### CONSTITUTION

Article I. This body shall be known as Wiseman Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from churches to the Association shall give the number of members in fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, restored, excommunicated, and dead, since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to four messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be to serve their brethren in their several capacities.

Article VI. These associations shall never interfere with the independence of any Church, or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union

of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock A.M., after the third Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings will be missionary in practice as

well as theory.

Article XI. New Churches may be admitted into the Association who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to the Messengers present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or

Churches that are heterodox in principle or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a Sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association, at its sitting, may welcome any visiting brethren present, who shall have the liberty to join in the discussion of

any report listed in the Order of Business, but shall have no vote in any action of the Association.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular

meeting by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI. All questions arising before this Association shall be decided by a majority vote, except in the reception of churches into our fellowship, and that such reception be by a two-thirds vote.

Article XVII. If any Church fails to represent one or more years, and then desires to reenter the fellowship of this Association, there being, evidently, a reason for not representing, there must be a motion for their reentering the Association to be carried by a two-thirds vote. This action is to be taken after permanent organization and at the time to receive petitionary letters.

Article XVIII. No preacher shall preach before the Association two years in

succession.

### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- A Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall be chosen annually to serve the Association.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother Moderator, and shall, while speaking, confine himself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairman on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother.
- 8. On the first day, immediately upon permanent organization, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum. A roll call of messengers shall be made on the second day.
- The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, providing the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 10.Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or any other member.

### ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

- 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith.
- We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith and follow after justification.
- 7. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.
- 8. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are regularly baptized and come under the hands of the Presbytery.
- We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

### FIRST DAY FRIDAY, OCTOBER 20, 2000

Messengers arrived to a warm welcome from Pastor Deric McClard and to refreshments served by the members of Longview Baptist Church, our host for the 110<sup>th</sup> session.

With Brother McClard playing the piano, Brother Mike Patterson led the congregation in singing "My God is Real" and "By Faith I Believe."

Brother Kenneth Massey, Moderator, opened with remarks concerning the meeting of the association one hundred years ago and welcomed the messengers and visitors to the 110<sup>th</sup> session. Brother Massey read Ephesians 2: 18-22 for a devotion and spoke of the importance of building together.

Brother Ray Smith, a member of Independent Baptist Church in the Southwestern District Missionary Baptist Association, led in prayer. Brother Smith gave thanks to God for all good and perfect gifts, for the protection of the messengers on the highways, for the churches represented and the many saved over the years. He thanked God for every minister, deacon, and lay person in attendance and prayed God's blessings upon the lost, the sick, and the afflicted.

Brother Massey then recognized Brother Jim Tucker who came rejoicing to sing "There's Something There That I Can't Tell." Brother Massey relayed the good news of a young lady being saved in a recent prayer meeting conducted by Brother Tucker at Three Springs Baptist Church.

Brother Massey proceeded to introduce Brother Paul Patterson, who was elected last year to preach the introductory sermon for 2000, and spoke of his long friendship with Brother Patterson. Brother Patterson related his salvation experience and his call to preach. He expressed his desire to please God and his need for the leadership of the Holy Spirit. Brother Patterson read Genesis 6:14-18 and 22 for his lesson and used "The Importance of Following God's Pattern" for his theme. Brother Patterson spoke of Noah following God's pattern in the building of the ark on which he, his family, and the animal kingdom were saved from the flood waters. He spoke of how the first-born of the children of Israel were spared by following God's pattern to apply the blood of the properly prepared lamb to

the two side posts and the upper door post of their houses on the prescribed night. Brother Patterson spoke of Moses building the tabernacle according to God's pattern and of the worship therein being conducted according to God's instruction. He spoke of God smiting Uzzah for putting his hand to the ark of God in violation of God's command. Brother Patterson also recounted how the walls of Jerico fell when Joshua followed God's instruction and how every piece of Solomon's temple was put in place without the sound of a hammer because the material had been prepared according to God's blueprint. Brother Patterson reminded us how Jesus taught that God is a spirit and that we must worship Him in spirit and in truth. He spoke from Isaiah 44 of the blessings of worshiping the true and living God contrasted with the folly of idol worship. Brother Patterson quoted from Romans 12 to remind us of our responsibilities and from Hebrews 10 of the importance of exhorting one another to be about God's business. Brother Patterson's sermon was delivered in a spirit of love and encouragement. At the conclusion of the sermon, Brother Donnie Hines led "I'm in the Glory Land Way" and "Victory in Jesus" while the congregation met in the altar, shaking hands with Brother Patterson and each other.

Brother Massey then asked Brother Gregory to read the Rules of Decorum.

### PETITIONARY LETTERS

In response to the moderator's call for petitionary letters, Brothers Ron Laferty and Tim Simpson rose to request that New Life Missionary Baptist Church in Surgoinsville, Tennessee be admitted into the association. Brother Massey then read, one by one, the principles from the ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES OF WISEMAN ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS and asked Brothers Laferty and Simpson to affirm, one by one, their belief in each principle. This having been accomplished, Brother Bobby Sutton moved that the Church be received. Brother Johnny Carver seconded, and the motion passed without exception. The moderator acknowledged the acceptance by shaking hands with the two messengers.

The moderator read Song of Solomon 6: 10-13, and made some remarks about the Bride of Christ. Elder Kenneth Davis led the association in prayer. Brother Donnie Hines then sang "If I Can Help Somebody" after making some remarks about "Victory in Jesus" and Brother Luther Drummond's role in typesetting the song in 1939. The moderator offered words of appreciation to Longview Church for the meal.

Invitations were extended to the association by McFerrin and New Zion. After remarks by messengers from both churches, the association chose McFerrin Missionary Baptist Church at 431 Old Hickory Boulevard, Nashville, TN, for the meeting place for the association in 2001.

The moderator then called for the first report, "How to Encourage Young Churches to Become Indigenous." Elder Eugene Brown read the report. After discussion by Elder Brown and Elder Kenneth Massey, the report was adopted.

### INDIGENOUS CHURCH PLANNING

First, we must explain what we mean by an indigenous church. definition would be "a missionary or a group of localized people who have a burden and desire to start a mission or church." These persons enter into a work with the objective that this mission will soon become an independent body organized into a church. After being organized into an independent body, three things should be taken into account. The body should be selfgoverning, self-supporting, and self-propagating. This should naturally be under the Lordship of Christ. Whether the church is a national (U. S. A.) or foreign mission, the church should reach toward providing its own financial support from its members. This is what we term an indigenous church. Out of loving concern, this church begets other churches. To take away any one of the three makes a church weak, and the church falls short of the New Testament pattern. The apostle Paul realized the need to plant new churches; this was his highest priority. Watering and cultivating are related to and are a necessary part of church planting. If the missionary or established church spends all their time propping up old work, then they may be missing their calling. Some missions have been carried on for several years without having a convert or becoming established as a church. After several years as a pastor, I began to seek out the patterns of the apostle Paul. especially in reference to establishing churches. To my amazement he never raised any money for the erecting of buildings. The only reference there is to Paul raising money is for the poor saints of Jerusalem. I am certainly not speaking against helping people in poor countries to build buildings, but to assume full financial responsibility to provide continual financial upkeep, and fully support the national pastors and not educating them biblically on how to be self supporting, we are falling short of what the bible teaches. An absolute dependence in the Holy Spirit is an indispensable essential in establishing indigenous churches. In doing God's work, His will can only be done with our full reliance upon God to provide for us. Any other way we are delegating our trust to people rather than trusting God to meet our needs.

The moderator then called for the second report, "The Importance of Spiritual Leadership in the Church." The report was read by Elder Deric McClard. After discussion by Elder McClard, Elder Kevin Perdue, Elder Kenneth Davis, Elder Johnny Carver, and Brother Steve Franklin, the report was adopted.

### THE IMPORTANCE OF SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP IN THE CHURCH

The Holy Spirit has been at work in this world since the beginning of time, and His influence has been felt in all places (Psalm 139: 7). Just as He "moved upon the face of the waters" when "God created the heaven and the earth" (Genesis 1: 1-2), He also worked in the lives of many of the heroes of the faith in the OT: Joseph (Genesis 41: 38), Moses (Numbers 11: 17), Joshua (Numbers 27: 18), Gideon (Judges 6: 34), Samson (Judges 13: 25), Saul (I Samuel 10: 10), David (I Samuel 16: 13), Elijah (I Kings 18: 12), Ezekiel (Ezekiel 3: 14), and Daniel (Daniel 4: 8). He empowered the OT prophets, moving them to proclaim God's Truth (II Peter 1: 21). Moreover, His contributions to our Savior's earthly ministry are incalculable, for He anointed Him (Matthew 3: 16), empowered Him (Luke 4: 14), and directed Him (Matthew 4: 1). May our hearts rejoice this afternoon as we acknowledge that this same Spirit is still at work among God's people today!

Our relationship with the Holy Spirit is complex. He is our companion (John 14: 16-17), comforter (John 14: 26), convicter (John 16: 8-11), conductor (John 16: 13), co-worker (Romans 8: 26), 'counselor (I Corinthians 2: 13), commender (II Corinthians 6: 4, 6), and confirmer (Ephesians 1: 13-14). Furthermore, we look to Him to discover God's will for our lives and to come to terms with the appropriate course of action in discharging our daily duties. The leadership that He provides is available to all of God's children: As Paul writes, "As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God" (Romans 8: 14), and "If ye be led of the Spirit, ye are not under the law" (Galatians 5: 18).

The gift of spiritual leadership is promised by our Savior. When He spoke about the coming of the Holy Spirit, He said, "When he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth" (John 16: 13). Because truth is not just that which should be known (John 8: 32), but also that which should be performed (John 3: 21), the promise of John 16: 13 is one that ensures

spiritual guidance for all of God's children. Examples of this special ministry abound in the NT. For example, the Holy Spirit led Jesus to the wilderness (Matthew 4:1) and Philip to the Eunuch (Acts 8: 29). He also brought together Peter and Cornelius (Acts 10: 19-20). He called Paul and Barnabas to the mission field, prompted the Church at Antioch to separate them for that work (Acts 13: 2), and directed the missionaries during their travels (Acts 16: 6-7).

While we may rely on the leadership of the Holy Spirit in all aspects of Christian service, it is important for us to note that the men of God who were led by the Spirit in the above examples were in positions to be so conducted. They were led after they submitted themselves to God's will and while they were engaged in God's work. Jesus was led to the wilderness after he was baptized by John (Matthew 3: 13-17). Philip was led to the eunuch after he obeyed the Lord's command to go to Gaza (Acts 8: 26-27). Peter was led by the Spirit while he meditated on the vision of the vessel (Acts 10: 10-19). The Church at Antioch was led while they "ministered to the Lord, and fasted" (Acts 13: 2). Paul and his companions were led while they traveled through Phrygia, Galatia, and Mysia (Acts 16: 6-7). Paul reminds us in Romans 12: 1-2 that we may "prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God," but only after we yield ourselves to His will and involve ourselves in His work.

It is not possible to over-emphasize the importance of spiritual leadership in the church. As the Psalmist observes, "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it" (Psalm 127: 1). May we always be sensitive to the leadership of the Holy Spirit; may our steps always be "ordered by the Lord" (Psalm 37: 23); and may we never either grieve the Spirit by admitting the corrupt things of this world into our lives (Ephesians 4: 30-31), or quench Him in disobedience (I Thessalonians 5:19). Let us remember the words of Abraham's servant. Commissioned by his master to find a wife for Isaac, he said, "I being in the way, the Lord led me" (Genesis 24: 27).

### SATURDAY MORNING

The association met together again on a rainy Saturday morning at 10 a.m. Brother Mike Patterson led the congregation in singing "I Know I'm Saved" and "It Is Well with My Soul" while Elder Deric McClard played the piano. After making some remarks about Song of Solomon 3: 1-4 and his grandfather's experience of salvation at Cornwell's Chapel MBC, the moderator read Psalm 121 for a devotion and spoke about the state of the association, the need for love, and the Bible's prescription for reconciliation between brothers. Elder Eugene Brown led the congregation in an altar prayer. The clerk called the roll of messengers.

### **RECOGNITION OF VISITORS**

The following brother was recognized and welcomed by the moderator:

Brother Donnie Hines led the congregation in singing "The Life Boat" while Elder Deric McClard played the piano. The moderator then presented Elder Johnny Carver, pastor of the McFerrin MBC, to preach the doctrinal sermon. After some introductory remarks, Brother Carver read Acts 2: 41-42 and announced his subject: "The Apostles' Doctrine." He spoke about the power of the early church, reminded us that we need God's power today, and identified Bible teaching as the foundation for that power. Brother Carver suggested that the apostles' doctrine consists of a powerful kingdom message with character instruction for all time. It is what the apostles preached from the Day of Pentecost forward. Its origin is Jesus Christ, and its focus is loving God and neighbors as oneself. Speaking about the contents of the doctrine, he reminded us of the emphasis on teaching in the Great Commission (Matthew 28: 19-20) and in John's writing (II John 9). He also identified the Sermon on the Mount as a suitable guide for the Christian life and cautioned the assembly about relying on God's power, rather than on secular education. He spoke about the relationship between the apostles' doctrine, grace, and suffering. He closed his message with remarks about self-examination and the reminder that our fellowship with one another depends on doctrinal agreement. While Brother Donnie Hines led the congregation in singing "I'll Fly Away" and "When the Roll Is Called up Yonder," the brothers and sisters met in the altar for a handshake and to express their appreciation for the good message.

The moderator then called for the report on obituaries. Elder W. R. Overton read Psalm 116: 1-8 and spoke of the brothers and sisters who have left us in the last year and of his belief that they had the same salvation that David had. The names of the deceased were read by the clerk. After discussion by Elder Bobby Sutton and Elder Gary Nicholas, a motion was passed to again include the report written by Brother Calvin Gregory for the 1929 Enon Association in the 2000 Wiseman minutes.

### OBITUARY REPORT

We learn with sadness and grief that 32 brethren and sisters who were with us a year ago have gone from the shores of time to eternity. It seems such a short time since they were with us here below, but now they have gone and they will come into our homes, our churches, our family circles, our lives and our very heart no more while we sojourn as strangers here below. They grew weary and tired and a merciful God who knows all our burdens took them away from this evil world to a place where they might find the rest denied to them in their earthly homes. They have climbed the last hill between time and eternity and their journey is ended. Life's fitful storms come to them no more and they slumber sweetly in their graves while their souls have gone to be with Jesus.

Many of these were leaders in our churches, loving the cause of God unselfishly and giving to God their humble labors as His faithful followers. Tis hard to give them up when it seems that we need the best so much. Their places around the fireside are vacant now, and the family circles have been rudely broken, and we look for them in the churches, but their places are empty now, for God's weary workmen have laid down the things of this life and the burden to us who still live is the greater.

Tis hard to give them up, but is best. It would not be right for us to want them to labor and toil and sorrow and grieve through countless years. But our loss is so heavy and our grief so unutterable, but God knows it all and His great loving heart is moved with a sense of our needs. We know He will help us, we know He will care for us, and we know He will at last carry us all home to a better and fairer land.

Let us not grow weary in well doing, but let us strive to take up the work laid down by our sainted dead and carry it on to a glorious finish. Let us try to walk in all good examples and at last may we hear the Lord say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, thou has been faithful over a few things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Elder Bobby Sutton moved to adjourn one hour for lunch. The motion carried, and Brother Ed Hardee prayed the benediction, asking for God's blessings upon the food.

### SATURDAY AFTERNOON

After another wonderful meal which was provided by the Longview MBC, the association reconvened while Brother Clyde Dilleha led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace." Elder Deric McClard played the piano. After leading the assembly in reciting Psalm 23, the moderator called on Elder Ron Lafferty to lead in prayer.

The moderator then called for the fourth report, "Financing the Lord's Work." The report was read by Elder Larry Gregory. After discussion by Brother Gregory, Brother Mike Stokes, Brother Kenneth Massey, and Brother Johnny Carver, the report was adopted.

### FINANCING THE LORD'S WORK

Jesus taught the following in Matthew 6: 1-3&4. "Take heed that ye do not your alms before men, to be seen of them: otherwise ye have no reward of your Father which is in heaven. Therefore when thou doest thine alms, do not sound a trumpet before thee, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have glory of men. Verily I say unto you, They have their reward. But when thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth: That thine alms may be in secret: and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly."

In Leviticus 27:32 we are taught the following: " And concerning the tithe of the herd, or of the flock, even whatsoever passeth under the rod, the tenth shall be holy unto the Lord."

Deuteronomy 14:29 tells us briefly what the tithe is to be used for:

"And the Levite, (because he hath no part nor inheritance with thee,) and the stranger, and the fatherless, and the widow, which are within thy gates, shall come, and shall eat and be satisfied; that the Lord thy God may bless thee in all the work of thine hand which thou doest."

In the New Testament, while titheing may not be the major thrust of the meaning of the first portion of Hebrews 7, the practice seems to be endorsed by the reference to Melchizedek "to whom also Abraham gave a tenth part of all;"

But Paul seems to have captured the essence of the matter as he lauded the giving of the poor Macedonians in his letter to the rich Corinthians (II Corinthians 8:5) "And this they did, not as we hoped, but first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God."
