RULES OF DECORUM

- The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and a clerk shall be chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failing or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall whisper, laugh or read any book or paper while the Association is in session.
- 8. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 9. On the first day, immediately upon permanent organization, it shall be the duty of the clerk to read the Rules of Decorum. A roll call of messengers shall be made on the second day.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 11. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or the intimation of any other member.

PROCEEDINGS FIRST DAY - FRIDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1978

The Wiseman Baptist Association came together in its 87th annual session on the above date with McFerrin Avenue Missionary Baptist Church. 1208 McFerrin Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee. Services began at 10:00 A.M.

Bro. Don Xavier Hines led the singing accompanied at the piano by Bro. J. W. Gregory. After singing "One of These Mornings," Elder F. L. Ray. the moderator, made some brief remarks and then read for a devotional, Psalms 139: 1-12. Elder W. T. Russell of the Siloam Missionary Baptist Association, led the congregation in prayer. "When I've Traveled My Last Mile," was then sung.

Elder Howard G. Taylor, pastor of the host church, made remarks relative to McFerrin church having the opportunity to entertain the Wiseman Baptist Association, and he welcomed all to the session for worship and fellowship.

The moderator presented Elder Kenneth Woodall, the appointee, to preach the Introductory Sermon. Bro. Woodall expressed his appreciation for this opportunity and asked for the prayers of God's people. He read for a lesson, Luke 24:36-53, and used the theme of Repentance, using verse 47 of the lesson read as a basis of his message. "And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem."

Bro. Woodall began his message by pointing out the necessity of repentance and the preaching of the same. Scriptures used at this point were I Cor. 2:14; Rom. 8:5; Rom. 5:12: Isaiah 40:3-4, showing that people of various classes, races and levels of life were all brought to the same level of redemption through repentance to God, and that Heb. 6:1, teaches that repentance is a foundation doctrine, a proof text being Matt. 7:24-27.

The speaker made plain that repentance was not by proxy, but rather each individual had to repent for himself. He referred to Rom. 2:4, where the goodness of God leads men to repentance. Also presented was the fact repentance could not be diluted, that is, mixed with works of righteousness, to satisfy God who saves those who truly repent unto life.

Bro. Woodall referred to Jonah's preaching to Nineveh, that the call to repentance was to the king and his court as well as to all other people. This principle of preaching repentance without apology to any held true with John the Baptist, Matt. 3:1-10.

Paul's preaching to the Ephesians was "repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ." Acts 20:21. These scriptures were used to show the importance of repentance as taught by the prophets. John the Baptist. Christ the Apostles and by the true church for the past twenty centuries.

Jesus' statement in Luke 13:3, 5, shows best the importance of repentance. "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." This truly was a sound Bible message on the needed and important subject of "Repentance." The hand of appreciation was extended to Bro. Woodall and to one another while singing "Victory In Jesus," "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder," "Everybody Will Be Happy Over There" and "Living By Faith."

A portion of the letters were read. A motion carried to adjourn one hour for lunch. Announcements were made and Bro. Ray Smith, of the Southwestern District Association, prayed the benediction and offered thanks for the food.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The large crowd in attendance enjoyed a bountiful meal and hour of fellowship. Services resumed by singing, "That's The Man I Long To Be Like." Bro. J. W. Gregory led the singing with Bro. Don Xavier Hines at the piano. The moderator made welcome remarks to all visitors. Baptist Associations in Missouri, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee were represented among the visitors. Bro. F. L. Ray, the moderator, then read Eph. 6:10-20. Bro. Clarence F. Boze led the congregation in prayer, followed by the song "I Am Going To That City." The reading of the church letters was resumed at this time.

FRIDAY NIGHT

Services began at 7:00 P.M. with singing led by Bro. Don Xavier Hines who was accompanied at the piano by Bro. Bobby Butts. After singing "I'll Look For You Up There," and "He Did It All For Me," the moderator made preleminary remarks and once again welcomed the visitors. Elder Paul D. Johnson from Cedar County Association in Missouri, led the congregation in prayer, after which "Then I'll Have Everything." was sung.

The moderator presented Elder C. L. "Dee" Russell to preach the Missionary Sermon. Bro. Russell, after introductory remarks, read for a lesson, I Cor. 9:19-27. He expressed his belief that the things contained in the lesson read qualified a missionary. For his text, Bro. Russell used Acts 1:21. He also used here Isaiah 55:10-11. He referred to Eph. 3:21 to prove the glory was due unto God for the work of the church. Rom. 1:14; Rom. 8:12, were given to show we are debtors to the world to teach all nations through missions. Matt. 28:19-20

The following scriptures were given to present the fact of our obligation of was also given. preaching the gospel to all creatures, Acts 1:8, Mark 16:15, II Cor. 5:17. References were made to John the Baptist as a missionary. John 1:6. An Old Testament prophet spoke of his coming, Isaiah 40:3. His theme was repentance. Matt. 3:1-10.

The speaker gave Gal. 4:4 and John 7:17 concerning Jesus coming into the world, and that as a missionary. Bro. Russell gave the account of Peter in Acts 10, and his being sent for to go to the household of Cornelius at Caesarea who were Gentiles. But because God was in the matter it all worked out for good. Peter, a Jew, preached to the Gentiles who were saved. This was mission work and God took care of the gospel as referred to in the text. Another great missionary was Paul, a Jew, but was called and sent to the Gentiles, Acts 26:16-19.

Bro. Russell refreshed our minds and hearts to the fact that missions should be under the direction and leadership of the Lord, Luke 5:1-7; Deu. 32:2-4. He concluded his message with Eph. 3:21. He then called for a Christian handshake. During this time "Send The Light," and "I'd Rather Be An Old Time Christian," were sung. This was a good, sound, Baptist, scriptural message.

A number of good talks were made relative to missions and the Missionary Sermon just preached.

Moved and carried to adjourn to meet at 9:00 A.M. on Saturday.

After announcements Elder James H. Smith, for many years a Missionary in Japan and Israel, and also the organizer of McFerrin church serving as her first pastor, prayed the benediction.

SATURDAY - OCTOBER 21, 1978

On this date we came together at 9:00 A.M. with singing. Bro. Wayne Scott led the singing being accompanied at the piano by Sister Joan Oldham. "There's A Song In My Heart," was sung followed by remarks by the moderator relative to the visitors, the beautiful weather God had blessed us with and all other blessings bestowed upon us. He then read for a devotional lesson II Tim. 4:1-5. Elder Paul Patterson led the congregation in prayer, followed by the song, "What A Wonderful Day That Will Be."

The clerk read the Rules of Decorum and the roll of messengers. Minutes of the first day were read, including the night session. Motion for adoption carried.

The report on Christian and Ministerial Education, Sunday Schools and Prayer Meetings was read by Elder H. C. Vanderpool.

CHRISTIAN AND MINISTERIAL EDUCATION, SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND PRAYER MEETINGS

In this one report, we have four subjects. Therefore, we are limited on the time and attention that is needed on each topic.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

When parents and grandparents are Christians, without a doubt the first Christian education received by children and grandchildren, will be in the home. "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Pro. 22:6. We now look at another note on the subject. "We have heard with our ears, O God, our fathers have told us, what work thou didst in their days, in the times of old." Psalm 44:1. The Apostle Paul wrote, "And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurtue and admonition of the Lord." Eph. 6:4.

In addition to the teaching and training of children in the home, the parents should see that they themselves attend church, Sunday School and prayer meeting and take the children with them for further instructions in Christian education. When souls have been saved and then the saved have been baptized into the fellowship of a true Baptist church, they are to attend church services to be taught the things God has commanded, Matt. 28:19-20; Heb. 10:25.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

No doubt, one of the most quoted scriptures and heeded less, is. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God. a workman that needeth not to be ashamed. rightly dividing the word of truth." II Tim. 2:15.

God calls men into the ministry. He will direct, lead in our work, bless us with His Spirit and power, but He expects us to study His word prayerfully to know it, what it means how it is to be divided and taught. When we have done our part in study and preparation, we are then to depend upon the Holy Spirit to lead us in the preaching of the gospel and using the proper application. Each year a number of Bible Schools are being conducted in various Baptist churches across the country. Those who are able to attend, should do so. In the last week of March each year, the Old Union Baptist Ministers School is in session. Old Union Baptist Church, Highway 240, in south Warren County, Kentucky sponsors the School. Each minister who can possibly do so, should make plans to attend.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Sunday Schools have been a great part of the work, study and education of our Missionary Baptist people for a long time. Last year, only three churches of the thirty representing in the Wiseman Baptist Association did not report a Sunday School. This shows that 90% of the churches do have Sunday School.

For the past three decades, we have heard year after year, that if we could only write and distribute our own Sunday School literature, it would cause more people to be interested because the confidence in the use of literature teaching our doctrine and practice, would be encouraging. That dream has become a reality! We have been able to begin this work and it is now steadily growing. However, there is a need of more churches and pastors taking an interest in this important project. Much of that interest depends upon the interest and concern of the pastors. There is to be a report from the Associational Committee on the Literature later in the Association. Consult that report for more details on the work this year.

May all our churches, pastors and Sunday School teachers and officers, strive to have better Sunday Schools that our adults and youth may have a better Christian education.

PRAYER MEETINGS

We are taught in the Bible, and we who are saved know from experience, that through prayer and faith in Christ we were born again or saved by God's grace. The word "pray" appears in the Bible 201 times, and the word "prayer" appears 133 times, making a total of 334, in addition are a number of scriptures speaking of "calling upon the Lord" meaning to pray or engage in prayer.

Jesus prayed often. He taught his disciples to pray. He also left instructions in the Bible for us as God's children to be a praying people. We notice in scriptures where the church prayed and where many of God's people won victories, individuals became triumphant through prayer over sin and the enemy of satan.

We feel that every church could be made stronger, more powerful and be a greater light in the world by having a weekly prayer meeting. We would urge every church to begin a prayer meeting if you do not already have one. Without prayer, the individual Christian cannot live the life he should. Without prayer, a church cannot manifest God's power to the winning of lost souls and the edifying of God's people, and rightfully give God the glory that belongs to Him.

FAITH AND PRACTICE OF TRUE BAPTISTS

We, your committee, submit the following report:

For a beginning point we will give you the following quotation from Luke's gospel. "FORASMUCH as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us" Luke 1:1

We as true baptist have believed, preached and practiced the same doctrines for almost two thousand years.

We wish to refer you to some history concerning our faith and practice

through the years.

"The baptist have connections with the apostles through their line of succession which extends back three hundred and fifty years, where it connects with the Waldensens and reaching to the apostallic day......Baptist also have connection with the apostles in what they teach and practice." Christian Mess, Dec. 8, 1886.

James A. Harding, Champion of what is now known as the "Church of Christ," said: "The fundamental doctrine of the Baptists Is right; It's truth of God. They believe in the Bible as the word of God, the only and sufficient rule of faith and practice for christians; in the resurrection and kingship of Jesus; in a membership who have given their hearts and devoted their lives to Christ. In all these points of doctrine they are right." The Way Magazine for 1900. Alexander Campbell says:

The Baptist can trace their origin to Apostlic times and produce unequivocal testimony of their existence in every century to the present time, and the medel of their peculiarities, the scriptures themselves afford First century A.D. 33.

(Born of Water, PP. 69, 70)

Again, Mr. Campbell said:

"Clouds of witnesses attest the fact, that before the reformation from popery and from the Apostolic age, to the present time, the sentiments of Baptist, and the practice of baptism have had a continued chain of advocates, and public monuments of their existence in every century can be produced."

(Campbell McCalla Debate, P. 378)

The reader will notice that last year it was suggested that the. "NEW HAMPSHIRE CONFESSION OF FAITH" be placed in the minutes of this association, we refer the reader to these articles of faith, and trust that a careful study be made of what we believe and practice.

Sometimes the charge is made that we have written our own creed, But such charge is false. On page 43 of Pendleton Church Manual you will find the

following.

"As to declaration of faith, it must ever be understood that they are not substitutes for the scriptures. They are only exponents of what are conceived to be the fundamental doctrines of the word of God."

We are aware of the fact that this is a little different from other reports that have appeared in the minutes in the past years, but we believe that this will help all of us to realize the great heritage that has been handed down to us by our forefathers, and it should make us stronger in the faith that was once delivered to the saints.

TEMPERANCE, MORALITY, CHURCH DISCIPLINE

We your committee submit the following:

Temperance and Morality

We believe that a child of God is a new creature (2 Cor. 5:17) and should grow in grace and knowledg of God (2 Peter 3:18) and we should give all diligence; to add to our faith, virtue; and to virtue, knowledge; and to knowledge. temperance, and to temperance, patience,; and to patience, Godliness (2 Peter 1:5-6).

We should restrain ourselves from former conversation (conduct) of the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lust (Ephesians 4:22).

Even a child is known by his doings, whether his work be pure and whether it be right (Proverbs 20:11). So our path (ways) should be as a shining light that shineth more and more into the perfect day (Proverbs 4:18).

Church Discipline

We feel that church discipline is needful. Jesus taught this clearly in Matthew 18:15-17. He explained every step the church should take. This should always be done in love and christian kindness.

If discipline is necessary in families, schools, and armies, why is it not ne-

cessary in our churches?

Each member should examine himself and apply God's remedy to daily

life. If one fails to, it then becomes the duty of the church to take corrective measures. After the proper steps for correction have been taken, and he/she refuses to be corrected, then the church has a duty to withdraw fellowship from the offending member. (2 Thess. 3:15).

Motion made to adopt the report and that the discussion be suspended until after lunch due to the time having arrived for the Doctrinal Sermon. Motion carried.

"Where The Shades of Love Lie Deep," was sung. The moderator presented Elder Howard G. Taylor to preach the Doctrinal Sermon. Bro. Taylor expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to preach before this great body of Baptists. He read for a lesson I Peter 2:1-10. His text was Ps. 87:3, "Glorious things are spoken of thee, O city of God." He referred to Enoch, a man who walked with God, and certainly in any generation, those who desired to find the Lord, could. Hebrews 11 was called to our attention, the list of faithful heroes who believed in, and contended for the great doctrines of God.

The speaker pointed out that false organizations, called churches, had their origin by works of men, and were only for the purpose of confusing people and hindering them in hearing the truth and doctrines of the Bible as taught by true Baptists. Heb. 8:5 was quoted as a proof that Moses was to do according as directed by the Lord. That we today, as in centuries past, are to labor under the directions of God.

Bro. Taylor spoke of true Baptists as being the only people who believe in works and faith as taught in the Bible. He also mentioned the house of God. Solomon's Temple, which was erected on Mt. Moriah in Jerusalem, I Kings 7:1-51. He then brought back to our minds his lesson concerning lively stones used to erect the house of God, that is, the church of the Lord, which Jesus established during his ministry on earth.

Scriptures given concerning the ministry of the church were II Cor. 4:1,7: I Cor. 12:28. Bro. Taylor concluded his message speaking of the church Jesus organized at Jerusalem as the Kingdom, that when another was organized, the two constituted the kingdom, and now the many true individual, independent bodies, compose the kingdom. He closed this great doctrinal sermon by reading Rev. 19:7-9, speaking of the marriage supper of the Lamb. In addition, Rev. 21:9, was read and then John 14:1-3, referring to a prepared place for the true church, the Bride of Christ.

This good sound doctrinal sermon was enjoyed and appreciated. The congregation pressed forward and extended their hand of appreciation to Bro. Taylor while shaking hands with one another and singing "I'm Bound For That City." "What Will I Leave Behind?" "Better Farther On." and "That Glad Reunion Day." Elder James H. Smith made a good speech relative to his return to Japan soon to view the mission field there where he spent so many years. He would then be returning in a few weeks to his pastorate in Nashville.

Moved to adjourn one hour for lunch. Announcements were made and Elder Rufus Chandler from West Tennessee prayed the benediction and offered thanks for the food.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Once again the large congregation attending this 87th annual session of Wiseman Baptist Association enjoyed the fine food provided for our enjoyment and bodily need. "I Need The Prayers of Those I Love," was sung and the moderator read John 16:7-13. Elder Harold Carver from West Tennessee led the congregation in prayer. "I Can Hear Them Singing Over There," was sung with Bro. Preston Ezell leading, being accompanied at the piano by Bro. Don Xavier Hines.

At this time the four ministers who had served McFerrin church as pastor were present and were recognized. They were, beginning with the first and on to the present as follows: Elder James H. Smith, Elder F. L. Ray, Elder A. G. Gregory and Elder Howard G. Taylor.

Business resumed and the report on Temperance, Morality and Church Discipline which was read before noon was discussed at this time by Elder W. E. Massey, Elder Bobby Gann, Elder Edgar Brown and Elder A. G. Gregory, Motion for adoption carried.

The report on Financing The Lord's Work was read by Elder P. H. Brooks.

A report on the Associational Sunday School Literature Committee was read by Elder H. C. Vanderpool.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE COMMITTEE REPORT

We, the undersigned, are four of the five-member Sunday School Literature Committee appointed at the 85th annual session of this Association two years ago. One member, Elder Charles Moore, having moved out of the Association.

One year ago we reported that the first quarter (Spring Quarter, March, April, May 1978) was completed in manuscript form and ready to go to the press.

It was also reported that New Bethel Missionary Baptist Church. Goodlettsville. Tennessee, a church of this Association had accepted the recommendation of our committee to sponsor the said work of having our own Sunday School Literature written, printed and distributed to all our churches desiring to use it.

For the Spring Quarter (March, April, May 1978) 49 of our churches in six states used the literature. For the Summer Quarter (June, July, August 1978) 60 churches ordered and used the literature. For the Fall Quarter (September, October, November 1978) 61 churches from these six states. Michigan, Illinois. Ohio. Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee, ordered the literature. Orders are now coming in for the (Winter Quarter-December 1978, January, February 1979), which will be completing the first year of the writing, publishing and distribution of our own Sunday School Literature.

The over-all expenses each Quarter amounts to approximately \$4,000.00, which would mean our churches have responded in an encouraging way to use Sunday School Literature written and published by our own Missionary Baptist people. So far, with the initial offerings of several sister churches, the project has been paying its way. We further urge churches which are not using the literature at this time to prayerfully consider this work and support it in prayer, money and usage.

Based upon the amount of copies used during the first three quarters, the approximate number of pieces used the first year will be 16,000.

A motion was made that the sermon on Friday night of each year be a Memorial Sermon, and that the preacher to preach it be selected the same way and at the same time as the Introductory and Doctrinal sermons. Motion carried.

Moved that the clerk have 1500 copies of the minutes printed and distributed to the churches according to their contributions, and the balance of the minute fund be paid to the clerk for his labors. Carried.

The minutes of the day were read. Moved and carried that they be adopted. Moved that the Association adjourn to meet with Harmony Missionary Baptist Church. 1044 E. Trinity Lane, Nashville, Tennessee, on Friday, October 26, 1979 at 10:00 A.M. Motion carried.

Announcements were made and Bro. Brad Adams prayed the final benediction of this 87th annual session of Wiseman Baptist Association. This was a great session of this old body of Missionary Baptists.

CLERK'S NOTE: Elder F. L. Ray, who had served this body as Moderator for 30 years, passed away only a few days after the close of this 87th annual session. I felt it only proper that instead of placing a memorial tribute of him in this minute, which would have been unauthorized, to leave this to Wiseman Baptist Association in its next annual session.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the Independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A.M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall consti-

tute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice

as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into the Association who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messenger or Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or

Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a Sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association, at its sitting may welcome any visiting brethren present, who shall have liberty to join in the discussion of any report listed in the Order of Business, but shall have no vote in any action of the association.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular

meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI. That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote of the messengers present, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a two-thirds vote of messengers present.

NEW HAMPSHIRE CONFESSION OF FAITH 1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction: that it has God as its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.
