FIRST DAY FRIDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1942

At ten o'clock a. m. on this date, Wiseman Baptist Association convened in its fifty-first annual session, with the church at Siloam, two miles east of Westmoreland, Tenn. Services were opened with singing "Are You Washed In The Blood" and "Where The Soul Never Dies." After a few remarks by the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, prayer was offered by Elder R. Y. Hawkins, followed with singing "Standing On The Promises."

The Moderator read as a lesson Psalm 121, followed with prayer by Elder C. B. Massey of Enon Association. "When The Roll Is Called" was then sung.

The Moderator presented Elder F. W. Lambert, the appointee of last year, to deliver the Introductory Sermon. After a number of remarks, Brother Lambert read John 3:1-17 and chose for a text the third verse of the lesson. He used as a theme, "The New Birth," and preached a great sermon, showing that sinners had to be born again, that they must mourn on account of their sins in order to be saved, that they are saved by grace, that they are saved forever. There were many amens as he lifted the brethren up toward Heaven. At the close of the discourse, the congregation pressed forward to give the speaker the hand of endorsement and fellowship.

PLACE OF MEETING

The place of meeting next year was taken up, and Athens Church, eight miles south of Hartsville, Tennessee,

The report on Religious Literature was read by Elder C. B. Massey as follows:

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

We recommend the Independent Baptist Voice, and the Forerunner, which is a mission journal. We also recommend much reading of the Bible and other good books. We also recommend the destruction of books favoring Russellism, Rutherfordism and other damnable heresies. The Bible should be read instead of such heresy.

Teach the Bible to your children and be what you want your children to be.

The Clerk read the roll of messengers and the Rules of Decorum. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

J. W. Marsh of Enon Association was invited to a seat with us.

The report on Prohibition was read by Elder M. H. Whitley as follows:

PROHIBITION

We, your committee on Prohibition, submit the fol-

lowing report: One of as great, if not the greatest evil that we, as a people, have to face today in this temperance question. We believe also that there is no neutral ground for us to occupy, for we are either for it or we are against it. The Son of God used these words in Matt. 12:30: "He that gathereth not with Me, scattereth abroad." We, as God's people, know that strong drink is either the direct or indirect cause of more deaths, and suffering for want of food, rainment and shelter for little children than any other weapon the Devil uses to fight the cause of God, to say nothing of the tears and heartaches of the sainted mothers of the land.

We think that the churches of this Association should stand united in the fight against this evil with our motto: "We are for everything that is against liquor, and we are against everything in favor of liquor." Let us remember that God has said in His word: "Be not deceived, God is not mocked; whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." Therefore, let us use all the strength that God may give us to fight this evil, not only in our churches, but in our county, state and nation. Before we cast our vote, from the least office to the highest, let us have every reason to believe that we are voting for a person who will not support the cause of strong drink, whether in the form of whiskey, wine or beer. We give a verse of poetry from some unknown author which has had a profound effect upon the life of the writer. It is as follows:

Dare to say, No, when you are tempted to drink, Pause for a moment, my brave boy, and think; Think of the mother who bore you in pain, Think of the tears that will soon fall like rain; Think of her heart and how cruel the blow, Think of her love and at once answer, No.

hearts were made glad as we thought of the happy state of departed saints. At the close of the discourse the congregation sang while the hand of fellowship was given each other as they thanked God for the brightening hope of Heaven.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON

After another good dinner the Association came together with singing. Prayer was offered by Elder Geo. A. Gregory, followed with singing "When The Boys Come Home."

The discussion of the report on Prohibition, which was suspended for the Memorial Sermon, was resumed. Speeches were made by R. Thompson, William Overton, A. G. Stinson and others.

By motion the Clerk of the Association was authorized to write our Congressman to use his influence to have whiskey moved from our Army camps.

The report on Missions was read by Elder T. L. Blalock as follows:

MISSIONS

That the Great Commission was given to the churches, all true Baptists admit. This means that Christ gave to one institution and to one only the carrying of the Gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth. Therefore, we conclude that the world at home and abroad, is to receive the Gospel by and through the churches of Christ. It was to this end that the Holy Spirit was sent upon the church at Pentecost. Acts 1:8.

In order for the churches to carry out this commission, there are two essentials. First, every member of each church must recognize the fact that the commission was given to them as a member of the body of Christ. Second, Christ said: "All power is given unto me in Heaven and in earth." Since this is true, every member must live, act and move in union with Christ, the Head, for there abides the secret of power to carrying the Gospel. In order to make these essentials a reality in our life, the Holy Spirit is given to the churches to abide till He comes.

As to the work accomplished, 90 per cent of the population of the earth has the Bible in their own language. During the past 150 years the Bible has been translated into 1,018 languages. However, it is a fact that between

800 and 1,000 tribes or countries do not have the Bible in their own language and are practically untouched by the Gospel.

As to the work identified with Wiseman Association, there are nine foreign missionaries at present, whose names and addresses appear in the Forerunner. In addition, when we left China, we had eleven churches, five pastors, with a working force of a considerable number. We had also a prosperous Bible school. In addition we had entered 70 other towns where we had converts. Respectfully submitted.

The report on Baptist Home was read by Elder R. Thompson as follows:

BAPTIST HOME

The Scriptures teach us that a visit to the fatherless helps to constitute pure religion. We believe that this visiting may be done in different manners, but especially in the administration of financial support.

The Baptist Old Ministers and Orphans' Home at Camden, Tenn., has been, for several years, supplying a part of this need. Under the management of Eld J. Robt. Paschal, it has been caring for those who could not care for themselves. We feel that this is a worthy and necessary work, and suggest that all messengers urge their churches to take regular contributions for it. Also that at every

opportunity we visit the home, thereby keeping in close touch with the work and seeing that their needs are supplied, physically, mentally, and spiritually.

The report on Pastor's Support was read by Elder N. C. Fuqua as follows:

PASTOR'S SUPPORT

We, your committee, submit the following report: In general our pastors are poorly supported. But few are able to live, support their families and provide anything for old age, from their work as pastors or ministers. This presents a very discouraging picture when we not the drift toward younger and more active ministers. But few churches want a pastor when old age begins to creep upon him.

The Bible says: "They that preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel." "The laborer is worthy of his hire." And "Thou shalt not muzzle the mouth of the ox that treadeth out the corn." We feel that the present situation is due in part to the fact that pastors have not taught the churches their duty to support their shepherds, and to the lack of appreciation on the part of the churches toward their servants, the ministers of God. Many members seem to think the pastor should go to church as a matter of duty, regardless of any obligation on the part of the membership of the churches to support him. In other words the preacher is obligated to do his part, but there is no obligation to be met by the members themselves.

There is no man who serves a people more efficiently and more profitably than the faithful pastor. Just think of him as he comes to you in the heat of summer, the cold of winter, visits you when you are in distress, gives advice as to the better way of life, preaches the Gospel to your lost ones, baptizes them after they are saved, performs the marriage ceremonies of your loved ones, and then at the end of the way, holds the funeral services for those who are near and dear to your heart. Do you really appreciate a God-called, spirit-led man of this kind?

Surely a man who has thus served his people, as all real pastors do, should be able to face old age unafraid of being left destitute and able to face life's sunset without the dread of a needy and helpless old age. A grateful people ought to see that his life ends in peace, without worry over unpaid bills and unfilled wants and needs.

"Cast me not off in the time of old age, forsake me not when my strength faileth," has been the prayer of many preachers. We recommend that pastors try to spend more time and give more service to their churches. Also that the deacons present to the churches regularly the needs of their pastor, and their duty to support him, and that each member lay by him in store on the first day of the week as the Lord hath prospered him, and that each member see that the pastor share regularly in the bounty. The report on Ministerial Education was ready by Elder P. H. Brooks as follows:

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

This is the day of special training. More and more is the call for trained men in every walk of life. This is as it should be; for if a man is to undertake any task of importance, he should be willing to give sufficient time and study in preparation for that task. This will insure his best effort instead of failure. In the trades and professions and in the business life of the nation, it is almost universally required that those who perform these tasks shall be qualified. Almost daily the plea for trained and skilled

workmen can be heard over the radio and read in papers. This is particularly true in our national defense, and in the great building program of the nation.

Surely, if training is important in lines of work such as these and so vitally necessary to success, how much greater need is there for men who are trained in the things of God? Such men are dealing with the lives and souls of boys and girls, of men and women. The two greatest men of the Bible were Moses and Paul, both trained and fitted for their great life's work, the first in all the learning and wisdom of Egypt, and Paul being perhaps the equal and possibly the superior of any scholar of his day. Solomon said: "Teach a righteous man and he will increase in learning." We, therefore, recommend that our ministers obtain the best education possible.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the

members present.

- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfection, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of mem-
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

 $\mbox{\sc Article I.}$ This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the

Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. The Association shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock a.m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches shall be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox, and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger or messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that may be heterodox in principles or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15-17, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sitting may admit any visiting brethren present to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote on subjects except of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.
