest send laborers into His harvest? Are you endeavoring to make it possible for them to go by supplying money with which it can be done? What does the record of our churches reveal about our interest? Are you content with what you did last year? Do you feel that you have shown a keen concern for the salvation of those who have never heard the gospel? We boast of being Missionary Baptists. Are we demonstrating that spirit to the world? The price of your

salvation and ours meant the death of our Lord, the supreme sacrifice. What are we sacrificing in order that we may show our appreciation of His Love and Mercy? He said, "If you love me you will keep my commandments," and the greatest commandment He gave, the commandment of more signifigance than all others, was, "All authority is given Me in heaven and in earth, go teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Brethern, we have no disposition to offer criticism, God forbid, but your contribution for missions last year, Foreign, Home and District, amounted to \$24.76—, 29 churches with a reported membership of 4219, just a little more than one-half cent per member. May we modestly and humbly inquire, are you satisfied with that report? We know you are not. Then let us here and now rededicate ourselves to the work of the Master. Let us place ourselves upon His altar and be willing and anxious to be used of Him for His glory. We are going to meet Him by and by, and if we merit His commendation, "well done," we are going to have to do what He commands: "Why call ye me Lord and do not the things I say?"—Humbly submitted.

# PASTORS' SUPPORT

We recommend that every pastor try to preach once or twice each year on the teaching of the Bible concerning this matter. We are sure this will help the pastor and also the members who will be blest for doing their duty. It is the duty of the pastor to teach his people to give liberally to every worthy cause. In so doing he will improve his support and also encourage and help those

causes that require some finance. We urge the members of the churches not to fail in their duty to the pastor. The Bible teaches us that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel. Let us try to make some improvement in supporting the work of the churches.—Yours in Christ,

# FRIDAY AFTERNOON

After another fine dinner the Association assembled with singing "How Firm A Foundation," followed with prayer by Elder G. O. Templeton.

The following resolution was offered by Elder A. J. Sloan:

# SPECIAL RESOLUTION

Whereas some churches bordering on the bounds of this Association are receiving members from other denominations on their alien baptism; therefore, be it resolved:

That this Association go on record as condemning the practice and that we declare non-fellowship with all churches and Associations endorsing or practicing alien baptism.

The report on Sunday Schools was read by Eld. M. H. Whitley as follows:

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We judge from the letters to the Association that Sunday Schools have not increased in number since our last meeting. Surely we are overlooking the words of the Lord Jesus Christ in Matt. 28:19, when He said: "Go teach all

nations." We believe this commission was given to the church and, if you please, we mean by church, a Missionary Baptist church, with Baptist teachers. Further we think that the word "teach" in this passage means that one should be taught repentance because the Bible says: "Repent or perish." As born-again Baptists we do not believe that signing a card is enough or that shaking hands with some preacher will meet the requirements of the Lord when He said: "Ye must be born again."

If each church would organize a Sunday School, much could be done toward carrying out the Great Commission and in heeding Solomon's words: "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

We recommend as Sunday School literature that which is published by the American Baptist Association at Texarkana, Ark.-Tex. We hope that when we meet next time, there will be a substantial increase in Sunday Schools among the churches of Wiseman Association.

We believe that every man must have knowledge to read and study the Bible before he can acceptably preach the Bible, because one must know what is in the Bible before he can tell what it says. After one has that knowledge which is imperative, let him study to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed,

rightly dividing the word of truth. And next, let him depend for wisdom upon God who giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association when assembled. Any member violating this rule shall have his name stricken from the roll of messengers, or any committee on which he may have been placed.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

#### CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethern in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10:00 o'clock a.m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox, and orderly, may be re-

ceived and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger or messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterdox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any other visiting brethern present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.
