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#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a Clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failing or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

#### PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST DAY — October 25, 1957

At 10:00 o'clock A. M., on the above date, Wiseman Baptist Association came together in its Sixty-Sixth annual session with Concord Baptist Church, White House, Tennessee. Services were opened with singing "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder," followed with prayer by Elder N. C. Fuqua, Moderator of Siloam Baptist Association. After the prayer and the singing of another song, "Amazing Grace," the moderator made a number of remarks then read the Second Epistle of John for a scripture lesson and called on Brother Jimmie Sorrells to lead in another prayer, which was followed by the song "Leaning On The Everlasting Arm."

At this time, the moderator presented Elder G. O. Templeton, the appointee of a year ago, to preach the Introductory Sermon. After a number of remarks of appreciation for the opportunity given him to preach to Wiseman Association, Brother Templeton read for his scripture lesson 2 Timothy 1 to 9 and chose for his text the third verse, "Thou therefore endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." He used for his subject, "Being a good soldier of Jesus Christ." In a very wonderful way, through the great Spirit and power of a mighty God, to the joy and appreciation of his hearers Brother Templeton truly stirred our souls in the presentation of the word of God, concerning what it takes to be a good soldier of Jesus Christ. He reminded us of the many blessings we enjoy today, the conveniences and advantages we have that our forefathers did not have, comparing our efforts to theirs in the face of greater obligations which greater advantages impose upon us. His sermon was sound and forceful throughout and was truly one of the best introductory sermons before Wiseman Association. Ray, Assistant Clerk; Elder Jas. C. Walker, Treasurer and Elder A. G. Gregory, Assistant Treasurer. F. L. Ray and W. T. Russell being elected each others' assistant they each suggested the appointment of another assistant moderator and assistant clerk, and on motion Elder H. G. Taylor was elected to serve as Assistant Moderator and Elder H. C. Vanderpool was elected to serve as Assistant Clerk.

Petitionary letters were called for and Beckwith Baptist Church came by letter from Enon Baptist Association. Faith Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee; and Rayon City Baptist Church, Old Hickory, Nashville, Tennessee, both newly organized churches also petitioned for membership and all three were received and given the hand of fellowship by the moderator. The report of Old Ministers and Orphans Home was read as follows:

During the past year we have seen some changes in the Orphan Home as most everyone understands. The Home is now under new supervision and everything seems to be going well. We made a change in Superintendent and Matron some months ago and the Home is now in charge of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil White. They seem to be filling the place well also enjoying the work. Two of the girls married this year and left the Home, and six more of the older girls were released to their guardians. We now have six children left and are able to admit other needy children at once.

The financial status of the Home can be determined by the report submitted yesterday by the Treasurer, and needless to say, we are in need of some extra consideration by the churches financially. The Trustees who are serving by appointment without remuneration for their time and efforts, I feel, have done their very best trying at all times to act in the best interest of the Home and the cause for which

they serve.

We feel that we have a great opportunity to be of assistance to children who otherwise might never have any advantages religiously or otherwise. I am sure we all understand that there are many things to fight against today in rearing our families that were not known to us only a few years ago, therefore, the responsibility is very great with those who have the supervision of orphan children. They need our prayers and support.

We would like to urge all of the churches to give special consideration to this work and see to it that regular offerings are taken up and sent in that this work may be continued without financial strain. Let's pay the remaining debt of eleven hundred and fifty dollars and make regular contributions to this worthwhile work.

Consistant with the amendment of the by-laws of a year ago the matter of a trustee to fill the vacancy left by W. T. Russell was

The report on Temperance and Morality and Church Discipline was read by Elder Fred Carr as follows:

#### TEMPERANCE, MORALITY AND CHURCH DISCIPLINE

We, your committee, submit the following report:

In discussing this subject, we shall consider it as applying to christians and more especially to members of Baptist churches. The apostle Paul tells us in Colossians 3:1-2, "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth." If all of God's children would adhere to this admonition or command, we would avoid many of the pitfalls into which Christians are constantly falling and which make so many of us stumbling blocks in the way of sinners.

Many Christians and church members think that there is no harm in taking a dram. We feel that a dram drinker is worse than a drunkard, but the subject of morality embraces much more than the mere abstinence from intoxicants. The apostle Paul tells us in Colossians 3:5, 8, 9, "Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry: But now ye also put off all these: Anger, wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth. Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds."

The apostle further lists the works of the flesh in Galatians 5:19-21 "Now the works of the fresh are manifest, which are there: Adultry, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envying, murders, drunkenness, revellings and such like;"

As to Discipline, we feel our churches are too slack concerning this point. The Bible teaches us to deal with our disorderly members. A church, like the home, that is loose on discipline and allows its members to do as they please is not doing its duty. When the members of the Lord's Body are engaged in all kinds of sinful living and churches make no effort to correct them in their evils, they are falling short of their duty to the church as well as what we owe our erring brethren and sisters in the Lord.

We should be very prayerful before we select teachers for our Sunday Schools. The literature that we are able to get must be weeded, therefore our teachers have the great responsibility of pointing out and denying the untruths as well as proclaiming the truths.

We believe there is no better place to teach the word of truth than in a good sound Sunday School. Of course we realize that a Sunday School is no better than its teachers and the literature it uses.

The Sunday School is not a separate body. It belongs to the church and should be governed by it, which brings us to believe that all of-

ficers and teachers should be elected by the church in conference.

Many of our Sunday Schools hold the election of their officers and teachers separate and apart from the church. This brings sinners to take part in carrying on the Lord's work which is unscriptural and contrary to the teachings of His word. We should always be led by His spirit in carrying on for God, but how can a sinner be led by the Spirit? "For what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? And what communion hath light with darkness?" 2 Cor. 6:14. Paul also tells us, "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers."

It has been noted in some of our old-fashion churches that people of other faiths were found teaching Sunday School classes. This opens the door for heresy to be taught and serves to stunt the growth of new-born babes who desire the sincere milk of the word.

We, therefore, recommend that all our churches work toward a good, sound Sunday School where God's truth will be taught so that our young converts may not be children tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine by the slight of men and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive. Eph. 4:4

Also, we believe that our churches can be strengthened and their members drawn closer together in brotherly love and fellowship by a weekly prayer meeting, since prayer is the key that unlocks the door of faith and the medium by which our requests are made known unto God, through Christ Jesus our Lord. #### CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of membership in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.



ELDER R. O. SANDERS

We are sorry not to have more! direct information about this great preacher who did so much for the honor and glory of God. Eld. Roscoe O. Sanders died in June, 1957, at a Nashville hospital after a long illness. For 35 years Bro. Elder Captain Buie Massey, son of L. W. and Millie Jent Massey, was born June 16, 1867 on Little Puncheon Creek, Macon County.
