

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A.M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into the Association who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a Sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association, at its sitting may welcome any visiting brethren present, who shall have the liberty to join in the discussion of any report listed in the Order of Business, but shall have no vote in any action of the Association.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI. That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a two-thirds vote.

Article XVII. If any Church fails to represent one or more years, and then desires to reenter the fellowship of this Association, there being, evidently, a reason for not representing, there must be a motion for their reentering the Association to be carried by a two-thirds vote. This action is to be taken after permanent organization and at the time to receive petitionary letters.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be chosen annually to serve the Association.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 8. On the first day, immediately upon permanent organization, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum. A roll call of messengers shall be made on the second day.
- 9. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 10. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or any other member.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are

the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith.

3. We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the

imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

- 6. We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.
- 7. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.

8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are regularly baptized and come under the hands of

the Presbytery.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

FIRST DAY PROCEEDINGS

On October 22, 1993, the Wiseman Missionary Baptist Association began its 103rd session. The Association began with Brother David Armstead leading the congregation in song. Brother Eddie Crook played the piano. The songs were "I'll Live in Glory" and "Someday."

Brother Armstead took this opportunity to encourage the pastors present

to support the Cumberland Valley School of Music.

Brother Jerry Shrum, our Moderator of a year ago, expressed his appreciation to the Lord for the privilege of attending the Association this year. He read the 8th Psalm for a devotional scripture. Then asked Brother Billy Moran, Moderator of the Siloam Association, to lead in prayer.

The congregation, after good prayer, sang "I Never Shall Forget the Day."

INTRODUCTORY SERMON

Brother Shrum introduced Brother Larry Gregory. Brother Gregory was the choice of the 1992 Messengers to preach the Introductory Sermon this year.

Brother Gregory told us his experience of salvation. He said, he was privileged to sit under the preaching of Brother Calvin Gregory. He said the spirit of God convicted him of sin when he was about eight years old. He said his self-righteousness got in his way for awhile but after repentance toward God and faith in Christ, God saved him. He was about 11 at the time.

Brother Gregory read EX 3:1-15. He called our attention to the 13th verse of his lesson for a text. He used for a subject, "What is His Name?" "What Shall I Say unto Them?"

Brother Gregory said he enjoyed preaching on the questions recorded in the Bible. He acknowledged that he didn't know all the questions let alone all the answers.

Moses said who am I. He had killed an Egyptian, fled to the wilderness, and spent 40 years out there caring for sheep. Moses' question is easy to understand. I felt that way when I was called to preach and when I was elected to preach this sermon.

He said, I respect church authority. Mace's Hill ordained me, but had they called me into the ministry, I would have quit many times.

"What is His name?" God said tell them, I am that I am. God is eternal from everlasting to everlasting. Nothing or nobody brought God into existence. The Bible says in the beginning God created. He was there when all creation came into existence and it happened at his command.

The Jewish people respected the name of God and were careful not to use his name in vain. He said, we ought to have the same respect today for God's name.

Many educators today are denying the Genesis record of creation. They also deny the God that created all things. Some say that everything came from cells washed ashore from the sea.

He said, God's first commandment said thou shall have no other Gods before me. Many are worshipping everything but God.

Some are going so far today, they say God's word doesn't condemn

homosexual marriages. People are not respecting God's word or God.

God made promises to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. He kept the promises he made. He often said, I am the God of Abraham, Issac, and Jacob. Brother Gregory said, If God spoke to us today, I think he would say I am the God of Calvin Gregory, Cap Massey, A.J. Sloan, F.W. Lambert, W.T. Russell, F.L. Ray, and others. He is also our God. He gave our Brethren before us great meetings with many souls being saved. He can do the same for us today.

Jesus said, before Abraham was I AM. Jesus is God, the Son, our Mediator, and Savior. The Holy Spirit of God is the great comforter. He is the great I AM. The spirit of God makes all things possible. He reproves the world of sin, righteousness, and judgement to come.

Who sent us? Elohiym (God), the God of Abraham, of our Father, and our God whose name is Jehovah.

Brother Shrum came to the pulpit and expressed his appreciation for the good sermon. The congregation passed by to give Brother Gregory their hand as they sang "Footprints of Jesus."

HOW DO WE MAKE OUR SUNDAY SCHOOLS MORE EVANGELISTIC?

Sunday School is the central organization of church growth and should be regarded as the finest tool available to us in church today.

Here are four steps to consider in growth and maintenance of a growing Sunday School:

- 1. Find the people
- 2. Provide the space
- 3. Equip the leadership
- 4. Divide and multiply

Each member of Sunday School and church should be a promoter for our Sunday School. We should emphasize with enthusiasm in our communities, work place, and anywhere we come in contact with the unchurched people.

We should have the space available for classes that are required. We must use all our space and resources that God has provided for us.

Our teachers should be trained to communicate, understand, and teach or instruct with love from their hearts, able to teach God's word with power and understanding of his Holy and Divine Spirit. The troubles and trials of today should be associated with Biblical teachings.

As our classes grow, they can be divided into separate groups for more

room for extra growth. The number one goal for a Sunday School should be to enroll and teach the unsaved. Oftentimes it seems our primary task in Sunday School is nurturing the Christians.

Without an emphasis on evangelism, the Sunday School loses its central focus, sinks to mediocrity, and simply struggles to maintain enrollment growth.

The Sunday School should have a force for studying and teaching the word of God, a force for evangelizing and bringing lost sinners to our Savior. A force for instruction and education in the mightiest things claiming the attention of men and women and as a force for mission operations in the worldwide sense. A force for making Christian character in men and women, boys and girls. For opening the door of usefulness in a large scale - in all these things so essential in the life and mission of the church, the Sunday School can completely provide.

Our situation today calls for prayer, the empowering of the Holy Spirit, and a commitment to hard work. We can grow if we are willing to pay the price for reaching our communities for Jesus Christ.

The signs of religious hunger are seen everywhere. Neither the commission of the church nor its source of empowering have been altered. The gospel is relevant to the needs of humanity as at any other time in history. I believe that the opportunity exists for unparalleled growth in Sunday School attendance and souls being saved. We must, however, capture the clear focus on evangelism.

In order for us to create a climate for evangelism, we must drop some of our defense mechanisms. We make excuses for non-growth. Some forces that work against us are jealousy, apathy, lack of love, sin, and selfishness.

Many Sunday Schools flounder because they have no goals. We need a target to shoot toward. We need attendance and enrollment goals. They should be very bold but attainable. It takes commitment to grow, hard work, money, and some inconvenience. Most of us are willing to pay the price in these areas. We must be prepared to pay the price for criticism. Some people in the church will oppose growth. They don't want the inconvenience, the work, or the cost involved. They like things the way they were.

But we must "hang in there"! The dividends exceed the investment. The joy of seeing lost people come to know Christ, the exhilaration of seeing Christians grow in their faith, and the privilege of knowing that God's supernatural power is at work through you and your church.

In conclusion, prayer is not the last step, but it is the very breath of the Christian life. Prayer allows the spirit of God to infuse and empower.

Our definition of evangelism: A concerted effort to confront the unbeliever with the truth about and claims of Jesus Christ and to challenge him or her with the view of leading him or her into repentance toward God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ and, thus, into the fellowship of the church.

God said "Be fruitful and multiply, and replenish the earth" GEN 1:28. Our churches are made up of families. Therefore, we as the churches of God are responsible for their spiritual growth. - II. God's purpose for each family member.
 - A. Father husband is the spiritual leader, the head of the wife. EPH 5:23.
 - Love God Be saved, a member of his church, doing his will.
 JOS 24:15...as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.

 - 2. Love the Wife EPH 5:28, as Christ loves the church. Love her as your own body. EPH 5:28. Honor the wife I PET 3:17. Provide for her I TIM 5:8.
 - 3. Love his Children. Teach them to be saved DEU 6:7. Train them up in the ways of the Lord PRO 22:6. Admonish or reprove them with mildness. Counsel them against wrong practice. EPH 6:4. Chasten them. Withhold not correction from the child; for if thou beatest him with the rod, he shall not die. PRO 23:13. Correction in love gives children much needed boundaries. He that spareth his rod hateth his son; but he that loveth him chasteneth him. PRO 13:24. Take them to church and have family devotions.
 - B. Wife mother keeper at home help mate.
 - Love God Be saved, honor husband, win lost husband by chaste conduct. I PET 34:2. Trust God by obeying the husband. I PET 3:5-6.
 - Love the Husband helpmate. Encourage him in the things of God. A
 godly woman can be of great strength to the man of God Sara. I PET
 3:6. An ungodly woman can be his downfall Jezebel to Ahab I KGS

19:1-2.

3. Love the Children - keeper at home. Organize a godly home - TIT 2:5. Honor the husband and so will the children that the work of God be

not blasphemed. TIT 2:5.

C. Children honor and obey parents, love God, get saved young. Suffer little children and forbid them not to come unto me; for such is the kingdom of heaven. MAT 19:14. Remember God in your young life. ECC 12:1. Honor father and mother - long life - EPH 6:2, 3. Obey your parents - EPH 6:1. Love your brothers and sisters.

III. God's role - for the church - for the family.

- A. To encourage and help each family member to grow spiritually. II PET 3:18.
 - 1. Sunday School
 - 2. Bible Study
 - 3. Church Services (Powerful)
 - a. Songs of Praise
 - b. Prayers
 - c. Sermon

 - 1. Pastors preach on family life from God's point of view.
 - 2. Minister to the needs of single parents and single individuals.
 - 3. Children's Bible studies even outside Sunday School.
 - 4. Christian education when possible.
 - 5. Bible studies for the men.
 - 6. Bible studies for the women.
- IV. Family was established by God and the church was established by God. Strong families will give you a strong church. The responsibility of the church is to meet the spiritual needs of the family. This takes place not only in the house of God, but in our homes and in other places where God gathers us together.

Brother Brown began his sermon by telling us about the brevity of life, quoting a portion of JOB 14, he proclaimed life was short just a few days and full of trouble.

The apostle Paul said, "If we have hope of Christ in this life only we are of all men most miserable."

He gave Mephibosheth all that had belonged to Saul and his father Jonathan. We could do nothing to save ourselves but God saved us for Jesus' sake. Heaven is our home by God's grace.

Brother Brown said if Able were here tonight he would say, It pays to give God your best. Enoch would say, It pays to walk with God. Stephen would say, God's cause is worth dying for. John the Baptist lost his head, martyred for preaching the truth but had he the chance he would do it again.

Brother Brown closed by saying we have a better place to go and one day those gone on to be with Jesus will return with him. We will all meet him in the air and with Jesus forever be.

The congregation sang "Glad Reunion Day," while pressing forward to give Brother Brown a hand of endorsement. Some testimonies were given followed by the old song, "Who Beautiful Heaven Must Be."
