Introductory Sermon by Elder James (Pete) Porter

RULES OF DECORUM

- I. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failing or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the second day it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum and call the roll of members.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS

First Day — Friday, October 26, 1962

On the above date, at 10:00 o'clock A. M. Wiseman Baptist Association came together in their seventy-first annual session with Longview Baptist Church, Gallatin, Tenn. Services were opened with singing conducted by Brother Rhea Dyer. The songs, "Amazing Grace", and "I Want To Be Ready" were sung, after which the Moderator asked Elder Charles Gentry to lead the assembly in prayer. Another song, "The Gloryland Way" was then sung, after which the Moderator offered a number of remarks introductory to the services and read the first division of the Psalms, and in honor and memory of the former Moderator of Wiseman Association, Elder N. C. Fuqua, he read the twenty third Psalm, Brother Fuqua having answered the call of his Master and Lord in death since last Association. After a number of fitting statements relative to Brother Fuqua, who served Wiseman Association as Moderator from 1932 to 1948, a period of 17 years, the Moderator called on Elder Hurlie Linville to lead in another prayer. The song, "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms" was then sung, and the Moderator presented Elder James (Pete) Porter, the appointee of a year ago, to preach the Introductory Sermon.

Brother Porter, expressed his appreciation for the confidence placed in him by the Association, choosing him to deliver this opening sermon. He read for a scripture lesson, Matthew 28, from verse 26 the remainder of the chapter, using for a subject, The Responsibility of the Lord's Church. Brother Porter, with much zeal and power, showed many of the basic principles which should underlie every effort made for the advancement of the Lord's cause, stressing the fact that Love for the cause. Love for the sinner and for one another is the greatest of all graces. He pointed out that the church does not belong to the preacher; but rather, the preacher belongs to the church, showing in this that the preachers should show the proper love and respect for the church and her actions. He condemned those who go about criticizing the actions of their church, showing that God expected his people to love the church and respect her as the body of Christ, loving one another and doing nothing through strife or vainglory but, in love, preferring one another. His sermon consisted of the truth respecting the great responsibility of each member of the Lord's church in the spread of the gospel of Jesus Christ to a world of lost humanity.

At the close of his good soul-stirring sermon, the congregation pressed forward to give to him the hand of endorsement,

while "Victory in Jesus", "Send The Light" and "Near The Cross" was sunq.

At this time letters from the various churches were called for to be filed with the Clerk. After the filing of the letters, the Moderator appointed Elder John Hedges and Brother Ray Smith from Southwestern District Association, West Tennessee, as reading clerks. A few of the letters were read, and a motion was made to adjourn one hour for dinner. After announcements, the benediction was offered by Brother Vestel Watson.

Friday Afternoon

After a very delicious and bountiful dinner, which was enjoyed by everyone, the Association came together in the afternoon with singing, led by Brother Truman Porter. After singing, "That's Why I Love Him So", prayer was offered by Elder W. W. Bowman. We only have three children in the home at the present, and there is room for seven more. If anyone knows of children who need a home who are orphans or half orphans, please contact the management of the Home and we will be alad to consider placing them in the Home.

We express our thanks to all who have had any part in making it possible for us to have this Home. It provides a normal home life for the children and gives them the opportunities of the average child. This is a worthy cause, and we are depending on you to continue your support in the future as you have in the past.

The doors of the Home are open to visitors any time they wish to visit, and we would be glad for you to call or write the Superintendent for any information concerning the Home.

The matter of selecting a trustee of the Orphon's Home, to fill the vacancy created by the expiration of the term of Elder H. G. Taylor, was taken up; and, on motion, Elder A. G. Gregory was elected to a three year term.

The report on Christian and Ministerial Education was read by Elder W. T. Russell as follows:

CHRISTIAN AND MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

In every calling of man, whatever may be its nature, there is a need for knowledge respecting that work. We, your committee, believe that the scope of knowledge possessed by christians depends largely upon the teaching ability of the ministry, and no minister has the ability to teach anything that he does not know.

Our people can rise no higher in the knowledge of God and his will than the ministry is able to teach them. Therefore, it is necessary that the preacher acquire the very best knowledge possible that he may be able to impart it to others.

Every minister should know the proper usage of language, the meaning of words, the parts of speech, etc. This he needs in order that he may better understand what he reads, and be better qualified to deliver it to others. For, it is by words that we convey our thoughts to others.

We believe the ministry to be the greatest calling on earth; and surely, if special training is necessary in other fields that one may be able to render a more efficient service, it is even more important toward rendering our best service to God.

Far be it from your committee to leave the impression that the preaching of the gospel and the word of God depends entirely upon knowledge. We do not believe this at all, for Paul said, "Our gospel came not in word only." In this Paul teaches that there must be something in addition to knowledge of the word. He also said, "My speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power and much assurance." Therefore, without the power of God, our knowledge is as a blasted nut, but put them together and God's blessings will always follow.

Your committee believes that one of our greatest needs today is a permanently organized school under the authority of a local church, being regularly supported by sister churches for the benefit of God's preachers who have a desire to better prepare themselves for the work God has called them to do.

For those who could not enter humbly into such a school, and maintain their desire to service God with reverence and Godly fear, they definitely should not enter upon such an endeavor, but if love for God and His truth is the foremost desire of our hearts, it is our duty to show our love by faithful service in deed and in truth.

The time having arrived for the preaching of the doctrinal sermon, a song was called for; and after singing, "Wonderful City," the Moderator presented Elder W. T. Russell, the appointee of a year ago, to preach the sermon.

Brother Russell took the stand, and after some statements of thanks and appreciation for the honor again bestowed upon him by the messengers of the Association in their selection of hm for the eighth time to preach the doctrinal sermon, he read for a scripture lesson Ephesians 3:13 to 21, and chose verse 21 for a text. He used for a subject, "God's Glory in the

Church by Christ Jesus." The main theme of his discourse centered upon the fact that the church belonged to God and that all of her work, under God's direction, brought him glory.

Brother Russell showed that the glory belonged to God in the sending of John the Baptist, in the giving of his only begotten Son, the builder and founder, in the giving of the laws, by Christ Jesus, to govern, in the giving of the gospel as well as the grace to save and sustain. He showed and proved by the scriptures that the church which gave glory to God in the days of the apostles was the Baptist Church, as there were no others.

In a very plain and simple way, he showed that the Lord's church was set up during the personal ministry of Jesus Christ; also, contrary to the claims of men, the true church had never failed, and would not cease in time to give glory to God by Jesus Christ, as well as in the ceaseles ages of eternity.

Brother Russell urged the churches to be faithful and true as a waiting bride for the early return of the groom who has promised he will come again for her. He also urged everyone to ever keep in mind that great revelation to John while on the isle of Patmos, which event is sure to come to pass. ABSTRACTS OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being covinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

- 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and that they are the only tule of faith.
- 3. We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.
- 7. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects tor baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.
- 8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance except such as are regularly baptized and come under the hands of the Presbytery.
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entiled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in severa capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of he faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A. M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue three days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Aricle XI. New churches may be admitted into the Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sitting may admit any visiting brethren present, to sit with them, who shall have liberty to discuss any question and give their views but not to vote except upon subjects of general union.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majortiy vote of the members present.

Article XVI. That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a unanimous vote of messengers present.
