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RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failing or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS FIRST DAY

Wednesday, October 20, 1954

At 10:00 o'clock a.m., October 20, 1954, Wiseman Baptist Association came together in its sixty-third annual session with Cedar Bluff Baptist Church, ten miles southwest of Lafayette, Tennessee.

Services were opened with singing, "Be a Light for Jesus", followed with prayer by Elder C. B. Massey, Moderator of Enon Baptist Association. Song, "Are You Washed in the Blood," was then sung. The moderator offered a number of remarks and read as a lesson the 13th chapter of 1 Corinthians, after which prayer was offered by Elder F. W. Lambert, Clerk of Siloam Baptist Association, followed

with song "Some Day". The moderator spoke briefly relative to the organization of Wiseman Association for the first time at Cedar Bluff sixty-three years ago and then introduced Elder H. C. Vanderpool the appointee of a year ago to deliver the introductory sermon. Brother Vanderpool read for a lesson the first fifteen verses of the third chapter of 1 Corinthians and used for his subject, "The Sure Foundation". To the joy of his many listeners, he opened the scriptures in a fine way and produced scripture after scripture to show "The Foundation" to be Christ Jesus our Lord. He clearly pointed out the necessity of repentance as the foundation to be laid on the Rock by the sinner, without which all must forever be lost, warning against building on the sand. Brother Vanderpool preached with power, having good liberty, and his sermon was gladly received being endorsed by many hearty amens during his discourse. May God's rich blessings be upon our younger preacher brethren. After the good sermon, the congregation pressed forward and gave Brother Vanderpool their hands in token of their appreciation and endorsement of his message of truth, while the congregation sang, "How Firm A Foundation'.

MISSIONS

BROTHER SMITH'S LETTER

323 Koi Naka Machi Hiroshima, Japan October 14, 1954

To the Wiseman Baptist Association: We send Greetings:

Our humble prayer is that the Association will have a wonderful session and that God's Kingdom cause will be greatly encouraged by your meeting together. The churches which compose Wiseman Association are indeed precious to us and I don't think there is a more spiritual group of churches in all the world. I have had some contact with people who represent churches and groups of churches since we've been on this foreign mission field, and I don't hesitate to say that the churches which compose Wiseman Association outshines anything which we have become to know about. May the good Lord's face continue to shine upon our beloved churches.

We are happy to report that our work here in Japan is being blessed of the Lord. We don't have big numbers, and it seems some times that the church builds very slowly, but God does add to our number occasionly; and I believe that God is furnishing us with some of the "Salt of the Earth" for which we are very grateful.

Recently I have baptized two more girls into the church, and they, both of them, are very poor in earthly goods, but seem to be rich in heavenly things, and of course that is most important. There is a young man who has indicated to me recently that he is saved, but we can't be too hasty about taking people into the church. It is advisable to let them bear fruit for a while before taking them into the church.

God has been very precious to us in every way, and our needs have been supplied. We are happy to report that the Lord has given us enough funds through the churches to pay for our new church building, and unto him belongs all of the honor and glory. We have

a nice little building, both church and living quarters.

Mission work in Japan is slow, but it is an open field for missionaries, and all of us should pray that God will send more of His servants into the field. "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you and, lo, I am with you alway even unto the end of the world." Matt. 28:19,20.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS and PRAYER MEETINGS

We should band ourselves together in these services to accomplish what is needed.

Never in the history of man has there been any greater need for teaching the truth. Today we turn our children loose in the world, neglecting to do our duty of teaching them the way of life and of God. The church has the commission to teach, so let us assume our responsibilities, and let us put every effort forth to operate our Sunday Schools according to the scriptures, and by the authority of the church. Too many times we say that the Sunday School is not the Church. But if we take the Scriptural application of the Sunday School we will see, that it is the duty of the Church in teaching capacity. Matt. 28:18,19.

Not only are these services needed for the lost but for the saved as well. Each one of us need to study God's Word. Paul told Timothy

Also let us remember prayer meetings should be conducted in our churches each week. We believe that prayer is the means of contacting God. Many who claim to be christians, have caused sinners to lose confidence in them by taking a social drink. Some Baptists say there is nothing wrong with drinking a beer in the quiet of their own home. You may be able to hide this from some, but you may be sure that your sins will find you out.

The Bible teaches us to abstain from the very appearence of evil. Morality is today a thing that is regarded by many as something old-fashioned and will permit their children as well as themselves to dress about half nude and see no wrong. We believe that many are tempted in this manner. "Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affections, evil concupiscence and covetousness, which is idolatry." Col. 3:5.

We as God's children need to be conducting our lives or living the kind of life that would please God, that sinners might see our good works and glorify God. They are observing our lives when we least expect it. "If you then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affections on things above, not on things on the earth." Col. 3:1,2.

The report on Scriptural Evangelism was read by Elder C. C. Ramsey as follows:

SCRIPTURAL EVANGELISM

We, your committee, make the following report on Scriptural Evangelism.

To get a true conception of this very important subject, we must first, of necessity, analyse the meaning of the words in the subject.

Evangelism then in word is derived from greek root words (Ev) meaning (good or well) and (Angello) meaning (to announce, or proclaim).

Scriptural Evangelism then would be confined to the announcement or proclamation of the good tidings, or gospel, contained in the scriptures, excluding all else, and not including anything else, not in word only, but in deed and in truth.

Our subject conveys the idea of the advancement of so-called evangelism that is not scriptual. There is also unmistakable evidence of the same being true, in proclamation and practice. There is only one true evangelism, and that is Scriptural Evangelism. Then, all else so-called in word or practice is false. An untruth is a lie. So one who propagates an untruth is a false prophet or liar, and one who practices an untruth and teaches others to do so should be branded as the scriptures brand them.

"Woe unto you Scribes, Pharisees, Hypocrites, for ye devour widows houses, and for pretense make long prayers, etc., Ye compass sea and land to make one proselyte and when he is made, ye make him twofold more the child of hell then yourselves." Matt. 23:14,15.

The unscriptural evangelist, then is the one who leaves off the scriptural practice as well as the preaching of the facts. These are blind guides (Matt. 23:16). They cannot be true evangelists, even though they may have done one thing, they have left the other undone. Matt. 23:23.

The regular order of business was taken up, and the report on Church Discipline was read by Elder Jas. C. Walker as follows:

CHURCH DISCIPLINE

We, your committee, on Church Discipline submit the following: The doctrine of church discipline is often misunderstood to mean expulsion. According to the rules stated by our saviour in Matthew 18:15,17, expulsion or exclusion should be the last resort for the church to take with an unruly member.

The apostle Paul admonished that if a brother was overtaken in a fault the more spiritual ones should restore him in a spirit of meekness also considering ourselves lest we be tempted. Gal. 6:1.

We believe the most of our churches are suffering because they have neglected this duty until they hardly know where to begin. Also we as preachers, in most instances, can hardly urge the use of discipline without condemning ourselves, because of the lack of it in our own home churches.

It seems that we are confronted with a more difficult situation than has been the case in other generations, because in our day the public sanctions indecency and other immoral acts that our forfathers would not tolerate in social life, and such as the Bible condemns.

Let us urge our churches to pray about this important matter, and as we pray, be willing to act according to the Lord's leadership, with churches and pastors cooperating.

At this time the moderator suggested that a collection be taken up to bear the remainder of the expense incurred last year in the printing of the minutes which was \$21.83, the remainder of collection to be donated to the clerk for his services. The collection amounted to \$22.34.

The regular order of business was taken up, and the report in the Orphans Home was read by Elder M. R. Drury as follows:

ORPHANS HOME

We, your committee on Orphans Home, report the following:
The Wiseman Baptist Association owns a one third interest in
the Orphans Home near Lafayette, Tennessee, and your trustees
and their successors in office hold a legal title to said interest. Other
interests in the Home are owned by Enon Baptist Association and
Southwestern District Association.

This home is located about two miles north of Lafayette, Tennessee and is on a good highway with a school and a Baptist Church just across the road. The home has about the usual conveniences and opportunities found in the average home. We now have thirteen boys and girls in the home who are under the care of Brother and Sister L. D. Fishburn, Superintendent and Matron respectively. This is indeed a happy family such as is found in the private homes of our communities.

Our need at present is a sufficient amount of money to pay the balance of \$3,000.00 we owe on the new addition built to the home, which has just been completed. There is also a daily need for operating expenses.

We urge our pastors and deacons to keep this matter before the churches of this association that they may give as the Lord may direct. There have been several other churches as well as individuals which have contributed to the support of the home.

FINANCING THE LORD'S WORK

We, your committee, submit the following report:

In dealing with this subject, there was three things that should be considered, namely, the need, what is being done, and what should be done about it.

When we consider the need, there are two phases to be investigated; First, the support of the local work, and second, benevolent and missionary activity. In dealing with this general subject, let us keep in mind that we are considering either money, or its equivalent in the necessities of life. For after all, money is of no value except as a medium of providing those things that we have need of.

Concerning the local needs, and their support, we arrive at the following conclusions, based on the minutes of last year, and what we hear from letters as read this year. Some of the churches are giving their pastors excellent compensation, and are taking care of visiting preachers and helpers in meetings in a fine way. Most of the other churches, with few exceptions, are contributing well for local preaching, and all the churches, in so far as we can determine, are taking care of all local needs in an adequate manner.

We now take up the missionary and benevolent activity. This includes both foreign and home missionaries, and support of the Orphans' Home, and charity in general. Jesus commands to go into all the world, and preach the gospel. Matt. 28:19,20. James admonishes us of our duty to help those in need. James 1:27. We regret to say that a number of our churches seem to be very derelict in regard to these duties. According to the record, it seems that some few of the churches report no foreign mission contributions for one of two years. The contributions of many others are exceedingly small. We believe we are safe in saying that none of our churches have done as much as they should along this line. In view of these facts, how can we truthfully say that we really love the Lord's work? Jesus said, "Why call ye me Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" Luke 6:46. Let each of us ask ourself this same question. Jesus further tells us that the first and greatest commandment is to love the Lord first and above all, and to love our neighbor as ourself is the second great commandment. Matt. 22:35,40. In the light of the foregoing facts, and admonition from the Saviour himself, we can only conclude that as Baptists we are falling far short in this phase of our Christian duty. We believe that we should give at least as much for missions and charitable causes as we expend on our local church work. We believe that the Lord would be pleased with this. CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches

within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experi-

ence and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10:00 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such place as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting

shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary

in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.
