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RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS FIRST DAY

Wednesday, October 22, 1952

At ten o'clock A. M., on this date Wiseman Baptist Association came together in the opening meeting of its sixty-first annual session, with the East Main Street Baptist church, in Hartsville, Tenn. Services were opened with singing "Hallelujah, We Shall Rise," followed with prayer by Eder C. B. Massey, Moderator of Enon Baptist Association. The Moderator of Wiseman, Elder F. L. Ray, read as a lesson, the first 15 verses of the 15th chapter of Acts of the Apostles. This was followed with singing "Some Day."

After a few remarks the Moderator presented Elder Albert Crouch, the appointee of last year, to preach the Introductory Sermon. Brother Crouch read as a lesson the fifth chapter of Revelation; and, after a number of remarks, he chose as α text the 9th verse of the chapter from which he had just read his lesson. Brother Crouch preached a wonderful sermon on "God's Lamb," in the person of Jesus Christ offered to this lost world. He showed how our own righteousness could not stand, and that people were saved through the righteousness of another, who is Christ. He gave many Scriptures on the way of salvation, and also pointed out the many wrong ways now offered to the lost by false teachers. His discourse was well received by his many hearers, with many "Amens" heard during the preaching of this good sermon. At the close of the discourse, the congregation pressed forward and gave the hand of endorsement and appreciation to the speaker, while they Yes, I Know I Have Been Redeemed," "Old-Time Resang, "Yes, I Know I Have Been Redeemed," "Old-Time Religion," "Amazing Grace" and "Victory In Jesus." After remarks by a number of his listeners, the congregation then sang "How Firm A Foundation," while a collection for our former Moderator and also our Clerk for a number of years, Elder A. J. Sloan, now in feeble health, was taken up, amounting to \$139.65. He offered his thanks for the nice contribution in α touching speech.

The Moderator called for the letters from the various churches and appointed Elder J. E. McDonald and Elder C. D. Barton as Reading Clerks. After a part of the letters had been read, it was moved to adjourn one hour for dinner. After announcements, the benediction was offered by Elder W. R. Overton.

NEXT MEETING PLACE

The regular Order of Business was taken up.

The report on Missions and a good letter and financial report from our beloved missionary, Elder J. H. Smith, were read by Elder Lloyd Fishburn. It was also agreed that both the report and the letter should appear in the Minutes. They are as follows:

MISSIONS

We, your Committee, submit the following report: We feel that our churches are failing to carry out the Great Commission, both at home and abroad. Jesus said: "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." This is our authority for doing mission work, which was given to the church of the Lord Jesus Christ, and it is still in her hands today. The responsibility of spreading the Gospel rests upon the church.

We have a great opportunity today to be missionaries in spirit, both at home and abroad. We have on the foreign field, Brother J. Henry Smith, a man worthy of our support, who was sent out by a church of this Association and also endorsed by this body. Great questions that concern many today in the matter of missions are: "How to do Mission work," and "Where to send the Gospel." To these question we would say, "Let it be done directly and by the authority of the church of our Lord Jesus Christ." Our churches need a missionary spirit, so that they will get behind the man that is preaching the Gopel of the Lord Jesus Christ, whether at home or abroad.

We have a wonderful opportunity to spread the Gospel

today at home by means of radio, which we feel is a good way to do Home Mission work. Through mission work many have been saved, and churches have been organized. We would today be in heathenism had it not been for those who in the years gone by were mission minded. May our churches have a greater spirit of Missions next year, and do more to make disciples than ever before in the past.

The letter and financial report from Brother Smith are as follows:

BROTHER SMITH'S LETTER

397 Koi Naka Machi Hiroshima, Japan September 30, 1952

To The Wiseman Baptist Association Greeting:

I write this with a prayer on my heart that you will have a wonderful fellowship together and a good time in the Lord, as you meet for the three-day session. I feel rather lonely today while writing these few lines, but still I am not alone; there is an all-seeing eye watching, and He understands. It would be a great treat for me to be with you and clasp your hands and enjoy the sweet fellowship which we have had in the past; but, as it can't be, I shall pray for a successful meeting. Right now I would like to hear that great Baptist body singing that grand old song, "We'll Go On And Serve The Lord." The words of this old song have been the Baptist motto down through the years. Amid all the storms and strife, the watchword has been "We'll go on and serve the Lord."

It seems that the storm clouds are rising and growing darker and darker. Where is our hope? Where is our comfort? Is it not in Him who said, "It is I, be not afraid?" Matthew 14:27.

Our work is still making some progress under the blessings of the Lord; and, of course it is only through Him that our work meets with any success. So unto Him all honor belongs. "Not by might, not by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord." Zechariah 4:6. Our flesh will fail and all the works of man will vanish from the earth but the works of the Lord will endure forever. Bless His great name!

The Lord has given us a little Baptist church here through our weak efforts; and though it is small in number, yet we feel that it is the planting of the Lord. We organized it the 27th of last July with eight members and have had one addition since the organization. We meet once a week on Sunday morning

here in our house for service, and we have a Sunday School for the children preceding our regular church meeting. I have one service a week at a girls' reform school in a little village about five miles from Hiroshima. In this school there are eightyfour girls at the present, and each time I go there to preach, the officials of the school have all the girls assemble to hear my preaching. A goodly number of the girls seem to be under deep conviction of sin, and I feel very much impressed with the work there. I still have my Bible class at Hijiyama High School which I have reported before, and which I am holding twice a week. In addition to the work mentioned above, I have been doing some house to house preaching, and have given out quite a number of Bibles while going from house to house and in public places. And, of course, I am still studying the language almost every day, for four or five hours each day. I am using the language on a limited scale in my preaching now.

We request that the churches remember us in prayer; and while the Association is in session, will you pleae pray a special prayer tor me, my wife and Brother Carr? This work is slow and it surely requires patience and a lot of the grace of God. Christianity is on the decline in Japan and has been, specially for the last six months. Let's pray that the tide will soon turn. My heart is heavy for the heathen who are in darkness indescribable. Heathenism feeds on superstition, to a great extent, and the people live in great fear that the gods have become angry when they suffer some misfortune. How pitiful! God have mercy and send more of His servants to tell them about Jesus.

The report on Sunday Schools was read by Elder Howard G. Taylor as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Every church member should be interested in Sunday Schools. This institution has had a great influence on children. How often have we heard a Christian experience in which we were told of the influence of a good father and mother, who took their children to Sunday School! They soon learned enough of the Bible and Christ to know themselves to be unsaved and in need of God.

Your committee feels that God will hold every father and mother responsible for their children, as to how they are reared. We believe that many of our young Christian boys and girls would be better workers for the Lord if father and mother would see that their children had a good Sunday School to attend, in connection with church attendance.

Every church should have a Sunday School, which would not be for the children only, but for adults as well. There is no better way to grow than to study the word of the Lord. Too many people today are letting someone else read the Bible for them. We should read and study the Bible for ourselves. We would suggest that every messenger and every church member work to have a good Sunday School in every church.

The report on Temperance and Morality was read by Elder I. Hall Grime as follows:

TEMPERANCE AND MORALITY

In discussing this subject before Wiseman Association, we shall consider it as applying to Christians, and more especially to members of Baptist churches. The Apostle Paul tells us in Col. 3:1 and 2, "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above. . . Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth." If all of God's children would adhere honestly to this admonition, we would avoid many of the pitalls into which the Lord's churches and children are constantly falling, and which make so many of them stumbling blocks in the way of others. There is no excuse that can be offered when an accusing finger is pointed at a professed child of God, and it can be truthfully said that he is living in a manner, and conducting himself in such a way, that he cannot be distinguished from the sinners of the world. In the 15th chapter of the Gospel of John, Jesus taught His followers that even though they were in the world, they were not of the world.

In the discussion of Temperance, the thought usually turns to drunkenness, and the use in general of all types of intoxicating drinks and drugs. There are a number of drugs, usually referred to as dope, which are even more deadly in their effects on the users, and incite the addicts to even greater crimes than the use of intoxicants. There is no crime imaginable to the ingenuity of a man, that has not been repeated over and over, as the direct result of the use of drugs and intoxicants. If the user alone were the only casualty, that would be appalling enough; but when we consider the millions of innocent lives, many of them defenseless little ones, who are made to suffer untold agonies and hardships, it staggers our imagination. The Bible is filled with the strongest denunciation of this evil, both in the Old and New Testaments, and is replete with examples of the evil brought on by these excesses to both God's children, and those of the world.

But the subject of morality embraces much more than the mere abstinence from intoxicants. The Apostle Paul tells us in Col. 3:5, 8 and 9—"Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry; . . . But now ye also put off all these; anger, wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth. Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds." The Apostle further lists the works of the flesh in Gal. 5:19-21 as follows: "Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like." Another fault of many professed Christians is their dishonesty. Paul said in Romans 12:17, "Provide things honest in the sight of all men." The churches have a great responsibility in helping to keep their membership in the paths of rectitude and right. If the churches would demand, and enforce the right kind of conduct among all their members, they would be in position to wield a far greater influence for good over the outside world, and many more would no doubt be brought to a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ. Above all, the pastors and ministers whom God has called, should give diligent heed to the words of the Apostle Peter in I Peter, 5:3 to be "ensamples to the flock," that they may never bring disgrace and degradation upon the highest of all Divine callings, by being guilty of dishonest and immoral conduct. May all of our lives be filled with the fruit of the Spirit, as listed by Paul, the Apostle, in Gal. 5:22-23, as "Love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance." "If we live in the spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit." Gal. 5:25.

DOCTRINAL SERMON

The hour having arrived for the preaching of the Doctrinal Sermon, the regular Order of Business was suspended and the Moderator presented Elder W. T. Russell, the appointee of last year, to deliver the sermon. Song, "We'll Go On And Serve The Lord," was sung, after which Elder Russell offered a number of remarks and then read as a lesson, the ninth chapter of Isaiah and chose the 16th verse of the chapter as a text, and used as a line of thought, "The True Church Of Our Lord." Brother Russell took the modern, so-called churches of today and showed by history and the Bible that they were not churches of Christ. He then showed by history that the Lord while here on earth started the Baptist churches and such churches are true churches of our Lord. He delivered a plain and great sermon to the delight of sound Baptists. At the close of the discourse, the congregation sang, "Amazing Grace," "We'll Go On And Serve The Lord" and "I'm a Child Of The King," while the hand of fellowship and endorsement was given the speaker.

Moved to adjourn to meet at one o'clock in the afternon. After announcements, the benediction was offered by Elder R. E. Day, of Illinois.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

After a good dinner the Association came together with singing "When We All Get To Heaven," followed with prayer by Elder J. D. Birdwell.

The regular Order of Business was taken up. The subject of Temperance and Morality was taken up; and, after discussion by J. Hall Grime, it was adopted.

The regular Order of Business was suspended at this point, and the report on the Lafayette Baptist Home was read by Elder I. E. McDonald as follows:

LAFAYETTE OLD MINISTERS AND ORPHANS' HOME

We, your committee, submit the following report: The Baptists of Wiseman Association, and their Trustees hold a title to a one-third interest in the above-named Home. We are glad to report that the work is moving forward in a pleasing manner. Brother L. D. Fishburn and wife are in charge as

Superintendent and Matron, respectively. They seem to have the love and respect of the children to the extent that it ap-

pears to be a very happy family.

After releasing a number of children within the last four months, we now have 11 children in the Home, which is located near Lafayette, Macon County, Tenn. It is near a good church and schools, and has the advantages of other modern conveniences, that this day and age afford. In fact, we doubt if a better location for such an institution could be found within the bounds of our work.

The business of the Home is conducted by the Trustees at their meetings from time to time, with accurate records kept as to the work done and money received and spent. After buying the real estate at a cost of \$16,000 and finishing a small house at a cost of almost one thousand dollars, we find that there is a debt of \$3,000 and some interest still due on the Home. While we are proud of the record we have made thus far, we would like to have this comparatively small debt lifted.

So we recommend that the various churches take regular offerings for our operating expenses; and, as they may feel led, help in paying this debt. So if you want to help clothe our Lord, help us to care for poor, helpless and dependent orphan

children.

The following proposed amendments to the By-laws of the Home were read by Elder F. W. Lambert as follows:

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS OF THE BAPTIST OLD MINISTERS AND ORPHANS' HOME, LAFAYETTE, TENNESSEE

Be it resolved that Article 4, Section 2, be amended as follows: Striking out the word "Indefinitely" and inserting the words, "one, two, and three years." Thereafter their successors shall be chosen for a period of three years, one to be chosen each succeeding year. This amendment is to become effective when the election is held at the convening of the 1953 session of the Association.

Article 4, Section 4, be amended as follows: Adding the words, until the convening of the Association at its next regular session.

Article 13, Section 1, be added as follows: That no sale of Real Estate belonging to the Baptist Old Ministers and Orphans' Home be made, until authorized by a two-thirds vote of the messengers of the churches when convened at a regular annual meeting of the Enon, Wiseman and Southwestern District Associations.

The report on Christian Education was read by Elder James C. Walker, as follows:

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

To educate means to impart knowledge. Therefore, we believe a Christian education would be brought about by teaching or imparting knowledge in harmony with the teachings of Christ.

This education should start in the home, and should be constantly continued by taking our children to sound churches where the Bible is preached, and only to such churches as are sound in doctrine and practice.

When they have come to the years of accountability, they should be taught the plan of salvation; but even after conversion, our responsibility does not end. The great commission commands that after disciples are made, those disciples should be taught all things that Jesus has commanded.

We feel that all who are called to preach the Gospel should strive to receive enough education to rightly divide the word and to meet all heresy. Also a knowledge of English grammar is needful in order to present the truths that are learned, in an acceptable manner.

Commendable efforts have recently been put forth in conducting Bible schools, and we hope the time will soon come when such subjects as English, Church history and possibly other subjects that are helpful in gaining a better understanding of the Scriptures, may be taught for the benefit of our young preachers.

After a number of remarks, Brother Lambert read as a lesson Ecc. 12: verses one through seven; and chose for a text the seventh verse. His subject: "Where are our departed friends?" Brother Lambert preached a very comforting and consoling sermon to the joy and edification of his many hearers, pointing out clearly and plainly that our loved ones are dwelling happily and conscious of their great joy in the paradise of With many Scripture proofs he confirmed the great promises of our God to us that we shall soon be with Jesus and with our loved ones who have gone on before, in the great city of our God. At the close of the sermon, while singing: "Precious Memories," "My Loved Ones Are Waiting For Me," "Where Could I Go?" "In a Country Where People Don't Die," "Where We'll New Grow Old," "When He Reached Down His Hand For Me," and "Shake My Mother's Hand," the hand of love and fellowship was given Brother Lambert.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

PRAYER MEETINGS AND STATE OF RELIGION

We, your Committee, submits the following report: God has always had a way and a place to communicate with His people, both saint and sinner. Prayer is communication with God and nothing can take its place. God told Moses to build an ark. Ex. 25:10—"And thou shalt put the mercy seat above upon the ark, and in the ark, thou shalt put the testimony that I shall give thee; and there I will meet with thee and commune with thee, from above the mercy seat." See also Exodus 25:21-22.

The prayer meeting is the essence of combined communication with God, to give Him thanks, to ask for wisdom, blessings, spiritual guidance and leadership in our churches. God has put His testimony in His church. It is there now; and we, as Baptist

people, must leave it in His church.

God said to Moses: "Put the testimony there and I will commune with you there." God meets His people where the testimony is. Prayer opens the door of deliverance from sin, to the sinner. Psalm 116:8. It opens the door of Heaven to the child of God. Psalm 12:45, 50. It shakes down the walls of the prison and breaks the shackles of those who are bound. Acts. 12: 5-12. The children of God, even under the most extreme persecution, have been given an insight into Heaven because of prayer. Acts. 7:55,56.

God says: "My House shall be called the house of prayer,

but ye have made it a den of thieves."

We fear that our State of Religion is badly affected and is at a low ebb in some of our churches today, because they have forgotten that God's house is a house of prayer, and have ceased to pray, and have forgotten the purpose of a prayer meeting is to pray, and not to transact business for the church, as some of the churches appear to have done. We should, as David did, ask God to keep us back from presumptious sins. Psalm 19:13. The state of religion in many of our churches is sorely affected, and many of our members depressed. Because of presumptious sins, the purpose of our prayer meetings has been diverted in some cases. These are all because of presumptious sins.

Because of the liberties of presumption, we open the door of the house of God to Moderism, formalism, socialism and such. So we need to be prayful and let God's house be a house of prayer, and not pervert the purpose of our prayer meetings, Sunday Schools and other auxiliaries of the church, nor would we delegate the authority of the church to the auxiliaries, as these and other things, with deacons' meetings and open conferences, are the first steps toward Modernism.

Let our prayer meetings be for the purpose of praying, our Sunday Schools, for the purpose of teaching by authority of the church and through its capacity; and keep our conference closed except in regular order, lest we suffer the chastisement of the Lord who loves His children. "For whom the Lord loveth, He chasteneth. But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then ye are bastards and not sons." Heb. 12:6-8.

Then let us work and pray that the God of our salvation may have pre-eminence among us as churches of the living God, through the leadership of the Holy Spirit. Unto Him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Eph. 3:21.

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association. Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers. Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such place as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be mission-

ary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.
