#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have not vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

# PROCEEDINGS

# FIRST DAY Friday, October 24, 1947

At ten o'clock on this date Wiseman Association came together in the first meeting of its 56th annual session, with the church at Long Creek, five miles west of Lafayette, Tenn. Services were opened with singing "Watching You," and "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms," followed with prayer by Elder Calvin Gregory, of Enon Association. Song, "The Promised Land," was then sung.

After a few remarks, the Moderator, Elder N. C. Fuqua, read as a lesson the 27th Psalm. Prayer was offered by Elder A. G. Stinson, followed with song, "Victory In Jesus."

The Moderator then presented Elder F. L. Ray, the appointee of last year, to preach the Introductory Sermon. He read as a lesson the first nine verses from the third chapter of Matthew and chose for a text Acts 17:30, using the theme, "Repentance." Brother Ray preached a wonderful sermon, showing the great need of true repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ, that repentance follows godly sorrow wrought in the heart. His sermon was gladly received by the people who have repented. #### Friday Afternoon

Petitionary Letters were called for and letters from Maple Grove, a newly organized church, located about two miles north of Lafayette, Tenn., and Old Union church, in Warren County, Kentucky, asked for membership in this body. Both were received and the Moderator extended to the messengers from each church the hand of fellowship. (See list of churches and messengers. Clerk.)

#### NEXT MEETING PLACE

The selection of our next meeting place and the preachers of the various special sermons was taken up. Old Union church, five miles east of Woodburn, Kentucky, was chosen to entertain the next session of the Association. Elder F. L. Ray was selected to preach the next Introductory Sermon, with Elder W. T. Russell as alternate. Elder F. W. Lambert was the choice of the Association to preach the next Memorial Sermon, with Elder W. T. Russell as alternate. Elder A. J. Sloan was chosen to deliver the next Doctrinal Sermon, with Elder W. T. Russell as alternate.

Committee composed of Elder W. T. Russell, Elder James C. Walker and Elder P. H. Brooks

Homes were next assigned to messengers and visitors.

Moved to adjourn to meet at nine thirty o'clock on the morrow. Dismissed with prayer by Elder L. C. Curtis.

#### SECOND DAY Saturday, October 25, 1947

The Association came together at nine thirty o'clock, with singing "Victory In Jesus," and "Are You Washed In The Blood?" The Assistant Moderator, Elder A. J. Sloan, read the 1st Psalm, after which Elder Murl Ellis led in prayer.

The Clerk read the Rules of Decorum and the roll of messengers. The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

The report on Missions was read by Elder James C. Walker as follows:

#### **MISSIONS**

There should be no doubt in the mind of any true Baptist but that doing mission work is one of the greatest works of the churches. It is the life of the great Commission, as given by Jesus to His church. Whether done locally, nationally or in foreign lands, it is the same great work.

Since the first Baptist preacher was a man "sent from God, he was therefore, a missionary. The Head of the church, our Lord Jesus Christ, was a missionary because His Father sent Him from Heaven on a mission. To be true churches of His, we must be missionary, for Jesus said: "As thou has sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world."

As your Commmittee, we suggest that our efforts for the present be concentrated on destitute home fields; and, meanwhile, pray the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest. Perhaps He will call some of our own, in whom we fully trust as saved ministers, into the various fields of service.

#### MEMORIAL SERMON

(Clerk's Note. The record from this point until noon was kept by the Assistant Clerk and the comments on the sermon are his and not the Clerk's).

At this time it was moved to suspend the regular Order of Business and give way to Elder F. W. Lambert, the appointee of a year ago, to preach the annual Memorial Sermon. After the congregation sang "If I Could Hear My Mother Pray Again," the Assistant Moderator, Elder A. J. Sloan, offered a few remarks and then presented Elder F. W. Lambert to preach the Memorial Sermon. Brother Lambert read eight verses from Revelation 21st chapter, and chose for a text, Phil. 1:21, "To die is gain." Brother Lambert, with much power, displayed to his hearers the things that our friends and loved ones, who have been called away since our meeting a year ago, have gained, as well as the smallness of the things they lost in death. #### SUNDAY SCHOOL AND RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

We, your Committee, make the following report: We find that last year less than half of the churches of this organization reported any Sunday School whatever. This is a deplorable state and one that should be remedied. Through our Sunday Schools we are permitted to teach our young children the things that "become sound doctrine." Not only does this permit our children to be so instructed, but we are persuaded that many of our adults could well profit by the instruction gained in Sunday School. We feel that if more parents were sound doctrinally, they would see the need of Sunday Schools and would put forth enough efforts to get a Sunday School going and would then support same.

Sunday Schools give us the opportunity of getting in on the ground floor and teaching our people and of presenting to them good religious literature. We believe that sound religious literature in the hands of our people will enable them to combat the heresies of this evil world and prepare us for the fight of tomorrow.

#### **OBITUARIES**

From the letters from the churches that compose this body, we learn that 38 of our beloved brethren and sisters have gone from us during the past twelve months. We are saddened by their absence from our Association, our churches and specially from our homes and firesides. Today we listen for voices that are hushed in the long silence of death, we look for dear forms that we know we shall see no more in the flesh, we behold their vacant seats and in our hearts, there is a terrible yearning to see them again and be at home in a better world, but we must submit to the will of God who makes no mistakes and does all things well.

We ought to measure the death of our dear ones in what it means to them, rather than what their absence means to us who live. We should submerge our loneliness and sorrow into the great ocean of their joys and happiness until we could feel that we would not bring them back even if we had that power. It is ruining many of our young people, who have been told that there is no harm in drinking. We, as ministers of God and His people in general, should always be ready to tell our people what God's word says about this evil, and strive to show our people where it will lead them. Wine and liquor have brought us to the shameful situation of living in a land where there is scarcely a decent place for our young people to go except to church. Liquor confronts the youth of today until he is beset by strong drink on almost every hand. Drinking and profanity are so common today that many of us have lost our former horror of such evils. But sin looks just as bad to God as it did in the beginning.

The liquor traffic is wrecking the American home today. Let

us as God's people, pray and be ready to back our prayers with action as we face this evil that has sunk most of the nations of the past. Truly we are in great danger.

#### DOCTRINAL SERMON

The Home is in the hands of Brother Edd Cooper, who, we believe, is sound in the faith and in the teaching of God's word. This is the report brought back from the Home by those who have visited this institution. Our recommendation is that all our churches take a regular offering each month for the Home. We urge all the messengers to go back to their respective churches and place this matter before every congregation in Wiseman Association, urging every member to contribute regularly to this worthy cause.

#### CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator, giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII: The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except upon charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except upon subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.



ELDER G. L. HUGHES

Goldie Lathan Hughes was born on August 28, 1894 and died suddenly on June 17, 1947, aged nearly 53 years. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Pernie White Hughes; two daughters, Mrs. Della Pipkin and Mrs. Lula Belle Cox; his 94-year-old mother, Mrs. Harriet Krantz; four brothers and two sisters.

He was converted at the age of 19 years and united with New Zion Baptist church, near Lafayette, Tenn., on August 13, 1919 Later he was ordained by the same church by a council composed of a large number of deacons and ministers. When a young man, he was converted at Bradley's Creek church in Rutherford County, and was baptized by Elder Geo. A. Ogle.

At an early time in his Christian life, he was impressed with the work of the ministry and was later ordained by the church at Cedar Bluff, near Lafayette, his ordination taking place about 40 years ago. Later he served as pastor of Spring Creek, Rocky Mound, Antioch and perhaps other churches. He was possessed of good talent and was well informed as a minister.
