Introductory Sermon by Elder A. G. Gregory

RULES OF DECORUM

- l. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failing or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY — Friday, October 23, 1959

At ten o'clock A. M. on the above date Wiseman Baptist Association came together in the opening service its 68th annual session with the church at Enon Chapel near Payne's Store, six miles west of Hartsville, Tennessee. Services were opened by singing "I Know I Have Religion," after which prayer was offered by Elder Curtis Carter. The song, "I Want To Be Ready" was sung, and after a number of remarks by the moderator, Elder F. L. Rav, read for a scripture lesson Psalms 66, and after commenting briefly on the lesson asked Elder Paul Oldham to lead in prayer. Brother Ray, at this time, presented Elder A. G. Gregory, the appointee of a year ago, to preach the Introductory Sermon. Brother Gregory came to the stand, and after some fitting statements, very humbly made and requesting the prayers of the people, he read for a lesson the first 15 verses of the 3rd chapter of Genesis choosing for a text the 15th verse. "And I will put enmity between thee and the woman and between thy seed and her seed, it shall bruise thy head and thou shalt bruise his heel."

Brother Gregory, beginning with Cain slaying Abel, thinking him to be that promised Seed, and taking up in order the union of the sons of Seth and the daughters of Cain which resulted in a people in whose hearts there was only evil continuously bringing the destruction of the world, the devil being in the hope that the promised seed might be destroyed, but he showed how God had other plans being manifested in the building of the Ark. He showed how that God, after bringing Noah and his family over into the new world, confirmed the previous promise to Abram and in turn to Isaac and Jacob in the incidents which followed. He showed how that the devil through Pharoah made an effort to destroy all male chidren born to Israel in an effort to destroy the promised Seed, but God showed again the certainty of his promise by preserving a deliverer, Moses. Using also the woman of Revelation, chapter 12, and the effort made by Herod and the law to destrov all male children from two years old and under, he showed again how God preserved the Seed in Egypt until the danger was past. He then showed the death of Christ and the conquering power in the resurrection of the promised Seed and his being alive forever more. Thus fulfilling the promise of his text and completing one of the best Introductory sermons we have heard before Wiseman Association. Amid tears of joy showing the strength and edification given them, the congregation moved forward giving Brother Gregory their hands of endorsement and appreciation of his good sermon.

The moderator called for the letters from the various churches which were filed with the clerk, and appointed Elder Harold Dean Linville and Eld. J. D. Birdwell as reading Clerks. After the reading of two letters, it looking so much like rain, a motion was made and passed to adjourn one hour for dinner. After announcements, the benediction was offered by Eld. G. O. Templeton.

Friday Afternoon

After a very bountiful dinner the body came back together in the afternoon session with singing, "When We All Get To Heaven." Prayer was offered by Eld. John Patterson, then the song, "We Shall Meet Someday" was sung. The regular order of business was taken up and the remaining letters were read.

New Bethel Baptist Church being the only one asking for the Association another year, the regular order of business was suspended and on motion the association voted to go to New Bethel next year.

At this time permission was granted Elder J. C. Walker to read a letter received from Mason Miley, State Line Association in Louisiana which was an expression of his desire that we visit their association that we might become better acquainted and more united in the work of our Lord.

Moved to adjourn to meet at 9:30 A. M. Saturday. After announcements, the benediction was offered by Brother Thomas Armstrong.

SECOND DAY

The Saturday morning session was opened at about 9:30 A. M. with the song, "Living By Faith" led by Brother Frank Massey. The Moderator then read a scripture lesson from 2 Timoning 3:10-17 and made a few timely remarks after which he asked Lider J. Hall Grime to lead the association in prayer. Receipts

CHRISTIAN AND MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

We, your committee, submit the following report: We believe that every Christian should seek after a greater knowledge of the word of God. We are admonished by Peter to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. 2 Peter 3:18 Also, 1 Peter 2:2, "As new-born babes desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby." Paul gives us some good advice in 2 Timothy 2:15, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

It would be wonderful if it could be said concerning our children, as Paul spoke about Timothy in the following words: "And that from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus." 2 Timothy 3:15

As to ministerial education, we believe that the ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ should educate and prepare themselves for the work of the Lord that they may be able to feed the flock of God with meat as well as milk.

A minister of the Lord, should know what to preach, and certainly his knowledge of God's word will be the limit of his preaching. The more one knows, the more he can teach others.

We shall bring this subject to a close by quoting to you the following words given by the hand of inspiration, "Thou therefore my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. And the things that thou has heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who sall be able to teach others also." 2 Timothy 2:1-2

The report on Temperance, Morality and Church Discipline was read by Eld. A. G. Gregory as follows:

TEMPERANCE, MORALITY AND CHURCH DISCIPLINE

It seems by observation that immorality is increasing in α

terrible way today.

In this gospel land, people seem to have forgotten that God has taught us moral lessons in his word. In the Bible we are instructed to abstain from the use of alchelic beverages. Soloman said, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." But many Christians and church members say it is not wrong to drink if one does not drink to excess. If one never takes the first drink he would never be a drunkard, and if we did not have those who drink to excess, there would be far fewer murders, divorces and many immoral deeds on the part of our people.

Our enemies say that we believe in people being saved and then go on and do any old way. We are not guilty of this charge and deny it. We believe that God saves us by His grace and keeps those who are saved by His grace, but God will not fail to chastize those that are saved when they fail to keep His com-

mandments and live a life above reproach.

We fear that many of our own members are committing immoral acts which are disgraceful; including indecent dressing, and being seen at places where Christians should never be found. Paul teaches us that we should live Godly and soberly in this present evil world.

We feel that our churches are too slack on discipline. The Bible teaches us to deal with our disorderly members. A church, like the home, that is loose on discipline and allows the members to do as they please is not doing its duty. When the members of the Lord's body are engaged in all kinds of sinful living and churches make no effort to correct them in their evils, they are falling short of their duty to the church as well as what we owe our erring brethren and sisters in the Lord.

The time having arrived for the doctrinal sermon, the regular order of business was suspended and the moderator asked for a song, and after the singing of the song, "I Want To Be Ready," the moderator presented Eld. J. C. Walker, the appointee of a year ago to deliver the doctrinal sermon.

Brother Walker expressing a deep feeling of responsibility spoke briefly to the large congregation and read for a lesson the 6th chapter of Soloman's Song and chose for a text the 10th verse. "Who is she that looketh forth as the morning, fair as the moon, clear as the Sun, and terrible as an army with bappers."

Brother Walker asked the question, Who is She?, and proceeded to show by the scriptures the identity of the true church of the Lord. He began with the church as she appeared on the day of Pentecost, (not set up on that day) but showing her to be the true church already in existance and assembled at Jerusalem on that day. He brought to our minds the great division in the church over baptismal regeneration, the majority going in that direction, resulting in the Roman Catholic Church, also that in 1530, a noble soul, Martin Luther, came out of her with good intentions, yet not knowing the whole truth and not considering the promise that Jesus made the church, "the gates of hell shall not prevail against it," started a movement which resulted in what is known today as the Lutheran Church.

In like manner, how John Wesley, John Calvin, Alexander Campbell and others started movements resulting in human churches. He showed that in all these including the Jehovah Witnesses by pastor Russell, the Mormans by Joseph Smith, the

Christians Scientists by Mary Baker Eddy and others we had not and could not find the true church.

Brother Walker backed up to the church at Antioch and on to the extreme limits of the west, Spain and the British Isles, where no doubt Paul sowed the seed of the true Baptist faith, Pudence and Claudia being among them and were of Welch descent.

He very ably showed that through this Welch Chain we have a connection today, and from the standpoint of principle, Brother Walker showed and stressed the importance of scriptural baptism, showing and proving what it takes to constitute it. He told of how William Scribner traveled to Boston to receive it, and Cantrel Bethel went from Dekalb county, Tennessee, to Old Union church in Warren county, Kentucky, to receive it.

In closing, he exhorted the people to cling to and uphold these age-old principles that have in all ages destinguished the true church of our Lord from all others. His message was well received, and while the songs, "Amazing Grace," "How Firm A Foundation," and "I'd Rather Be An Old-Time Christian" were sung, the congregation showed very clearly their endorsement and appreciation by pressing forward and clasping his hand for his very plain and instructive sermon.

After many good talks, a motion was made to adjourn for dinner to meet back at 1:00 o'clock. After announcements, the benediction was offered by Elder T. C. Jones.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON

After feasting on the bounties of another delicious dinner, the association came together in the last setting of this session with singing "I Remember The Time." Prayer was offered by Brother H. H. Head. Another song, "I Want To Know More About My Lord" was sung and the regular order of business was resumed.

The report on Resolutions was read by W. T. Russell and adopted without discussion.

We, your committee, submit the following report: Whereas, Wiseman Baptist Association having convened in its 68th annual session with Enon Chapel Baptist Church, six miles west of Hartsville, Tenn., providing a wonderful blessing to those that

- That we give God thanks for everything, that he spared our lives and gave us health that we could be here to enjoy His many blessings, and also the addition of two new churches.
- 2. That we express our thanks to Enon Chapel Church for the invitation and hospitality in caring for the association.

- 4. We appreciate the visitors and their interest in God's cause.
- 5. That the messengers do not fail to report to their church of this work, instead of going home and forgetting the association.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of membership in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored excommunicated, and dead since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination. if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.
