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PROCEEDINGS OF THE FIFTY FIRST ANNUAL SESSION OF THE

WISEMAN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD WITH

ATHENS BAPTIST CHURCH FIRST DAY

Friday, October 22, 1943

On the above date Wiseman Baptist Association met in its 52nd annual session with Athens Baptist church, eight miles south of Hartsville, Tennessee, services beginning at ten o'clock a. m. The session was opened with singing "What a Friend" and "How Firm a Foundation." Prayer was offered by Brother Oakley Cook, followed with singing "How Beautiful Heaven Must Be."

After some remarks the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, read as a lesson Phil. 2:1-15, followed with prayer by Brother J. O. Brooks. "Farther Along" was then sung.

The Moderator then presented Elder R. O. Sanders, the appointee of last year, to preach the Introductory Sermon. After some remarks, Brother Sanders read as a lesson Eph. 6:1-12 and chose as a text the 11th verse of the lesson and preached an able and plain sermon in which he exhorted us to contend for and to practice the things taught and practiced by the first church. At the close of the discourse a number of songs were sung while the hand of endorsement was given the speaker.

The letters from the various churches were called for and filed with the Clerk. The Moderator read a letter of thanks from Brother J. Robert Paschal.

SECOND DAY

Saturday, October 23, 1943

The Association came together with singing "Are You Washed In The Blood," followed with prayer by Brother E. C. Watkins. Song, "I'll Live On," was then sung.

The Clerk read the roll of messengers and the Rules of Decorum.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and adopted after correction.

At this point the letters from Friendship, New Zion and Spring Creek were presented and read and their messengers seated.

The report on Religious Literature was read by Elder Hall Grime as follows:

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

There are hundreds of different kinds of religion in the world today, and more being organized all the time. However, the world has never known, and never will know, but one religion that is worth while, and that is the religion of true Christianity as exemplified and set up by the Lord Jesus Christ. The general term of religion applies to any form of any kind of worship, whether it be true or false. As true Baptists we will consider the subject as it applies to Christian literature.

The Bible is the greatest piece of literature the world will ever know. We commend it for study and meditation. All of us should know more of it than we do. Every time we read its pages, we will find something new for meditation. The greatest Bible scholars can learn something new every day they read God's word. The deplorable fact is that too many people are giving too little time to its study.

Christian periodicals and tracts are often of a great help in understanding the teachings of the Bible, provided they are written by sound Baptists. However, all of us should be careful to measure everything by the Word of God, before accepting it as truth. Acts 17:11. Also, we should know if possible the soundness and character of the men who are writing on religious subjects, as this information will often help us in interpreting their viewpoints. Very often we find teachings and practices advocated in literature put out for religious work, that are foreign to Bible teaching and Baptist practice. Such erroneous matter should be condemned in the severest terms, and eradicated as far as is humanly possible from circulation among Baptists.

We advocate therefore, the greatest possible use of GOOD

Christian literature, beginning with the Bible FIRST, in order that we may improve in wisdom and knowledge, the better to minister to mankind in the name of Christ.

The discussion of the report on Prohibition was resumed and continued by J. O. Brooks and Alfred Cook and the report then adopted.

The report on Baptist Home was called for, but the committee appointed to prepare the report was absent. The Moderator then appointed G. L. Hughes and Charlie Alexander to prepare the report and bring it before the Association later.

The report on Missions was read by Elder Ben R. Taylor

as follows:

MISSIONS

We feel that Missions, both Home and Foreign,, is in far too low a state for our people to find any joy in the present situation. Love prompts us to be missionaries, that perfect love that God had for us, John 3:16. Not the natural love that causes us to love those who love us, and also sometimes causes us to love ourselves so much that we find it hard to give to God the love He has a right to demand of us, that love which demands that the Gospel be preached to every nation. We feel that our low contributions and lack of interest are due mainly to our lack of love of God and His cause.

Brethren, let us draw nigh to God that He may draw nigh unto us. As Jonah was commanded the second time to go to Ninevah, so we feel that we are being called on by the Lord repeatedly to go preach His Gospel. Let us arise and go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, "baptizing the disciples in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." Great assurance that God will be with us is only too evident to those who have tried Him.

PASTORS' SUPPORT

We your committee, submit the following report: Inasmuch as all business must be supported, we feel that the work of the Lord, which is above all things and before all things, should be supported. God calls men to preach the Gospel and the churches make their selection and call the men of God as pastors. Most of them are poorly paid. The same God that saved the membership of the churches led the churches to call their pastors or should have. This makes their support mandatory upon the churches. We are not to look upon the pastor as a man who must be supported by charity, but as one who is worthy of the support of those to whom he is giving his time and talents.

God has made His plan for the support of His servants. He says that the laborer is worthy of his hire. Luke 10:7. Paul says: "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel."

Paul also says: "If we have sown unto you spiritual things, how great a matter is it if we also reap your carnal things." 1 Cor. 9:11. The same man of God also said: "Let everyone of you lay by him in store on the first day of the week, as God hath prospered you." And again: "Everyone as he hath purposed in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, nor of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver."

The report on Baptist Home was read by Elder G. I.. Hughes as follows:

BAPTIST HOME

The Old Ministers and Orphans' Home near Camden, Tennessee, furnishes all of us with the opportunity to practice pure and undefiled religion. James said: "Pure and undefiled religion before God is this, to visit the fatherless and the widows in their afflictions and to keep yourself unspotted from the world." Not everyone can go into all the world and preach the Gospel, but God has made it our duty to help in every way we can in spreading the Gospel. Just so it is not possible for everyone of us to visit this Home, but we can help to support and provide for the poor and the fatherless. We can do our part if we will.

We all should rally to the support of this Home, which is now being supervised by Elder Edd Cooper. The fact that it is a Baptist Home not only gives us the privilege of supporting it with our means, but we have the even greater privilege of teaching them the way of life and the doctrine of God. The Master saic: "Search the Scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life; and they are they that testify of me."

The report on Ministerial Education was read by Elder N. C. Fuqua as follows:

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

We, your committee, submit the following report:

By ministerial education we mean a proper preparation by the minister to qualify him for the great responsibility that lies before him as an under-shepherd of the flock of God.

Today there is much more expected of a minister than in years gone by because of the many changes we are facing day by day. Therefore it is a wise act for a minister to get all the literary education that is possible to better enable him to understand the teachings of the Bible, thereby better qualifying him to rightly divide the word of truth and to present that truth in an understandable manner.

Another important reason is that we are confronted today with more heresy than in any other age of the world and these parties always twist the Scriptures to suit their theories. Therefore, God's servants should be qualified to face such conditions with a laudable presentation of the true teachings of the Bible.

Solomon says in Proverbs 25:11-12: "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver. As an earring of gold and an ornament of fine gold, so is a wise reprover upon an obedient ear."

The congregation sang: "I Know I'll See Mother Again," after which Brother Sloan offered a few remarks and then read six verses from the 32nd chapter of Deuteronomy as a lesson, choosing Deut. 32:2 for a text. He preached a great sermon on the origin, perpetuity and doctrine of the church of Jesus Christ, the Baptist church, and the glory that is to follow. Brother Sloan preached a sermon of great power and some shouted aloud for joy as the speaker brought his message to a close. Many songs were sung and a hearty handshake took place amid much rejoicing.

To do this we must have the power of God, and prayer is one of the means of obtaining this special power. The church prayed with one accord just before Pentecost, and God sent His

power. Paul says in 1 Tim. 2:8: "I will, therefore, that men pray everywhere." We recommend that the messengers go back to their churches and begin a prayer meeting. This will help us to meet the present world conditions that are so unfavorable for our cause.

STATE OF RELIGION

We, your committee on State of Religion, submit the following report: It appears from the letters to the Association that the state of religion is on the decline, compared to the years gone by. We are sorry to hear of so few conversions and additions to the churches. Some of our pastors report less attendance at church this year than ever before. Christian people are going out after money, perhaps more than ever before. The goods of this life are between them and their God and the church.

No doubt our pastors and those assisting them have made a great effort to turn the lost from their evil ways, but the time has come when it seems that the hearts of the lost have been seared with a hot iron. The preacher may do his best to tell them the story of the Cross, but they turn a deaf ear as though it were an idle tale.

Matt. 7:13,14 tells us of two ways, one broad, the other narrow; one with a wide gate, the other a narrow gate. Many travel the broad way and few are in the other way. Only a few in these evil days become humble enough to get into the narrow way that leads to life.

We believe that before we can win the present world-wide conflict, religion must come to the front, the churches must awaken and we must have the help of God. There needs to be a great awakening among our people to a sense of their need of God's help and of their duty to their duty to their Maker. They ought to live closer to the standard of conduct set before us. Many are falling down in matters of orthodox teaching and practice, hurting thereby the Master's cause.

We beg each member of this body to endeavor to do his best to elevate the cause and to bring religion to the front once more and that a year hence, we may report much improvement.

- 4. That we deplore the sale and use of strong drink among our armed forces and that we go on record as being opposed to such practices.
- 5. That the Clerk have 600 copies of minutes printed and distributed among the churches according to the amount

received from each for printing fund, and that he have the remainder for his services.

- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.

- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

Constitution

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. The Association shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock a. m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches shall be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox, and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger or messengers, present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that may be heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15-17, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sitting may admit any visiting brethren present to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote on subjects except of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.
