RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS--FIRST DAY

Wednesday, October 21, 1953

At ten o'clock A.M. Wiseman Baptist Association came together in the opening meeting of its sixty-second annual session, with the McFerrin Avenue Baptist church in Nashville, Tennessee.

Services were opened with singing, "When We All Get to Heaven," followed with prayer by Elder A. J. Sloan, former Moderator and also Clerk of Wiseman Association. After another song, "Come unto Me," was sung, the Moderator, Elder F. L. Ray read as a lesson Eph. 4: 1 to 16, offered a number of remarks, and presented Eld. Albert Crouch, the appointee of a year ago to preach the introductory sermon. Bro. Crouch offered a number of remarks and read as a lesson the third chapter of Matthew and chose for a text the third verse. From this text, he preached a good strong sermon on the great man "John the Baptist' and his mission in the world. By many scriptures both from the prophets and the New Testament, Bro. Crouch showed to his many hearers the great hand of God working in and through John the Baptist, whom He sent to make ready a people prepared for the Lord; which people were the material used by the Lord in the establishment of the church. With many words, he exhorted God's preachers, amid the hearty amens of his hearers, to earnestly contend for the faith and to be faithful to the charge given them of God even unto death. At the close of his sermon, he appealed to brotherly-love and unity upon the part of the preachers and asked that all the preachers gather around and sing, "Rock of Ages," after which, the congregation pressed forward and gave to Bro. Crouch their hand in token of their appreciation and endorsement of his sermon, while "Hold to God's Unchanging Hand" and "Amazing Grace" were

The report on Missions was read by Elder M. R. Drury, and a letter received from Elder J. H. Smith, now a Missionary in Japan, was read by the Clerk. It was agreed that both the report and the letter should appear in the minutes. Report and letter as follows:

MISSIONS

We, your Committee, submit the following report: Jesus said in Matthew 28:19,20, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost," and the promise of the Lord was, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." We feel that our churches are failing to carry out this great commission, both at home and abroad.

This authority was given to the church of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the Bible teaches us that this authority

was to be with that church to the end of the age.

We have a great opportunity today, both at home and abroad, to be missionaries in deed. We have on the foreign field a scriptural missionary, sent out by a church of this association, McFerrin Avenue Baptist Church. We feel that Brother Smith is worthy of our support.

The great question that concerns many today is, where to send the gospel. Mark 16:15 says, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." Therefore, we feel that wherever lost people are, there is a great need. We as churches of the living God need to get behind the man that is preaching the gospel, whether at home or abroad.

What would our country have been today had not the churches from foreign lands sent missionaries to our country in the years past. Our country today would have been in heathenism.

May we all as churches of the living God manifest a Spirit for missions in the coming year, and put forth a greater effort to make disciples, wherever the need comes to our attention, than we have in the past.

The letter from Brother Smith is as follows: 397 Koi Naka Machi Hiroshima, Japan October 3, 1953

To The Wiseman Baptist Association Greeting:

It is our sincere prayer that as the churches which compose this great body of Baptist assemble for the annual session there will be much good done toward promoting every phase of the work which has been committed to the churches. Jesus spoke the following in Mark 13:34,36: "The Son of man is as a man taking a far journey who left his house and gave authority to his servants, and to every man his work and commanded the porter to watch. Watch therefore for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight or at the cock crowing, or in the morning; Lest coming suddenly, he find you sleeping." Jesus left his house, the church, went back to his Father, and promised to come back to earth again. When He comes to reckon with His servants, will He find us sleeping? Or will He find us watching?

While Jesus is away His spirit is here to give aid to His churches and to direct His servants to places where He has called them to labor; and to comfort and bless the labourer in all His work. The churches have all the authority that they will ever need to carry out the great commission, because the Lord gave the authority to the church which He instituted while He was here in the world.

The first word in that commission is, "Go," and the last clause in it, "And lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." What more should we want, or wait for. We have everything to gain and nothing to lose, if we obey the simple command of our Christ as recorded in Matthew 28:19,20. I fully believe that the underlying cause for the spiritual slumber in many churches today is due to the fact that they have disregarded this unlimited commission. There is no excuse whatever for the churches which do so little, or nothing to send the gospel to the millions in darkness; and there is no grounds for them to

claim the great blessings of our dear Saviour. The little church here needs a house of worship very much, and we are praying that the churches will respond to this need and send funds to build the house. We have a lot on which to build, which cost a thousand dollars, and the lot is paid for, but we need funds to build. This price for the lot seems very high, but it was the best we could do. Ground in Japan is very scarce and if we get any of it we surely have to pay a dear price. We have the plans all drawn up, and the builders have started on the construction. The building is costing \$3,150.00 (three thousand one hundred and fifty dollars). We pray that our churches will not pass this great need by. We trust that much prayer may be given, and that our churches will all become more awakened to the responsibility which is resting upon them. There has been \$241.00 (two hundred and forty-one dollars) designated toward building a church in Japan so far, and of course, that was paid on the lot. The church has only twelve members and they are all poor. There isn't a one of them that has a home of their own. So it is impossible for them to build a church house, but it is a golden opportunity for our people in America to lay up treasures in heaven.

LAFAYETTE OLD MINISTER AND ORPHANS' HOME

We, your committee, submit the following report: The Baptists of Wiseman Association, and their Trustees hold a title to a one-third interest in the above-named Home. We are glad to report that the work is moving forward in a pleasant manner. Brother L. D. Fishburn and wife are in charge as Superintendent and Matron, respectively. They seem to have the love and respect of the children to the extent that it appears to be a very happy family.

After releasing a number of children within the last several months, we now have ll children in the Home, which is located near Lafayette, Macon County, Tennessee. It is near a good church and schools, and has the advantages of other modern conveniences, that this day and age afford. In fact, we doubt if a better location for such an institution could be found within the bounds of our work.

The business of the Home is conducted by the Trustees at their meetings from time to time, with accurate records kept as to the work done and money received and spent. After buying the real estate at a cost of \$16,000 and

Anishing a small house at a cost of almost one thousand dollars, we have managed to retire the indebtedness which we had entered into in the purchase. However we still owe a small amount of interest which should be paid soon.

We recommend that the various churches take regular offerings for the operation of the Home; and, as they may feel let, help in paying the remainder of interest accumulated. If you want to help clothe our Lord, please do not forget these helpless, dependent orphan children.

We, your committee, submit the following report:
We believe that the best place for instruction is in
the home. To train our children is to educate them in the
things that are most necessary for a fruitful life.

Because of so many things being taught and practiced in our schools today, contrary to the Bible, the child must be rightly informed at home concerning the things that conflict with the Bible, to offset these evil teachings

that undermine the Bible and true religion.

We would encourage all churches to provide a Sunday School for the benefit of our younger people, as well as for those who are older. First and foremost, we recommend that more of our people read and study the Bible, that we may be able to convince the gainsayers. People who hold to and advocate heretical doctrines study hard, and go at length in trying to uphold their belief. With unlearned people they can make their heresy appear to be the truth and thereby weaken the faith of the untaught.

We have in our churches some who as Paul said, "aught to be teachers, but have need to be taught." The Catholics say, "Give us a child until he is ten years of age, and he will always be a Catholic." By this, we understand, that what is placed in the mind of a child before he is ten years of age will be a foundation for his or her life.

The report on financing the Lord's Work was read by Elder Jas. C. Walker as follows:

Financing the Lord's Work

We, your committee, submit the following report: In dealing with this subject, there are three things that should be considered, namely, the need, what is being done, and what should be done about it.

When we consider the need, there are two phases to be investigated; -- First, the support of the local work, and second, -- behevolent and missionary activity. In dealing with this general subject, let us keep in mind that we

are considering either money, or its equivalent in the necessities of life. For after all, money is of no value except as a medium of providing those things that we have need of.

Concerning the local needs, and their support, we arrive at the following conclusions, based on the minutes of last year, and what we hear from the letters as read this year. Some of the churches are giving their pastors excellent compensation, and are taking care of visiting preachers and helpers in meetings in a fine way. Most of the other churches, with few exceptions, are contributing well for local preaching, and all the churches, in so far as we can determine, are taking care of all local needs in

an adequate manner.

We now take up the missionary and benevolent activity. This includes both foreign and home missionaries, and support of the Orphans' Home, and charity in general. Jesus commands to go into all the world, and preach the gospel. Matt. 28:19,20. James admonishes us of our duty to help those in need. James 1:27. We regret to say that a number of our churches seem to be very derelict in regard to these duties. According to the record, it seems that some few of the churches report no foreign mission contributions for one or two years. The contributtons of many of the others are exceedingly small. We believe we are safe in saying that none of our churches have done as much as they should along this line. In view of these facts, how can we truthfully say that we really love the Lord's work? Jesus said, "Why call ye me Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" Luke 6:46. Let each of us ask ourself this same question. Jesus further tells us that the first and greatest commandment is to love the Lord first and above all, and to love our neighbor as ourself is the second great commandment. Matt. 22:35,40. In the light of the foregoing facts, and admonition from the Saviour himself, we can only conclude that as Baptists we are falling far short in this phase of our Christian duty. We believe that we should give at least as much for missions and charitable causes as we expend on our local church work. We believe that the Lord would be pleased with this. Hear the words of the Master on this point: "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matt. 6:33. Adopted after discussion by Jas. C. We as pastors should do more preaching on this important subject. If we do, and the churches act accordingly, God's cause will be raised to higher plains. Then Christians will be strengthemed and blessed, and the lost will be led to the Lord.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association. Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers. Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Wednesday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such place as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be mission-

ary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.
