RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any other appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS FIRST DAY

Wednesday, October 24, 1951

At ten o'clock on this date Wiseman Baptist Association came together in the opening meeting of its 60th annual session, with the church at Rocky Mound, five miles northeast of Westmoreland, Tennessee.

Services were opened with singing "Victory In Jesus," which was followed with the reading of a Scripture lesson, the 133rd Psalm, by the Moderator, Elder F. L. Ray. Prayer was then offered by Elder N. C. Fuqua, after which the congregation sang "Some Day." The Moderator presented Elder M. R. Drury, the appointee of last year, to preach the Introductory Sermon. He offered a few remarks and read as a lesson part of the seventh chapter of Hebrews, and chose for a text the 25th verse of the chapter from which he read his lesson. Brother Drury preached a wonderful sermon on the "Security of The Saints," using many Scriptures on the inward and outer man, showing that there are two separate men, and the man that has been born of God is the inward man, and will live with God forever in glory some day.

His discourse was received with gladness by his hearers. Many amens were heard during the preaching of this good sermon. At the close of the discourse, the congregation pressed forward and gave the hand of endorsement to the speaker, while they sang "How Firm a Foundation," "Amazing Grace" and "Old Time Religion."

The report on Sunday Schools was read by Elder James C. Walker as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Our records show that the number of Sunday Schools in our Association has steadily grown over a period of years. We appreciate this fact and hope that it will continue to be so. There is yet a great need for improvement along this line, as approximately one third of our churches are yet without a Sun-

There are two extreme views about a Sunday School. One is for a church not to have any at all, and the other is for the Sunday School to run the business that should be carried on by

the church. A church should not go to either extreme.

We should not send our children to Sunday School, but we should carry them. It is good for young and old alike as we never get to old to learn. We should also be careful to see that the literature that is used is sound in doctrine.

As your committee, we urge that the pastors and messengers try to encourage every church to conduct a sound and regular Sunday School.

At this point the letter from Good Will, which had been delayed, was presented, and was read by the Clerk.

The report on Missions and a letter from our beloved missionary, Elder J. H. Smith, now in Japan, were read by Elder William B. Birdwell as follows:

MISSIONS

God calls, commands, empowers and sends forth messengers to bear the truth to all nations. We believe that only such as are thus made God's ambassadors can ever preach the Gospel of the saving Christ. God calls and commands many, empowers and sends forth those that are faithful and obedient. The true churches of our Lord have been entrusted with the Gospel and are commanded to spread it all over the world.

The purpose of God for His churches is evident among us. Within the 41 churches of the Association in 1950, there were 110 ministers, listed by the minutes as 37 licensed and 73 ordained to the work of the ministry by the various churches. Twenty-seven of those ordained served churches in the Association. Of the other 83, several serve in other places, and some are striving to fill special missions to which God has called them. Yet account should be given for all, as God has called so many from among us. Surely there is a great work to be done for Him by those who hold to the faith as delivered to the saints.

May God grant more power to His churches, and specially to those men that have been called into the ministry. The Holy Spirit spoke to the church at Antioch and said, "Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them." Acts. 13:2. May He also speak unto our churches that they set apart for special missionary work, those that He calls. There are fields white unto harvest all around us and beyond the seas. Many have not heard of the Saviour who offers for-giveness of sins and life eternal. Many more have heard only teachers who pervert the word of God and teach heresies. With the spread of Modernism, Formalism and every other substitute for the true words of life, there is a great need for holding high the Christ of Calvary's cross, and preaching God's message of repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ, that men might know the way of life eternal.

We are made to give thanks to God for the call to some among us, and for their going forth into fields both far and near. Our hearts are also made glad to hear of the response of the churches to those who have dared to go. May there yet be a greater awakening among us.

Brother Smith's letter is as follows:

REPORT OF ELDER J. H. SMITH

MISSIONS

One of the great subjects of the Bible is missions. The Lord Jesus commanded His church to go into all the world with the glorious message of the Gospel. Matthew 28:19, Luke 24: 47, Mark 16:15.

All the human race is inclined to worship something. Such a nature is in man's constitution, but how can one know who is the true object of worship unless he is told? Paul said, "How shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard?" Romans 10:14. As I pen down these few lines I can hear the beating of a drum in a Shinto shrine; someone is worshipping his god, but it is a god which can not give life nor peace to the soul. There are millions in the world today who haven't heard the good news about our Christ and about His great power to save.

We are debtors to all men, Romans 1:14; and the way for us to pay that debt is to send them the Gospel, which is the power of God unto salvatin to everyone that believeth. Romans 1:16. We have the truth without mixture of error, and this truth was committed to the trust of the Church; therefore, the churches are the authority for the spread of the Gospel, and the administering of the ordinances. Paul and Barnabas were sent out direct from the church at Antioch, and they returned and made their report to the same church. This is the Bible plan to do missions, and these are the principles for which I stand. This plan requires faith and patience; but, if we endure our trials and hold on to our faith, we can experience the working of the mighty power of God. We have found this to be true in our own experiences. When we left our home last November. we didn't know what would befall us when we reached our field nor did we know how things would be for us when we entered the land of the Rising Sun. But with faith in God we started on our journey, and bless God, there hasn't been an hour too dark but what He has shone light in the way. He has solved our problems and supplied our needs, and so here we are in the middle of Japan where there are millions in darkness. My heart is heavy for the heathen, who need the Gospel above all things else.

God has made it possible for us to have work to do while we are learning the language. I have had regular work since we came to Hiroshima last spring. During the summer, God converted the heart of a young Japanese boy, who has a good knowledge of English; and he is interpreting for us. So our needs have been supplied along this line. I am trying to teach him some of the doctrines of the Bible so he will be a strong Baptist. I am praying that God will call him into the ministry and make a soul winner out of him.

We still have our services in our home on Sunday nights, and there seems to be conviction in the hearts of those who are attending. I know God worked things out for us to settle down here in this city and I believe He will make it possible for us to establish a permanent work here; but, of course, we can't tell just what is going to happen in Japan. God only knows; I don't. We will have to leave everything in the hands of Him. It seems that there is a trend back toward Shinto and Buddhism; we can tell the difference in recent weeks, the Buddhist and Shintos are working harder and harder. I feel if Japan does not receive the Gospel this time, dreadful will be the consequences. Please pray that there will be a great turning to our Lord Jesus Christ in Japan. In addition to my work here in our home on Sundays, I teach the Bible in one of the schools in the Eastern

part of Hiroshima. I enjoy my work there immensely, and there seems to be a good interest among the students.

I pray that Wiseman Association will have a great session and that harmony will prevail throughout the meeting.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

After a good dinner the Association came together with singing "Some Day," followed with prayer by Elder John Patter-

son. "The Unclouded Day" was then sung.

The regular Order of Business was taken up. The subject of Missions was given further consideration, with speeches by W. T. Taylor, Alfred Cook, F. W. Lambert, M. R. Drury, J. E. McDonald, F. L. Ray, A. G. Stinson, W T. Russell and H. C. Vanderpool, and then adopted.

The Order of Business was suspended at this point and the report on Old Ministers and Orphans' Home was read by Supt.

L. D. Fishburn as follows:

OLD MINISTERS AND ORPHANS' HOME

We, your Committee, submit the following report: We have ten children in the Home, ranging in age from six to eighteen years. We believe these children should claim the attention of every Baptist in Wiseman Association. We love our own children, but these children do not have father or mother to love them and to provide for them. We love these children, and they are close to our hearts. We are doing our best to comfort them, and also to see that they are taught the old-time Gospel.

We have driven a number of miles to several Missionary Baptist churches for the benefit of the children. We have been in several revivals this fall. Two of the children claim a hope, and five have been seeking the Lord. We wish to ask an interest in the prayers of every child of God for these children. Three are not accountable, we would judge.

We want you to speak a word of encouragement to the children. We would be glad if every church would visit the Home, which is located near Lafayette, Tenn., as soon as you can

TEMPERANCE AND MORALITY

We, your committee, submit the following report: It seems by observation that this is one of the greatest hindrances to the cause. Our moral standard, as a whole in this country of ours, seems very low. This should not be true, specially among Christians and church members. There is no excuse for it. We need to heed the words of God.

We fear that many of our Baptist people, as well as others, are committing immoral acts, which are disgraceful and disgusting. Indecent dressing is among these, and going to places where Christians should not go is another.

Many Christians, church members and some Baptists think that there is no harm in taking a dram. We feel that a dram drinker is worse than a drunkard, for no one wants to be a drunkard. A dram drinker may cause people to think they can be good Christians and yet take a drink. They are the kind who lead most of the young people astray, and hinder the results of the efforts that others make. Sinners will hide behind the weakest church members.

Hear the Scriptures: Prov. 23:29-32—"Who hath woe? Who hath sorrow? Who hath contentions? Who hath babbling? Who hath wounds without cause? Who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry long at the wine; they that go to seek mixed wine. Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth his color in the cup, when it moveth itself aright. At last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder."

Prov. 20:1—"Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise."

May God help us as Baptists to condemn these immoral acts and to live soberly and godly in this present evil world.

We have in our churches a great number who, as Paul said, "Ought to be teachers, but have need to be taught." The Catholics say: "Give us a child until he is ten years of age, and he will always be a Catholic." Your committee believes that what is placed in the mind of the child before the age of ten will be a foundation for his life.

As your District Missionary, I submit the following report: Churches visited and preached to, 14, as follows: Allon's Chapel, Caney Fork, Dixon's Creek, East Main Street, Fairview, No. 2, Fellowship, Good Will, La Guardia, McFerrin, New Bethel, New Salem, Pleasant Hill, No. 1, Siloam and White Hill.

I have been in six revivals. They were as follows: Fellowship church in Overton County, two saved; tent revival at Gordonsville in Smith County, no visible results; Allon's Chapel, in Overton County, four saved; tent revival at Millersville, in Sumner County, no visible results; in a rented building in Woodburn, Kentucky, seven conversions; and since that time, a church, Fairview, No. 2, has been organized at that place and is under the care of its good pastor, Elder L. W. Smith. Since the formation of this church, I have assisted in another revival with two conversions. The total conversions were 15.

Sermons preached, 84; hospital visits, four—Madison Sanitarium, at Madison; Vanderbilt and Mid-State Baptist Hospitals, at Nashville; and McFarland Hospital, at Lebanon. Many homes were visited where there were sick people. Also talked with many sinners in a personal way about their souls.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association. Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers. Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such place as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be mission-

ary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings may admit any visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except upon subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present. Article XVI. That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a unanimous vote of messengers present.

BY-LAWS AND RULES OF DECORUM OF THE BAPTIST OLD MINISTERS AND ORPHANS' HOME, LAFAYETTE, TENNESSEE

Article 1.—Object and purpose. Section 1. The object of this Institution is to care for and support aged ministers, ministers' wives, dependent widows of ministers, and orphan and half orphan children. To effect this benevolent design the management of this Institution shall accept donations and shall hold and administer property thus acquired according to the expressed wish of the donors, when such wishes are not inconsistent with the regulations of the Institution. When no specific wish is expressed by the donors, the funds and property given shall be hold and administered according to the manufacture of the Home held and administered according to the regulations of the Home. Donations and bequeaths, with the view of becoming permanent

investments, shall be securely guarded, and shall be used only for such purposes as may be indicated by the donor.

Section 2. Orphan children of either sex of the white race may be admitted into this Institution, and shall be retained, not only with the view of giving them comfortable support, but further, of according them such literary, industrial, vocational and Christian training as will fit them for self support and good citizenship.

Article 2.—Reception of children, aged ministers, ministers'

wives and widows of ministers.

Section 1. It shall be the policy of the Home to receive destitute children when orphans or half orphans.

Section 2. The religious faith of parentage of children applying for admission into the Home shall not be considered as a bar to their admission into this Institution.

Section 3. No child abnormal in body or mind shall be ad-

mitted into the Home as an inmate.

Section 4. No child shall be brought to the Home until after due notice that the application has been accepted, has been received by those in charge of such a child. All children approved by the management of the Home, to enter the Home, must be de-livered to the Home free of cost to the Institution.

Section 5. No child over fourteen years of age will be received into the Home, and those under two years old will be left

to the discretion of the Superintendent and Matron.

Section 6. No child shall be received into the Home except by legal consignment, acknowledged before a notary public by the legal custodian of the child, and in all regular instances, the application for admission into Home must be indorsed by a Missionary Baptist Church that will certify personal knowledge of conditions and worthiness of the applicant, except when applicant is known personally to the management of the Home.

Section 7. Such destitute, ordained ministers, ministers' wives

or widows, who are not abnormal in body or mind, as are properly recommended by a Missionary Baptist Church, or personally known by the management to be worthy applicants, may be received into

the Home. Article 3.-Children going out of the Home.

Section 1. Eighteen years shall be the age limit to the residence of a child in the Home. It shall be the policy of the Home to keep in touch with, and to advise and assist in all helpful ways. those who go out from the Institution to seek a higher education or to enter business. No child shall be dismissed from the Home at the age limit until some definite place of abode and work are secured.

Section 2. It shall be the practice of the Home not to engage in the practice of having children adopted, but to keep them in the Home until they are able to provide a livelihood for themselves.

Article 4.—Board of Managers.

Section 1. The Managers shall consist of nine Trustees.

Section 2. The Prustees shall be chosen from the various churches composing the Southwestern District Baptist Association. Enon Baptist Association and Wiseman Baptist Association, and

Enon Baptist Association and Wiseman Baptist Association, and shall serve indefinitely.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees must always consist of members who are SOUND and FAITHFUL supporters of the TRUF Doctrine and practice of the Direct Missionary Baptists.

Section 4. Should a vacancy occur in the Board of Trustees, the remaining Trustees may select a member to fill such vacancy. Article 5.—Meetings, Quorum.

Section 1. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be annual, special and called. The first Thursday in November shall be a permanent, fixed date for the annual stated meeting of the Trustees.

Section 2. Special meetings shall be held at the place and at the time agreed upon by the Chairman, and six members shall constitute a Quorum. It shall require a majority of the Board of Trustees to constitute a quorum for the purpose of the purchase

or the selling of property.

Section 3. The Chairman of the Board of Managers may call a meeting at any time as necessity may demand, and six shall constitute a quorum, such meetings to be at any place convenient.

Article 6.—Election of Officers.

Section 1. The Board of Trustees shall annually elect from their number a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and also a Superintendent, but who is not required to be one of their number. When agreeable with the Trustees, and the Superintendent, the Superintendent shall be the Matron of the Home also. The wife of the Superintendent shall be the Matron of the Home. In case of death or resignation on the part of any one of the Trustees, a successor to fill such a vacancy shall be selected by the remaining Trustees. Should any member of the Board of Trustees become disloyal or prove to be unsound in the faith, the remaining members shall call for his resignation, and if necessary, they may dealers his place vacent by a majority yets of the rethey may declare his place vacant by a majority vote of the remaining members and select his successor immediately.

Section 2. Should either the Superintendent or the Matron become disloyal to the regulations of the Home, or should they prove to be untrue to the faith of Direct Missionary Baptists, it shall be the duty of the Board of Trustees to call for their resignation, and if necessary, they may declare their place vacant by a majority vote of the Trustees, and select their successors immediately.

Article 7.—The Chairman.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to attend and preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, and perform all other such duties as his office requires. In the absence of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall perform all the duties of the Chair-

ļ

man. The Chairman or the Vice-Chairman shall give notice of all meetings.

Article 8.—The Secretary.

Section 1. The Secretary shall keep in a well-bound volume a correct record of all the proceedings of the Board of Trustees. He shall preserve all papers committed to his charge. At the terminal preserve all papers is to his charge. nation of his office, he shall deliver to his successor all books, records, and papers pertaining to his office. In the absence of the Secretary, the Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the

Article 9.—The Treasurer.
Section 1. The Treasurer, who may or who may not be the Superintendent, shall keep a full and complete record of all properties, such as deeds, evidences of debt, and moneys belonging to the Institution. He shall keep in a well-bound volume accurate and detailed accounts of all moneys and property received by him and of his disbursements and investments; and at each annual meeting, and oftener, if required, make a detailed report of his transactions. He shall report to the Board of Trustees at each meeting the aggregate receipts and itemized list of his disbursements since the previous meeting of the Board of Trustees. His books shall be audited at least once a year. The condition of the bond shall be for the honest and faithful discharge of his office.

Section 2. All money, or property, belonging to the Institution, and in the custody of the Treasurer, may be kept by him in such bank or banks as the Board of Trustees may designate. At the close of his term he shall turn over to his successor all books and records pertaining to his office, and all money, other property, deeds, etc., belonging to the Institution.

Article 10.—The Superintendent. Section 1. The Old Ministers and Orphans' Home shall be under the supervision and management of a general officer to be called the Superintendent of the Home.

Section 2. He shall reside at or in close proximity to the Home as the Trustees may provide.

Section 3. He shall have charge of all buildings, furniture and other such property belonging to the Institution, and shall use care and diligence in preserving the same from injury or loss. He shall, with the Trustees, have charge of the construction of all improvements directed to be made.

Section 4. He shall, with the approval of the Trustees, have power to select and appoint all necessary employees of the Institution, and to prescribe their duties, and to dismiss the same for valid cause, provided no office shall be created by him.

Section 5. He may, with the concurrence of the Trustees, receive into the Institution such applicants as the regulations embrace within the scope of its benefactions.

Section 6. He shall, as far as practical, keep a correct record of the names, ages, parentage, etc., of the inmates received into the Home and the localities from which they come and the day of their admission and removal.

Section 7. As it is the design of this Institution to provide, for those who come under its care, a plain and substantial main-tenance under conditions favorable to their health and happiness and the growth of children, it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to observe such watchful supervision over their diet, clothing, exercise, and the general sanitary needs of the Institution as may be necessary to these ends.

As it is the object of this Institution to afford all the influence and impress of a Christian home, the Superintendent will be expected to observe and maintain such regulations and standards in the daily life of the household as will be most conducive to these ends. Regularity, promptness, and system in the daily life of the inmates should be prime requisites, and respect for authority, obedience to regulations, reverence for character and for sacred institutions of all kinds, should be enjoined and made allpersuasive principles of the Institution. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to afford the inmates the best religious privileges, and as far as possible to lead the children to become Christians, and in a general way teach them the Bible.

Section 9. As it is the object of this Institution to send forth such children as may be committed to its care, prepared for self-support and independence in life, and to become useful members of society, it shall be the aim and endeavor of the Superintendent that they may be taught in the elementary branches of literature and to see that the children are trained to various arts of industry, as their ages, capacities, and facilities provided by the cooperation of the Trustees, may justify.

Section 10. He shall report from time to time to the Trustees as to the conditions and needs of the Home, and shall encourage such cooperation and assistance in the responsible duties of his office as they may be able to give. At the close of each associational year he shall submit a general report in writing, which shall be laid before the Trustees, and read at the Southwestern District Baptist Association, the Enon Baptist Association and the Wiseman Baptist Association.

Article 11.—Religious Faith of Employees.

Section 1. The Superintendent, all matrons, housekeepers, teachers and other administrative employees of the Home must be members, in good standing, of Missionary Baptist Churches of the Direct Missionary Baptist faith.

Article 12.—Amendments.

Section 1. No amendments to the above By-Laws that shall have a tendency to deviate from the faith and practice of Direct Missionary Baptist, shall ever be made by any group including the messengers of the Southwestern District Baptist Association, the Enon Baptist Association and the Wiseman Baptist Association.

Section 2. No further By-Laws shall be written, nor shall the above By-Laws be amended until authorized by a two-third majority vote of the Messengers in regular annual session of the Southwestern District Baptist Association, the Enon Baptist Association and the Wiseman Baptist Association, and such authorization must not conflict with the regular faith and practices of Direct Missionary Baptists. (Printer's note. This article or section was inadvertently overlooked in the printing of the minutes of a year ago, and such oversight was wholly unintentional, and was not discovered for months afterward.)
