Friday, October 20, 1944-10 A. M.

The Wiseman Baptist Association met in its fifty-third annual session with the Baptist church at Union Hill, Sumner county, Tennessee, at ten o'clock on this date. Services were opened with singing and prayer by Elder L. A. Stewart, followed by another song and the reading of the first twelve verses of the fifth chapter of Matt. Prayer by Elder C. M. Massey, followed by song. After which the Moderator, Eld. N. C. Fuqua, presented Eld. F. W. Lambert, the appointee of last year, to preach Introductory Sermon. After some remarks by Brother Lambert, he chose for a text, Eph. 1:7 and preached a great sermon on theme: "The Riches of God's Grace," And we were made to rejoice in the grace of God. At the close of the sermon the congregation pressed forward to give their hands as a token of their endorsement of the sermon, while a number of songs were being sung amid tears of joy.

SECOND DAY--MORNING SESSION Oct. 21, 1944—10:00 A. M.

Came together by singing and prayer by Eld. Cleave Meaders.

The Clerk read the roll of messengers and the Rules of Decorum.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and adopted.

The following visitors were seated: G. A. Porter, Joe Wells, L. H. Frey and R. W. Donoho.

The report on Religious Literature was read by Eld. T. L. Blalock, but the report was never turned in to the clerk, we, therefore, insert the following report:

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

This is an age of much reading and that which is read, largely determines the beliefs, opinions and teachings of our people. This being true, it becomes evident that only such literature as is sound, scripturally, should be placed in the homes of our people. We, therefore, recommend first of all the Bible, which is the inspired word of God, to the human race. Christ commanded that the Scriptures be searched; Paul told Timothy that they were able to make one wise unto salvation; also that the "man of God might be made perfect, throughly furnished unto every good work". Let's study the Bible daily and abide by its teachings.

We recommend all sound Baptist books and papers. The report was discussed by T. L. Blalock and adopted.

Report on Prohibition, was read by Eld. R. O. Sanders as follows:

REPORT ON PROHIBITION

We, your committee on prohibition, submit the following:
Prov. 2:1, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; whosoever is
deceived thereby is not wise". Surely lots of good people are deceived;
if not, we believe the people of God could get some things done about
one of the worst things that we have to contend with. We have much to
say but do little. Some don't have much to say or do but drink all they
can get and hide behind the church and get by with it.

The hour having arrived for the Memorial Sermon the regular order of business was suspended and the Moderator presented Eld. F. L. Ray to preach the sermon, as Eld. W. T. Taylor, the appointee, was not present.

Brother Ray, after some remarks, chose for text Job 14:14-15, and preached a comforting and consoling sermon for the sorrowing and broken hearted who have been bereft by the departure of earth's dearest friends. At the close a good hand shake took place amid the rejoicing of those whose hope for heaven grows brighter.

Moved to adjourn one hour for dinner. Dismissed with prayer by Eld. V. C. Harris.

SECOND DAY--AFTERNOON SESSION

After another fine dinner, came together by singing and prayer by Eld. D. C. Russell. After which the discussion of prohibition was continued by M. H. Whitley, W. W. Bowman, Oakley Cook, Jas. C. Walker, G. G. Wilson and adopted by adding the following, written by W. C. Young:

"On the 4th of November, when chill was the weather, Two ballots were cast in a box together; They nestled up close, like brother to brother, You couldn't tell one of the votes from the other. The Sunday School man; no man could be truer, Kept busy all summer denouncing the brewer; But his fevor cooled off with the change of the weather, And late in the autumn they voted together. The Sunday School man had always been noted For fighting the saloons, except when he voted; He piled up his prayers with a holy perfection And knocked them all down on the day of election. The foxy old brewer was cheerful and mellow, Said he: 'I admire that Sunday School fellow; He's true to his church, to his party he's truer, He talks for the Lord, but votes for the brewer."

The Report on Missions was read by Eld. J. H. Smith, as follows:

REPORT ON MISSIONS

We, your committee on Missions, submit the following report:

When Jesus commissioned his church he said, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost," Matt. 28:19. Since this commission was given after His agony and cruel death on the cross for us, how can any child of God be indifferent to carrying it out?

It seems that the great commission is being placed last among our Lord's commands and our church work. Christ's order is being reversed in spite of the fact that He died for us and we say we love Him. He put the lost soul first and we are putting it last. The sacrifice made by the Lord should stir the hearts of all the members of the churches of this association toward their duty to help spread the gospel of salvation to a lost world.

The churches are the institutions which the Lord has commanded to preach the gospel to all the world. So, we need to wake up and hear once more the command to go, as it comes from our Master in heaven and do our best to get the gospel to the lost of our own land and to those who know not God in heathern lands.

The report on Baptist Home was read by Eld. F. W. Lambert, as follows:

REPORT OF BAPTIST HOME

Baptist have an orphan's home near Camden, Tenn. Eld. Edd Cooper is in charge and is well suited to the work. From reports coming from West Tennessee, we doubt if a better man could be found for the place. There is a church in the home, and Bro. Cooper was their pastor before he took charge of the home. A number of the children are members of the church in the home. Here they receive good instructions, proper discipline, and are taught the Scriptures regularly. Three old misisters and about 65 children have been cared for in this institution which is open to old ministers, their wives, or widows, and orphan children.

The needs of the home are great, its support having been greatly hindered by reason of the fact it is not possible to run the truck in gathering supplies for these inmates of the home, due to the tire situation.

We recommend that every church take up a regular offering for the home, since it is being supported entirely by free-will offerings. Let us also pray that in all our undertakings, the Lord will direct.

The report on Pastor's Support was read by Eld. M. W. Whitley, as follows:

REFORT ON PASTOR'S SUPPORT

We your committee on Pastor's Support, submit the following report: We feel that many of our churches are a little slack in the support of their pastors, and we also feel that the preachers of Wiseman Association are God called men and willing at all times to preach the gospel to the best of their ability. Now let's not forget that the commission was given to the churches to preach the gospel to the world. Then it is the duty of the churches to have the gospel preached to all the world. The Son of God said in Luke 10.7, "A laborer is worthy of his hire." This being true we should see to it that our pastors are supported. Paul says those that preach the gospel should live of the gospel.

We note there has been some improvement along these lines but let's try to do better next year.

Peter said of Paul: "As also in all his epistles, speaking in them of those things; in which are some things hard to be understood, which they that are unlearned and unstable wrest, as they do also the other scriptures, unto their own destruction," II Peter, 3:16.

Our preachers, as almost never before, need a deep and thorough understanding of God's word. We believe the minister should at least know the word of God and it is well that he know how to express himself in language that will enable both the educated and the uneducated to understand his message.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We, your committee on Sunday Schools, submit the following report:

We notice from last year's report that less than one-half of our churches have Sunday Schools. We think our churches are making a sad mistake by not having a good Sunday School. The Bible teaches us to train up the child in the way it should go. We need to teach and train our children the things taught in the Bible and plant in their minds the one important thing of seeking the Lord for salvation early in life while he may be found. So we recommend a sound Sunday School in all our churches.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Bro. Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association when assembled. Any member violating this rule shall have his name stricken from the roll of messengers, or any committee on which he may have been placed.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each. All other speakers shall be limited to three speeches of five minutes each.
- Every motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh, or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appelation than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any person violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved, or such other course be taken with him as the Modorator may think proper, either at his option or the intimation of any other member.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist churches within our bounds.

CONSTITUTION (Continued)

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual letter.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. The Association shall never interfere with the independence of any church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 a.m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meeting to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches shall be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox, and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger or messengers, present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from union any church or churches that may be leterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any church except upon charges preferred by a sister church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15-17 in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sitting may admit any visiting brethern present to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote on subjects except of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the Members present.
