CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to four messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A.M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into the Association who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a Sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association, at its sitting may welcome any visiting brethren present, who shall have the liberty to join in the discussion of any report listed in the Order of Business, but shall have no vote in any action of the Association.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI. That all questions arising before this Association be decided by a majority vote, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a two-thirds vote.

Article XVII. If any Church fails to represent one or more years, and then desires to reenter the fellowship of this Association, there being, evidently, a reason for not representing, there must be a motion for their reentering the Association to be carried by a two-thirds vote. This action is to be taken after permanent organization and at the time to receive petitionary letters.

Article XVIII. No preacher shall preach before the Association two years in succession.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be chosen annually to serve the Association.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 8. On the first day, immediately upon permanent organization, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum, A roll call of messengers shall be made on the second day.
- The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 10. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or any other member.

ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

- 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith.
- We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself 4. from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.
- We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness 5. of Jesus Christ.
- We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away 6, and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.
- We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they 7, were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.

We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are 8, regularly baptized and come under the hands of the Presbytery.

We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of 9, the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

FIRST DAY FRIDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1999

After a dry, hot summer, we came together for the Wiseman Baptist Association. New Zion Baptist Church was our host for the 109th session.

With Bro. Donnie Hines playing the piano, Bro. Lonnie Cockriel led, "What A Day That Will Be" and "I Never Shall Forget The Day."

Brother Kenneth Massey, Moderator, came making remarks about the beautiful day and the sweet spirit we have already felt. The 148th Psalm was read for devotion.

Request was made for prayer for Bro. Larry Gregory and family concerning the loss of his mother. Bro. Henry Smith led in prayer, reminding us of the greatness of God, thanking God for friends and fellowship. Bro. Smith begged God to please come and be with us and remembered those who were unable to be with us because of ill health. Following the prayer, Bro. Cockriel led. "When We All Get To Heaven."

Bro. Kevin Perdue, Pastor of New Zion Church came at this time welcoming us to this church and spoke of the greatness of unity using love as a lesson.

Bro. Larry Gregory, former pastor of New Zion came using Proverbs 31 for a scriptural lesson. Bro. Gregory told of the joy he feels by the Association meeting here these two days. He spoke of the works for God that his mother had done throughout her lifetime.

Bro. Massey made several remarks on the history of the Wiseman Association and then proceeded by introducing Bro. Deric McClard who was elected last year to preach the Introductory Sermon for 1999. Galatians 3:26, "Peace Among The Children Of God." The second Chapter of Hebrews was used as proof scripture telling about us being brothers. Bro. McClard reminded us that earthly brothers and sisters had disagreements, saying that christian brothers also disagree giving Cain and Able as examples, as well as Esau and Jacob, Joseph and his brothers, David and Goliath, Mary, and Christ. Bro. McClard said there is no place in God's work for strife. With God we are all equal because of Christ's shed blood. John 17 was used and Ephesians 2:13 to prove the point that christians must be united, not divided. I Corinthians 12 reinforced our gifts and the operation of our talents. Bro. McClard said talents and responsibility were given by the same source. Rewards will not be equal, but there is no place for discord among us. At the conclusion of the introductory sermon. Bro. Bro. Kenneth Massey, moderator, called for Report #1, "Practical Means for Our Churches to Unite Our Efforts Without Sacrificing the Autonomy of the Local Church." Elder Eugene Brown, Elder Paul Patterson, Elder Kenneth Massey, Brother Wayne Scott, and Elder Tom Armstrong spoke, the report was adopted.

A church's territorial rights are limited or confined within its own body. It has no power to discipline, police, dictate, or correct any other church; otherwise, that local church would lose its independence. To submit to or be controlled by or even threatened by another church is unscriptural. The independent church has the power and authority from God as a living organism. The Lord "only" is to be the church's head. A church is privileged to be its own interpreter as to what the Bible teaches. There are no ecclesiastical powers or rights to supervise over any other churches, its power, or its leadership from the independent church.

The local church is its own republic within itself. Webster defines a republic to be "a little republic within itself."

"A government in which supreme power resides in a body of citizens is entitled to vote and is exercised by elected officers and representative responsibility to them. A territorial unit."

In the case of the seven churches in Asia, most of them had problems of gross sin within themselves. However, God reserved Himself through His guidance to inform each of them of their own problem and if not repented of to His satisfaction the candlestick would be removed. Where in the Bible does God give the authority for one church to straighten out or bring about a threat to another church?

Our projected desire naturally is to try to keep our church clean. True, but how clean is clean? If you should take the record book or history of any church you will not find one spotless church. Even Jesus started the first church with a devil in it. If a devil (Judas) baptized, which the record indicated he did, then we have an error in the first church; and if we are to correct our errors we must go back to the first church. Jesus sat in and ordained a devil. So if Jesus sat in and ordained a devil knowingly, he did not set an example of a perfect church.

John 4:1,2: "When therefore the Lord knew how the Pharisees had heard that Jesus made and baptized more disciples than John, (though Jesus himself baptized not. but his disciples)."

True Baptists have always contended that people baptized by other denominations to be alien and not practiced or accepted among us by honoring their baptism.

In the case of Christians in error, we are to receive all that can give a testimony of

salvation based on the Lord's command in Revelation 18:4 "And I heard another voice from heaven, saying, Come out of her (Babylon, a system of doctrine) my people." God addresses them as His people. If God addressed them as His people, then is it not the duty of churches to help them come out or say no? You and your kindred just go on in error and be partakers of the plagues. We may have to baptize them (that are saved); take them by letter if the receiving church can ascertain they have valid baptism receiving them by letter as we covenanted together in our church covenant. "As soon as we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with another church where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant." In order to carry out the spirit of our subject, "Practical means for our churches to unite our efforts without sacrificing the autonomy of the local church." The trend today is not to grant the letter and hold their members hostages for the rest of their lives. In the spirit of progress and aid to those in our community that desire fellowship with that local church, if they cannot receive a letter then take them by statement. A letter is what it states, "a member in regular standing." It is not a document but a courtesy. People need to enjoy their salvation and raise their families in the fear and admonition of the Lord in the community where they live.

The Wiseman Baptist Association met first at Cedar Bluff in 1891. I am assuming they adopted our constitution then.

I would like to site Article VI: These associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the churches.

Article VII: It shall be the object of these associations to promote the union of the faith of the gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article XII: The association may exclude from the <u>union</u> any church or churches that are *heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

"At variance with a commonly accepted doctrine in religion. Opposed to orthodox."

If we are to maintain peace and progress among us we would do well to work together in the spirit of and admonition Paul gave to the Ephesians 4:2,3, "With all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love; Endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

After a bountiful, delicious lunch, we came together with Bro. Clyde Dilleha leading "I Have Found the Way", with Bro. Donnie Hines at the piano.

Psalms 107:1-7 was read by Moderator Kenneth Massey for a devotional and he called on Bro. Raymond Hargis to lead in prayer. Bro. Hargis gave thanks for all the blessings and made requests that the Lord would help us to be used in the way God would be pleased.

At this time, Bro. Deric McClard gave the report on "The Responsibility of the Lord's Churches to the American Family: What Can We Do to Keep Families Together and Help Those That Have Been Broken." Bro. Deric McClard, Bro. Kenneth Massey, Bro. Johnny Carver and Bro. Paul Patterson spoke on this subject. The report was adopted.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Marriage is one of the most sacred unions in the economy of God's Creation. Appropriately described as "holy" (Chapman 33), it has been identified as that "honorable estate instituted by God and signifying unto us the mystical union which exists between Christ and His Church" (156). But although a fundamental institution such as this should be revered and celebrated, it has far too often been despised, and the American family has suffered. In "The Breakdown of the Family," Patrick F. Fagan explains the crisis:

In 1950, for every 100 children born. 12 entered a broken family. Today, for every 100 children born, 60 will enter a broken family. Each year, about one million children experience the divorce of their parents, 1.25 million are born out of wedlock, and another 1.4 million are aborted. Child abuse is growing steadily, and child sexual abuse is growing fastest of all. In short, Americans are literally turning against their children. But adults suffer as well from the breakdown of the family institution. (1)

The divorce rate in America is the highest in the world (Fagan 4), and Robert Hughes goes as far as to suggest that "for every marriage that occurs in this country there is about one divorce" (1). Other sociologists point out the undesirable consequences that follow the breakdown of the family unit. They include a rise in "crime, addiction, abuse, illness, and underachievement" (Fagan 2). When confronted with such startling facts as these, we must carefully consider our responsibilities in order to more clearly identify what we can do to keep families together and help those that have been broken.

Christ commissioned His Church to be a disciple-making, disciple-baptizing, disciple-teaching body. (See Matthew 28:19-20.). To defend the now beleaguered family unit, we must take this latter responsibility very seriously. By teaching our flocks "to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you," we can provide the scriptural instruction and spiritual direction that are necessary to have a successful marriage and strong Christian family in "the midst of a crooked and perverse nation." (See Philippians 2:15.) As we do so, certain things must be stressed:

- Marriage I.
 - Its divine institution Genesis 2:18-24 Α
 - Its spiritual endorsement Proverbs 18:22
 - Its honorable character Hebrews 13:4 C.
 - Its symbolic significance Ephesians 5:22-44 D
- Divorce Matthew 5:31-32, 19:3-9 П.
- Relationship Guidelines Eph. 5:22-6:4, Col. 3:18-21, I Cor. 7:3-5 Ш.
 - Husbands and wives A.
 - Parents and children

As we are given the opportunity and led by the Spirit of God, we must preach these things

from our pulpits; teach them in our Bible studies; share them during our counseling sessions, conferences, and retreats; and declare them with great boldness and a profound sense of urgency through all available means (radio, TV, Internet).

In addition to educating our congregations about the already-mentioned items, we can work to keep families together by providing opportunities within the church and activities outside the church to promote healthy interaction among family members. Why should the work of our churches not provide a forum for the forging of more solid relationships between husbands and wives and parents and children? Let us be "always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." (See I Corinthians 15:58.) Our churches might also follow the example of the early church at Jerusalem by providing financial assistance for families with special needs. (See Acts 4:34-35.) Such needs are a contributing factor to many of the divorces in our country. We can lessen this great burden by utilizing our resources to take care of our own.

As we earnestly endeavor to preserve and defend the vitality and integrity of the family unit within our churches, we must recognize that some, if not many, in our congregations are, have been, or someday will be a part of a broken home. What can be done to help these brothers and sisters? Knowing that we cannot succeed with insensitive methods which involve fault-finding or guilt-imposing, we must remember that these suffering souls need the genuine, self-sacrificing love of their fellow church members. Are we not taught that this love "beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all thing, endureth all thing"? (See I Corinthians 13:7.) This love ought to characterize God's children. (See I John 4:7-8, John 13:35, I John 3:18.) It is needed by victims of broken homes.

To effectively deal with the serious social problems that seek to hinder the cause of God, we must remember our duties as Christians and members of the Lord's Body. Although it may seem that we are losing the war to uphold marriage and defend the family unit, we must continue to boldly teach God's Word, to cheerfully give of our time and energy and resources to those who are needy, and to vehemently demonstrate that powerful love that is "shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us." (See Romans 5:5.) Thus, we can gain the victory and be found discharging our duties as members of the Lord's Church.

At this time Bro. Henry Smith came forward and gave his report on "What Can Be Done to Improve the Correspondence Between the Missionary and the Churches?" Bro. Smith, Bro. Wayne Scott, and Bro. Donnie Hines spoke on this subject. The report was adopted.

I can't begin to tell you how important this subject is. You would have to be out in some destitute mission field to understand it fully. The missionary likes very much to hear from home. It is very encouraging to receive a message from some church or an individual as to how it is back home. Sometimes when receiving a letter with a check inside, he looks at that but that is not all, he looks to see if there is a good letter enclosed. Sometimes just a note and sometimes a long encouraging message. Such correspondence often comes at a time when he is in much need of a lift. God knows our needs and what to do to fill that need. The missionary is encouraged by a message from churches at home and churches are encouraged by the message from the missionary. This must be mutual to be as affective as it should be, not a oneway street.

HOW TO IMPROVE THIS CORRESPONDENCE

Prayer is the answer to so many places to be filled in for the Lord's services; and I.

in missions this is no exception. So many times we received letters from somebody telling us that they were praying for us. Prayer stirs the hearts of people and in turn they want to do something for those they are praying for. This happens in the cause of missions.

- II. Listen to the Spirit. Distance makes no difference with the Spirit of God, and He can convey His message to where he wants it to go, and this can be by touching the hearts of one of His to write that message, and send it.
- III. Bible example: Though there were no postal services in Bible days as we have, but there were messengers who traveled from missionary to church conveying a message from one to the other. The apostle Paul rejoiced greatly when he received a message and offering from the church at Philippi by the hand of a man named Epaphroditus.

THE PHILLIPPIAN CHURCH:

"When I departed from Macedonia, no church communicated with me as concerning giving and receiving but ye only. For even in Thessolonica ye sent once and again to my necessity. Not because I desire a gift; but I desire fruit that may abound to your account. But I have all; and abound I am full, having received of Epaphroditus the things which were sent from you, an odour of a sweet smell, a sacrifice acceptable well pleasing to God" Phillippians 4:15-18.

THE CHURCH OF THE COLOSSIANS:

The apostle Paul was so moved by the Message which he had heard by a man named Epaphras that he prayed a great moving prayer for the Colossians. The expressions of his heart are written in his letter: "for this cause we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you." And his great prayer follows. Please read Colossians 1:4-12.
