Introductory Sermon by Elder A. G. Gregory

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failing or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY - Friday, October 21, 1960

At ten o'clock A. M. on the above date Wiseman Baptist Association came together in the opening service of its 69th annual session with the church at New Bethel, two and one-half miles Southwest of Goodlettsville, Tennessee. Services were opened with singing conducted by Eld. W. R. Overton. After the singing of "Some Day," and "Everybody Will Be Happy Over There," the moderator made a number of opening remarks and called on Eld. Phocian Gibbs who led the Association in the opening prayer. After the song, "How Firm A Foundation" was sung, Brother Ray read the first 18 verses of the second chapter of Philippians and asked Elder N. C. Fuqua to lead in another prayer which was very humbly offered and greatly enjoyed. May God bless this great servant of God which we all appreciate and esteem very highly.

At this time the moderator, after some timely remarks, presented Eld. A. G. Gregory, the appointee of a year ago, to preach the Introductory Sermon. Brother Gregory took the stand and after some preliminary remarks read for a scripture lesson Acts 7:17-36, and chose for a text Exodus 7:5 "And the Egyptians shall know that I am the Lord when I stretch forth my hand upon Egypt, and bring out the children of Israel from among them."

To the joy of this people who filled the building of New Bethel Church, Brother Gregory very ably and effectively showed us the greatness of God, His fore-knowledge. His almighty power and His unlimited Wisdom through and by which he is able to prevail against all powers to carry out His will and purpose in Heaven and in Earth. He also showed the choices God has made and does make of men to be used as instruments in his hands to carry out these purposes always to His own glory. Brother Gregory also showed us that, in these times when our faith sometimes grows so weak, we are still serving the same God that Moses served and had never neither could he ever change, and that He is always ready to open doors and prepare the way for us if we are willing to

The following Resolution attached to the letter of Athens church was read by the clerk:

"Whereas the Wiseman Association passed and put on record in their 1957 minutes the following resolution: "That we will not hold in fellowship any church or correspond with any association who tolerates the practice of alien immersion." and The order of business was called for and read by Elder Paul Oldham as follows: It was adopted without discussion.

SECOND DAY

The association came together with singing "I'm Going That Way" conducted by Brother Eugene Canter. Prayer was offered by Brother J. O. Brooks. After the singing of "It Won't Be Very Long," the clerk read the Rules of Decorum and called the roll of messengers. A quorum was declared present. The minutes of the preceeding day were read and adopted.

The regular order of business was taken up and the report on Missions was read by Brother Quentin Sneed as follows:

MISSIONS

We your committee submit the following report:

We believe Missions to be one of the most important subjects our minds could entertain. The meaning of Missions is—A Sending out with Authority.

We believe the scriptures teach that Missions began with God calling men out to preach the gospel to the lost world. Isaiah 6:8 "Whom shall I send and who will go for me? Then said I. Here am I. send me."

Will you be a missionary at heart and join us in prayer that these preachers may go out and find their places and preach the gospel to this lost and dying world. LAFAYETTE ORPHANS HOME

The Orphans Home in one of our interests promoted and sponsored by churches of Wiseman, Enon, Southwestern District and Siloam Baptist Associations in middle and west Tennessee. This has been a very interesting work for the trustees through the years. There have been many problems to solve, some hindrances and disappointments; but there has been the satisfaction of knowing that many children left in the world without father or mother have been provided a home and family life, a Christian environment and training, an education enabling them to assume their place in society and provide for themselves. Many have gone from this home through the years and are doing well as honorable and respectable citizens.

There are at present 7 children in the Home under the super-

vision of Brother and Sister Benton McClard, Superintendent and Matron. A new barn has been erected on the farm this year. Each child in the Home now owns and cares for his or her own cow which has furnished a strong initiative for each child to work and manage for himself.

We would like to urge all churches to keep the welfare of this Home in mind continually and contribute regularly for its upkeep and the support of the children. James tells us, "Pure religion, and undifiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world."

With liberty which can only be the product of the Holy Spirit and the power of the same Brother Oldham, by the force of truth truly lifted our minds from the vain and perishable things of this lonely world to the high and lasting things enjoyed and to be enjoyed by the family of God. "Resolved that Resolution No. 8, adopted by Wiseman Association in 1957 be amended to read—That we will not hold in fellowship any church or correspond with any association which shall wilfully and deliberately persist in the practice or toleration of alien immersion, after article No. 13 of our Constitution has been followed."

By motion, the amendment was adopted.

Since Eld. J. C. Walker had vacated the office of trustee of the Orphans Home and the three-year term of W. T. Russell had expired, Eld. Paul Oldham was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Brother Walker and Eld. F. L. Ray was appointed to a three-year term.

The report on Christian and Ministerial Education was read by Eld. F. L. Ray as follows:

CHRISTIAN AND MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

We, your committee, submit the following report:

We believe that every born-again child of God should strive to gain a knowledge of God's word, to the extent that they may be able to work in the vineyard of the Master in instructing others and warning the lost to turn to God.

There are many scriptures in the Bible that teach us the need of a Christian education, also the ministers of the Lord should prepare themselves to meet the demands of the day in answering the many questions that confront us, and to be able to answer the critics that so often challenge the word of God.

I think we should do something about this needy cause. James tells us to be doers of the word and not hearers only. So

Jeremiah 6:15 said, "Were they ashamed when they committed abomination? Nay, they were not at all ashamed, neither could they blush;" Paul said in 1 Timothy 3:15 "That thou mayest know how thou outhest to behave thyself in the house of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of the truth." And in 2 Thess. 3:6 "Now we command you brethren in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ that ye withdraw yourselves from every brother that walketh disorderly."

FINANCING THE LORD'S WORK

We, your committee, submit the following report:

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CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entiled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in severa capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of he faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Aricle XI. New churches may be admitted into the Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sitting may admit any visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except upon subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majortiy vote of the members present.

Article XVI. That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a unanimous vote of messengers present.
