FIRST DAY

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1940

At ten o'clock a.m. on this date Wiseman Baptist Association convened with Red Hill Baptist Church in its forty-ninth annual session. Services were opened with singing "Where the Soul Never Dies." After some remarks by the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, Brother I. P. McDonald, of Enon Association, led in prayer. Song. The report on Prohibition was read by Elder R. O. Sanders as follows:

PROHIBITION

We, your committee on Prohibition, submit the following report: There is no law governing our actions on life's pathway more binding upon us, or more important to our well being, than is the law of temperance; and there is no law the breach of which brings a surer or swifter destruction. Our prayer is, as we send forth this report, that it may cause some poor, erring sinner to come to the Saviour, who will abundantly pardon.

The devil does not hate mankind, neither does he love man; yet he is the greatest enemy of man, the enemy of God, Heaven and righteousness. The devil is an opposer of God's work, a hinderer of the Gospel. He is the father of lies. He is proud, powerful, wicked, boastful, deceitful and cruel. Matt. 4:6.

"Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Prov. 20:1. "Awake, ye drunkards; and weep and howl, ye drinkers of wine." Joel 1:5. "Woe unto them that rise up early in the morning, that they may follow strong drink; that continue until night, till wine inflame them! and the harp, and the viol, the tabret, and pipe, and wine, are in their feasts: but they regard not the work of the Lord." Isa. 5:11-12.

At its close many good songs were sung, the hand of endorsement was given Brother Sloan, and many shouted aloud for joy.

BAPTIST HOME

We have a good Baptist Orphans' Home near Camden, Tennessee, which has cared for 42 children since it was opened to receive unfortunate boys and girls who do not have fathers and mothers to care for them. The home is also open to old wornout ministers, their wives or widows. Some of these aged saints have found a refuge there.

The Home is supported by the free-will offerings of Baptist churches and individuals who want to help. We fear that we

are making only a small effort to support the Home. We urge the members of our churches to contribute regularly to the support of the Home, that the children in this institution may have food, shelter, clothing and schooling; that they be fitted and prepared for their proper places in later life. They are being taught the old-time way of salvation by the worthy superintendent, Elder J. Robert Paschal.

We urge a better support of the Home, with monthly gifts of money, clothing and food. We urge every pastor to keep this very worthy cause before his church.

The report on Missions was read by Elder W. T. Russell as follows:

MISSIONS

The great purpose of God's gift of His only Son was that all should be saved by believing on Him. Thus salvation is by grace through faith. Grace because man has never done anything to merit the forgiveness of sins but is depraved, a sinner by nature and cannot help himself. Eph. 2:3. Through faith because God gave His Son as a propitiation for our sins, who bore our sins in His own body on the tree of the cross and finished a plan of redemption for us that by faith or trust in Him we are saved from stn.

This Jesus is referred to in John 1:1 as the Word which was from the beginning and was present in the creation of all things.

In Psalm 68:11 we read that God gave the Word but great was the company that published it. So this Word must be published, people must be told of this wonderful Saviour by the gospel which Paul declares is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth. But again Paul says, Rom. 14:10-15.

"How can they call upon Him in whom they have not believed? How can they believe in Him of whom they have not heard and how can they hear without a preacher?" So men must hear the gospel. believe it to be the truth, call upon Him in prayer; and upon repenting, God grants faith to the individual to believe on the Christ.

Jesus Christ gave the great commission of preaching the gos-

pel into the hands of His Church and said: "Go! teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, etc."

In Acts 1:8 Jesus said to His church before He went away: "And ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you and ye shall be witnesses of me in Jerusalem and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth." So our scope for the spread of the gospel is to every nation and people under heaven. We cannot all preach to these heathen nations but we can have a great part in it, by taking of that that God has so wonderfully blessed us with and making it possible for the missionary upon whom God has placed the call to go and tell the lost about this wonderful Christ. We cannot go too far or pay too much to that missionary who has the cause at heart and tells the story in the old-time way as Home Missionary or Foreign.

Our report for missions for this year shows a little improvement over last year but we still have room for further improvement.

We, your committee, wish to urge everyone to consider the importance of our doing more for missions and go back to our churches and do our best to build a greater interest among our people in this great work.

Ministers are gifts of Christ Himself to the churches, Eph. 4:11. Ministers are God-made, not man-made, Paul so declared in Eph. 3:7. "I was made a minister, according to the gift of the grace of God given unto me by the effectual working of His power."

The pastor is worthy of his support while he is physically and mentally fit for burden bearing in the churches, and, when evening shadows gather, he should be able to pillow his weary head on the bosom of a grateful people and receive a comfortable support until God calls him home.

The Bible teaches us that Christ met with the people in the synagogues on the Sabbath day and stood up to read from the prophet Isaiah. He also said: "Search the Scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life; and they are they that testify of me." We recommend that every church in Wiseman Association have a Sunday School, that the members of each congregation might study the Scriptures together and learn more about God's will concerning us.

Moved to adjourn to meet on Wednesday after the third Sunday in October, 1941, with the Lafayette Baptist Church, Lafayette, Tenn. Dismissed with prayer by Elder R. O. Sanders.

Thus closed one of the greatest, and possibly the greatest, meetings in the history of this body. It seemed at times as if we were lifted up to Heaven. It was glorious to be there. David said: "What shall I render unto the Lord for all His benefits toward me?"

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association when assembled. Any member violating this rule shall have his name stricken from the roll of messengers, or any committee on which he may have been placed.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.

- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association-

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. The Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10:00 o'clock a.m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox, and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger or messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that are heterodox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any visiting brethren present to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except on subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.
