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#### **ABSTRACT OF PRINCIPLES**

We, the Missionary Baptists of Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of the Churches in order to maintain the general union and communion among ourselves; and being convinced that there can be no communion without union, we think it our duty to set forth in a concise manner the grounds upon which we propose to maintain this union.

We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and that they are the only rule of faith

We believe in the doctrine of election, according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.

We believe in the doctrine of original sin and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature of his own free will and ability.

We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

We believe in the final preservation of the saints, that they will never finally fall away and be lost, and that good works are fruits of faith after justification.

We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Christ, and that they were given to the Church by Him; and that true believers are the only proper subjects for baptism, and that baptism is an immersion, and that orderly members of the Churches of Christ, only, have a right to the Lord's Supper.

We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except such as are regularly baptized and come under the hands of the Presbytery. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

#### **RULES OF DECORUM**

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer shall be chosen annually to serve the Association.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise and address the Moderator by the appellation of Brother Moderator, and shall while speaking, confine himself or herself to the subject under discussion and shall not be interrupted unless he or she digress from the subject; and shall in no wise reflect on any other speaker, so as to make remarks on his slips, failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state his views without sophistry or criticism.
- 4. No member shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Moderator.
- 5. No member shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body. The chairperson on each subject shall have an opening speech of ten minutes and two other speeches of five minutes each.
- 6. Each motion and second shall come under the immediate consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 7. No member shall address another by any appellation other than that of Brother or Sister.
- 8. On the first day, immediately upon permanent organization, it shall be the duty of the Clerk to read the Rules of Decorum. A roll call of messengers shall be made on the second day.
- 9. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.
- 10. Any member violating these rules, or at any time manifesting a spirit contrary to the Gospel, shall be reproved or such other course taken with him as the Moderator may think proper, either at his own option or any other member.

#### CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Body shall be known as the Wiseman Baptist Association.

Article II. These Associations shall be composed of members duly chosen by regular and orderly Missionary Baptist Churches within our bounds.

Article III. The letters from the Churches to the Association shall give the number of members of fellowship, received by experience and baptism, received by letter, received by statement, restored, excluded, and dead since last annual meeting.

Article IV. Each church shall be entitled to four messengers.

Article V. These Associations shall elect annually as officers, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose duties shall be to serve their brothers and sisters in their several capacities.

Article VI. These Associations shall never interfere with the independence of any church or claim any ecclesiastical power or rights of supervision over any of the Churches.

Article VII. It shall be the object of these Associations to promote the union of the faith of the Gospel with our educational and mission interests.

Article VIII. These Associations shall meet annually on Friday at 10 o'clock a.m., after the third Sunday in October, and continue two days, the meetings to be held at such places as may be agreed upon by the Association at its annual sitting.

Article IX. A majority of the members of any regular meeting shall constitute a quorum for transaction of business.

Article X. It is expected that these meetings shall be missionary in practice as well as theory.

Article XI. New churches may be admitted into this Association, who shall petition by letter and messengers, and on examination, if found orthodox and orderly, may be received and made known by the Moderator's giving the right hand of fellowship to the messenger's present.

Article XII. The Association may exclude from the union any Church or Churches that are heterodox in principal or disorderly in practice.

Article XIII. No proceedings shall be had against any Church except on charges preferred by a sister Church, which shall first have followed the direction of Matthew 18:15, in attempting to bring it to repentance.

Article XIV. The Association at its sittings, may welcome any visiting brethren present, who shall have liberty to join in the discussion of any report listed in the Order of Business, but shall have no vote in any action of the Association.

Article XV. Any alteration may be made to this Constitution at any regular meeting, by a majority vote of the members present.

Article XVI. All questions arising before this Association shall be decided by a majority vote, except in the reception of Churches in our fellowship, and that such reception be by a two-thirds vote

Article XVII. If any church fails to represent one or more years, and then desires to reenter the fellowship of this Association, there being, evidently, a reason for not representing, there must be a motion for their reentering the Association to be carried by a two-thirds vote. This action is to be taken after permanent organization and at the time to receive petitionary letters.

Article XVIII. No preacher shall preach before the Association two years in succession.

#### **ARTICLES OF FAITH**

#### 1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction;1 that it has God for its author, salvation for its end,2 and truth without any mixture of error for its matter;3 that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us;4 and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union,5 and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.6

We believe that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is JEHOVAH, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and earth;7 inexpressibly glorious in holiness,8 and worthy

of all possible honor, confidence, and love;9 that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost;10 equal in every divine perfection,11 and executing distinct and harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.12

#### III. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker;13 but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state;14 in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners,15 not by constraint, but choice;16 being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin,17 without defense or excuse.18

#### IV. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace,19 through the mediatorial offices of the Son of God;20 who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin;21 honored the divine law by his personal obedience,22 and by his death made a full atonement for our sins;23 that having risen from the death, he is now enthroned in heaven;24 and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all- sufficient Saviour.25

#### V. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great gospel blessing which Christ26 secures to such as believe in him is Justification;27 that

Justification includes the pardon of sin,28 and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness;29 that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the

Redeemer's blood;30 by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God;31 that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.32

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God;42 whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ,43 we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy;44 at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.45

We believe that Election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners;46 that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end;47 that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy, and unchangeable;48 that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of his free mercy;49 that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree;50 that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the gospel;51 that it is the foundation of Christian assurance;52 and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.53

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers,66 associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel;67 observing the ordinances of Christ;68 governed by his laws,69 and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his Word;70 that its only scriptural officers are Bishops, or Pastors, and Deacons,71 whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

### XIV. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian Baptism is the immersion in water of a believer,72 into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost;73 to show forth, in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effect in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life;74 that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper,75 in which the members of the Church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ;76 preceded always by solemn self-examination.77

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath;78 and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes,79 by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations;80 by the devout observance of all

the means of grace, both private81 and public;82 and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.83

#### FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

On this 21st day of October of 2022, we met at 10:00 AM for the One Hundred Thirty First Annual session of the Wiseman Baptist Association at Gladdice Missionary Baptist Church Pleasant Shade, Tn. Services began with Brother Morris Watson leading the congregation in singing "When We All Get To Heaven" and "He Set Me Free" accompanied by Sister Teresa Kemp on the piano.

Our temporary Moderator Elder Johnny Carver came to the podium and welcomed all in attendance. Bro. Carver asked each one to pray for Bro. Kenneth Massey whose wife had recently went to her heavenly home. Bro. Carver then read scripture from the 131<sup>st</sup> Psalm. Bro. Carver spoke of enjoying fellowship like there is at this meeting and loved to go to church and worship especially with the power of God present. Elder Jesse Miller, Gladdice Pastor was asked to come and offer his welcome. Bro. Miller welcomed all to Gladdice Church and stated he wanted everyone to go away from this Association meeting encouraged. He stated that it meant a lot to Gladdice Church to host the Association. Bro. Carver then called on Elder Charlie Patterson to take us to the Lord in prayer.

# **Introductory Sermon**

Psalm 122 was read for a scripture lesson and Bro. Raines took for a sermon topic "Welcome To The House Of The Lord". The question was asked, Who is glad to be here today? Bro. Raines stated that he knew Gladdice Church was glad to host this association. Bro. Raines said as a pastor trying to fulfill his duties he is glad to be

here. He stated he was glad that we all had a house of worship to go to and that it is good to stand inside the spiritual house of the Lord.

Bro. Raines said what you find at the house of the Lord is what makes it good. Five points was made that Bro. Raines wanted to welcome people to.

- 1. Welcome to, Preaching of The Word. The Apostle Paul expressed the importance of preaching the word in II Timothy 4:2. This is the word of truth and the gospel of salvation. Hebrews 4:12 was read in relation to what the preaching of the word is to our spiritual well-being. The word of God is living and we need it. We are talking about preaching in the house of the Lord. Watching preachers on TV, Facebook and others ways does not and cannot replace the joy of experiencing preaching in the Lord's house. The Psalmist said, "I was glad (or rejoiced) when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord".
- 2. Welcome to, Worship. Worshipping with God alone is good but nothing can replace what you get from coming together in the house of the Lord for worship. Jesus said IN John 4:204, "God is a spirit and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and truth." So, real worship requires the Holy Spirit and who among us doesn't like to feel the Holy Spirit. Knowing God in spirit will cause a response of real worship.
- 3. Welcome to, The Opportunity To Exercise Your Gift". I Corinthians 12:6-8 God equips us with gifts to serve God. Do you know what it does when we exercise our God given gift? It glorifies God. If your church needs more help let me encourage you to do as Luke 10:2 says. Pray for more help.
- 4. Welcome to, The Opportunity To Encourage Your Pastor. Notice the heart of a pastor in the Apostle Paul in Philippians 1:3-7. I can assure you that your pastor loves you. When you become a partner with your pastor in spreading the glorious gospel of Christ be assured that it encourages your pastor.
- 5. Welcome to, The Opportunity To Help Your Fellow Church Members. Galatians 6:2. Life can be hard. Sometime a phone call, a text, an invite to go out to eat is what helps lift up someone. Let me encourage you to be a help to someone every day.

Did you know that going to the house of the Lord is an appointment we need to keep. Hebrews 10:25 Attending the house of the Lord should be a priority. It is where we find spiritual strength and find blessings.

After Jesus had risen from the grave, we find that he met with the disciples behind closed doors. John 20:19-22 Here the disciples received the comfort of the Lord's words. When we come together it should be to receive comfort from the word of the Lord. Psalm 85:8 God speaks peace. The disciples received peace as Jesus said, "Peace be unto you."

In closing let's go back to where I began. Psalm 122 Let us always rejoice for being able to go into the house of the Lord.

Bro. Carver expressed his appreciation for the message and then asked for a song while the congregation comes around to offer their Christian handshake to Bro. Raines in appreciation for the message. Bro. Morris Watson came and led the congregation in singing "Victory In Jesus" accompanied on the piano by Sis. Teresa Kemp.

# **State of Religion**

Noah Webster's 1828 American Dictionary of the English Language says this about religion: Religion in its most comprehensive sense, includes a belief in the being and perfections of God, in the revelation of his will to man, in man's obligations to obey his commands, in a state of reward and punishment, and in man's accountableness to God; and also true godliness or piety of life, with the practice of all moral duties. It therefore comprehends theology, as a system of doctrines or principles, as well as practical piety; for the practice of moral duties without a belief in a divine lawgiver, and without reference to His will or commands, is not religion.

Webster proclaims that there are true religions and false religions. We will focus this report on what we believe to be true religion. In short, we believe the true church teaches that salvation comes from the experience of being born again. We believe this experience comes from the sinner hearing the gospel, of his confession to God of his sin of unbelief, of his repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. We believe true repentance and true saving faith are inseparable graces, the faith being a gift from God upon full repentance as measured by God alone. (For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: *it is* the gift of God: Ephesians 2:8) and (But without faith *it is* impossible to please *him*: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and *that* he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him. Hebrews 11:6)

"The State of Religion" has been a recurring topic since the first meeting of the Wiseman Association in 1892. There seems to have been a perennial assessment that that state has been on the decline over the period since our inception. "There is no doubt, the state of religion is declining" began the report in 1969 and seems to be the recurring theme over our history.

In examining the minutes of the Wiseman Baptist Association from the years 2017 through 2021, we find a common core of eight churches representing every year across the five year period. (Mount Juliet did not represent

after 2017 and West End did not represent before 2021.) This leaves the total membership of that common core increasing from 1,891 in 2017 to 1,931 in 2021, for a gain of 40 souls. We realize that we are discussing souls, not cattle. We also realize, however, that the Holy Spirit moved the penman of the book of Acts to record for our edification the number of those added to the church on the day of Pentecost.

Further examination of the minutes for that same time frame reveals that in two of those five years, the number of members lost to death was greater than the number baptized. Surely, every member of every one of our churches should be concerned about the picture this state reveals.

Lest we allow these statistics to confine us to a dour outlook, however, let us be reminded that every current member of every one of our churches has been saved in the period since 1892.

Rather than list a wide array of solutions to our situation, we will confine our recommendation to the one answer we believe to be prerequisite to all others. God's people must return to a passionate prayer life. Let us consider the following questions as individuals and as church members. How often are you moved to tears in your personal prayer life. How often does your church lift up a prayer with a measure of desperation to match the desperate plight of the lost people around us? Would the sight of the despair of God's people on behalf of sinners move the lost to seek Him?

May each of us as messengers share this recommendation with our respective churches and teach them by our own examples.

## **Christian Education**

I will open with a quote from the Wiseman Association Annual Session in 1958. Brother W.T. Russell served as the chairman for Christian and Ministerial Education. He stated this in his opening paragraph; "Today we are confronted with the greatest responsibility as churches, Sunday School Teachers, and Preachers that we have ever known. First, we ask, what is education? Webster says, "It is the process of training and developing the knowledge, skills, mind, character, etc." Now, when we restrict this to Christian and Ministerial Education, then we find it is a process of Christian training and Christian Ministerial training and development."

Let us ask a similar question today. What are the parameters that we use to measure educational success in our churches?

When Websters defined education, he stated that it is a process. Education is a process. As leaders in our churches, we must not get frustrated or discouraged at this process. Whoever is patient, has great understanding, but one who is quick-tempered displays folly.

Let us think of the "hot stovetop" example for a moment. Some children can look at the stovetop, know it is hot, and know not to touch it. Some children are unaware that the stovetop is hot, and once told, that child won't touch it. But they had to be told that it was hot. Then we come to the children that even after being warned, still get

burned. Education is a process. A process that is very different from child to child. As well as church member to church member.

All three children in the hot stovetop example have different processes of learning. Let's exam each of them on a very simplistic level.

The first child used his knowledge and deductive reasoning to conclude that the stovetop was hot and that they should not touch it. Inspire that child to continue to use that thought process.

The second child was unaware of the hot stovetop. Maybe they didn't know it was hot. Maybe they didn't know it could burn them. Maybe they didn't know how to read the warning light on the stove top. Regardless, they needed to be educated. And once educated, they knew better than to touch the stovetop.

The last child was going to be burnt regardless of warning. No matter the advice. The begging and pleading. The burn scars you can show to prove how hot the stovetop is. Nothing mattered. They were going to end up burnt. This group of children do not need to have a "told you so" type lecture or a lack of empathy shown to them after the burn. Grace is needed in the moment. But the parent and child must come to terms with self-destructive behavior patterns shown by the child. Then work on a process to eradicate that behavior so that they do not continue to burn themselves.

This same thought pattern can apply to our church members education process.

The first group of church members will do the right thing. They will be easy. They probably won't end up burnt. We need to encourage them in their strength. You know who these church members are. Thank them for who they are and what they do.

The second group is the large majority in my humble belief. They won't end up burnt, but they must be warned. We cannot stop giving them warnings. We cannot budge on teaching what is right and what is wrong. We cannot lessen our values. But we cannot believe that this group will have a level of Christian education beyond what we give them. If we do believe that, they will end up burnt. Not because they were reckless, but because they were ignorant. For this group of church members, we must understand that they do not know what they do not know. Work with this group to make sure that they are getting the correct level of practical biblical education. And if or when someone in this group ends up burnt, take time to pause and ask if **WE** failed to warn them of the hot stovetop.

We must show grace to the last group. The actuality of life is that, at some point, we have all been burnt ourselves. Even after knowing the stovetop was hot. We still touched it. We still sinned. And we still broke our relationship with God. We remember the shame. The embarrassment. The guilt. The pain. We also remember that in that moment, we didn't want or need to hear, "I told you so". Telling our church members, "I told you so" while engaged in a war with sin, is not helpful. Instead, we need to have real conversation with that individual about what will *really* help them.

Education is an ever-changing and always developing process. We must realize that if this process is bringing forth development of skill, mind, and character, then our members are being educated. Identify who needs to be encouraged, who needs to be educated, who needs grace.

When we restrict this, that is the definition of education, to Christian Education, then we find it is truly a process of Christian training and development.

Bro. Carver called for the report on Financing The Lord's Work. The report was read by Bro. Jesse Miller.

#### FINANCING THE LORD'S WORK

The topic of finances within the church has been discussed many times throughout our history and has been the theme for several reports delivered at the Wiseman Baptist Association over the years. Still, financing the Lord's work is an area where we may struggle to engage our congregations and where we may not know how to address the problems we see in our churches today. In this report, we will first attempt to define the activities that make up the Lord's work, and then we will expand upon the subjects of both giving funds to finance this work and the stewardship of funds that are or will be available.

First, it is important to mention the activities that fall within the bounds of the Lord's work and that require some type of funding to be effectively carried out. When examining different areas where our finances can be used, we may find that our churches do well in supporting some works while falling short in others. There is a very practical need for finances to support the upkeep of our church facilities, and when the Lord blesses our congregations with new members, there are times when expansion of our facilities is helpful to meet the needs of the growing body. Beyond a church's operating expenses, the Bible gives clear direction that a pastor or someone spreading the gospel "is worthy of his meat" (Matt 10:10) and "should live of the gospel" (1 Cor 9:14). Mission work is also a vital activity to extend the reach of the gospel past the walls of our church buildings and is endorsed through both direct commands and numerous examples in the Holy Scriptures.

In addition to the spiritual needs of proclaiming the gospel and edifying the church body, we also see clear direction that God's work includes meeting physical needs as well. In James 2:14-15, the author describes how unprofitable it is to approach a brother or sister that lacks necessities of life with hollow encouragement and not providing "those things which are needful to the body". The early church gives us a beautiful example in Acts 4:34-35 where members sold their possessions and gave the proceeds to the apostles so that "distribution was made unto every man according as he had need." The church was not able to sustain a communal society without some needs eventually being neglected, but the heart of the matter still applies today for our churches to address

the physical needs of its members. Outside of the church body, the Bible also directs followers of Christ to share in His compassion for the needs within our communities and the world. In particular, we are to help the poor as well as widows and orphans, representing the most vulnerable groups within that time.

Next, we will address the topic of giving financially to support this great work. We should bear in mind that giving can take place through tithes and offerings to the church as well as through personal contributions to missions, members in need, community events, and philanthropic organizations. One member may never know the full extent of another member's giving, especially if we follow the teaching of Jesus to give in secret and "let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth" (Matt 6:3). Even so, many within our churches are concerned that financial support for the Lord's work is severely lacking in the current era, demonstrating spiritual immaturity amongst God's people. We have a responsibility to teach and preach Biblical truths related to finances. Financial giving is clearly commanded, and God promises to reward our liberality with His own.

"Honour the Lord with thy substance, and with the firstfruits of all thine increase: So shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine." – Proverbs 3:9-10

"Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." – Malachi 3:10

"Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him" -1 Cor 16:2

Along with these commands, we recognize that the most crucial aspect of giving is about the heart of an individual toward God. Jesus tells us in his teaching that people's hearts will be found where they have laid up their treasures (Matt 6:21). The apostle Paul asked the people within the Corinthian church to give from a desire in the heart instead of grudgingly or based on a feeling of necessity, "for God loveth a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:7). Our goal is not to guilt and shame members into giving more or to convince them that they will gain excessive material wealth by offering more money to the church. Instead, we should desire that all followers of Christ experience the freedom and peace that comes from trusting God with our finances and glorifying Him in freely and joyfully giving to His work.

Finally, we need to consider the topic of stewardship with the funds provided for the Lord's work. God's Word consistently commends good stewards who wisely use the resources provided by their master. We should beware of large sums of money accumulating within our church accounts. As God works within hearts to produce the right attitude toward giving, we all as church members then have an obligation to ensure the church's money is effectively utilized for the Lord's work. There is certainly no shortage of worthy causes within our church bodies, communities, and mission fields. Considering the importance and the urgency of the work at hand, we would do well to identify specific causes where church funds can be applied as quickly as possible.

Beyond the usage of resources that have already been offered to our churches, we also have an opportunity to set a vision for our congregations of the work that could be financed as funds are available to support. We may sometimes be guilty of setting our expectations low and still being disappointed when evaluating the willingness of church members to give money. By giving a clear understanding of how funds would be used, communicating with conviction, and leading by example, we will hopefully see the Holy Spirit stirring the hearts of people to rise to the occasion and meet the need.

In First Chronicles 29:1-18, King David addressed the congregation of Israel to prepare for the temple that would be built by his son Solomon. Early in his speech, David set the vision that the work before the people was great, and the temple would be for God rather than man. He then led by example in explaining his own contributions for the temple and asking who among the people would be willing to join him. The people responded by offering willingly, and both David and the people rejoiced because "with perfect heart they offered willingly to the Lord" (1 Chr 29:9). David praised God for his greatness and proclaimed to God that "all things come of thee, and of thine own have we given thee" (1 Chr 29:14). David acknowledged that God tests the heart and has pleasure in uprightness. The outward offering of the people was a demonstration of their inward devotion. Finally, he asked that God would prepare the hearts of the people and his son Solomon so that they would both build the temple and keep His commandments. Our prayer is that this pattern will be repeated many times over again within our churches as we finance and carry out the Lord's work today.

#### **Missions**

The Great Commandment and the Great Commission

The Great Commandment\_ Matthew 22: 36-39: Master, which is the great commandment in the law? Jesus said unto him, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

**The Great Commission**\_Matthew 28:19-20: Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: . Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen.

All of us know the commission Jesus left with the church. We have at least an intellectual understanding of what this means. We need to go, spread the gospel, baptize the saved and then teach them to be grow spiritually and become sound in the faith. I remind us that the great commandment in the book of Matthew was given before the great commission.

My question for all of us is what is our heart for mission work? How much are we incorporating mission efforts into all the teaching and activities of our churches? If your church did that, you are to be commended. Thank you! If you have not, I would encourage you to still do so. But if we are honest, this may be one of the easier ways to help spread the gospel. When we take up a special offering or send a monthly check, we may feel good about what we are doing. When we send our offerings, are we praying that God will bless them and use them for the advancement of His cause? Are we able to get a vision of the people to whom we are sending these offerings? Are we compassionate when we hear the physical needs? Most of all are we concerned about the spiritual needs? Or is it just something we do because we are Missionary Baptists? Where is our love? Our missionaries, home and foreign need our support. Often our support is motivated by the love and respect we have for the missionary. We should love and respect them. They are doing a work that many would not do. The greatest way you can support them is to share a love for the people in their respective field. If we share that love, our offerings, visits, and any other support will most likely follow.

In this global world in which we live, we may be closer to people in another town, state or country than we are to our next-door neighbor. Our neighbor is <u>whoever</u>. Remember the parable of the Good Samaritan? Jesus died for <u>whosoever</u>. Remember John 3:16. Are we concerned about the souls of people in our families, at our employment, or on our street? When did we last invite someone to church? Do you think of this as mission work also? I think so.

Paul said in 1 Corinthians 13:3- And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profited me nothing. Without the love for God and for a lost world (here and there), our mission efforts will be in vain.

Bro. Carver asked for a song before the Doctrinal Sermon. Bro. Morris Watson came and led the congregation in singing Child Of The King assisted on the piano by Sis. Teresa Kemp.

Bro. Carver introduced Bro. Brian Johnson to preach the doctrinal sermon.

#### **Doctrinal Sermon**

Bro. Johnson began by thanking the members of the association for the privilege and confidence placed in him to deliver the doctrinal sermon and stated this was his second attempt at a doctrinal sermon before the association. Every sermon a preacher preaches should be based on sound doctrine.

The question was asked, What has been the darkest hour of your life? Bro. Johnson shared some of the darkest hours of his personal life then stated he wanted to share these moments today, because he hoped to connect with those present, in this message that you are never alone no matter what you are going through.

Bro. Johnson then proceeded with his message reading scripture from Hebrews 12:1,2 and took for a subject, "Faith In The Darkest Hour." We all have experienced some dark hours in our life. Today, I want us to walk with Jesus during one of the darkest hours of his life. Jesus is the author and finisher of our faith. He lived a perfect life of faith and obedience to His Father from his entrance into the world and to His Ascension. Over the last couple of years, I have been mediating on the 4<sup>th</sup> cry of the Jesus Christ from the cross. We are going to take a deep dive into his cry of dereliction. He stated at the ninth hour with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? that is to say, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matt 27:46). Jesus endured the cross, despising the shame, and is now set down at the right hand of God the Father. However, we need to understand what He meant in His cry.

Article 4 of the 1833 New Hampshire Confession was read. In this message we will discuss the glorious reality of Christ's faithfulness in his darkness hour, we will consider the following 1) The Lord Jesus Christ is the Author and Finisher of our Faith 2) Experiences the Darkness of Human Depravity 3) Experiences the Darkness of God's Judgment 4)Response

#### The Lord Jesus Christ is the Author and Perfector of our Faith (Hebrews 12:1-2)

We are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses.

We are surrounded by a large crowd of martyrs (faithful saints till death)- Those OT saints who were faithful until death. Some even gave of their lives. We have a lot of godly examples who have lived a life of faith during their time on earth.

Let us (Saved by faith, by grace, in Christ, to God's glory, as shown in God's Word alone) lay aside every weight- a hindrance, impediment, encumbrance.

Let us lay aside the sin which do so easily beset us. We all have weaknesses. Let us run with patience the race that is set before us. We have a responsibility to run\_well and finish well. We have a perfect example to follow. He ran a perfect race of faith.

Looking unto Jesus the author and perfector of our faith. Looking to Jesus - fixing your eyes upon,

The author of our faith- (Ac 3:15; Heb 2:10; 12:2)

The finisher of our faith

Who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross.

Jesus was motivated by the joy of having completed, accomplished, or finished the Father's will and experiencing the resurrection, ascension, and exaltation to the right hand of God the Father.

Jesus endured the cross-persevere, patiently endure suffering unto death (Phil 2:8)

Jesus despised the shame-despise, look down on, scorn, show contempt<sup>1</sup> He experienced being outcast from the holy fellowship with His Father which was the darkest night of his soul.

Jesus is set down at the right hand of the throne of God (Heb 12:2)- The God-man is enthroned on high and is our example of the life of faith.

## The Lord Jesus Christ Experiences the Darkness of Human Depravity

Life is easy when you are up on a mountain...

The Lord of Glory is mocked by the battalion of soldiers in the governor's headquarters (Matt 27:27)

How many people do you know who have said, "Someone made fun of me, so I am done?" I can't go any further. People's words hurt and can cut like a knife, but God's Word can heal.

The Lord of Glory was led to Golgotha, that is to say, a place of a skull (Matt 27:33).

The Lord of Glory was offered a drink (vinegar mixed with gall, myrrhed wine) (Matt 27:34)

When he tasted it, he would not drink it. He would not numb the pain of the cross. He needed to maintain a sound mind and practice self-control as he walk through the darkness.

How many people have become sidetracked by numbing the pain of their lives with sedatives? Now, I want to make sure you know I am thankful for medical doctors, but I am also aware of the misuse of medication both legal and illegal drugs.

The Lord of Glory's garments were distributed by the soldiers by rolling dice (Matt 27:35)

They crucified him. Jesus submitted to the Father's will-John 10:18

The Lord of Glory was crucified between two thieves (Matt 27:38).

The Lord of Glory was mocked by travelers (pilgrims) passing by the scene (Matt 27:39).

The Lord of Glory was mocked by the religious authorities passing by the scene (Matt 27:41).

The Lord of Glory was mocked by the thieves who were hanging to the right and left of him (Matt 27:44)

From 9am to noon, Jesus experienced the darkness of human depravity. He faced the injustice of the Jews and the Romans. He was mocked by the Roman battalion and hit over the head with a pretend sceptre made out of a reed.

How many people would have already given up in the race? I've had enough. Look at the darkness of this moment. He was ushered the place of the skull (a human skeleton) which symbolized death. He is the author of life, yet he enters a place of death. The soldiers gamble for his garments. He is crucified among two thieves. He is made fun of by the pilgrims passing by. He is rejected by the religious authorities. The Holy One of God is insulted and ridiculed by two thieves who have been condemned by the State.

#### The LORD Jesus Experiences the Darkness of God's Judgment (Matt 27:45-46)

The darkest moment of the night is right before the dawn.

The Lord of Glory experienced darkness over the all the land unto the ninth hour (12-3pm)

This was a time of great sorrow and mourning. God's wrath on sin and judgment for slaying the Son Amos 8:9 And it shall come to pass in that day, saith the Lord GOD, that I will cause the sun to go down at noon, and I will darken the earth in the clear day:

Jesus became a curse for us. He entered into the judgment sinners deserve- Gal 3:13 Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us: for it is written, Cursed is every one that hangs on a tree: The Lord of Glory cried out to God in His darkest hour (Matt 27:46)

#1 Jesus experienced extreme darkness.

#2 Jesus cried with a loud voice.

#3- Jesus, the Living Word turned to written Word for comfort and expression (Ps 22:1)

#4 Jesus said, Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? that is to say, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?

What was happening for Jesus to make such a cry?

Sacrificial love was being displayed by the Trinity- The three persons of the Godhead were giving, loving, and uniquely experiencing the price of redemption. He did not save himself, so that he could save you Jesus Christ was the proper substitute as the God-man: A proper substitute for sinners would have to be able to represent both God and man, and Jesus Christ is the only person who has been able to meet these requirements (1 Tim 2:5).

Jesus Christ tasted death for everyman

Jesus endured the full weight of the Father's divine wrath-

Jesus Christ quenched the flames of divine justice

Jesus Christ, alone, gets the glory for my great salvation

#5- Jesus Christ endured the cross. His heart poured out like water, melted like wax in the midst of his bowels- Ps 22:14

#6 Jesus Christ cried, "It is finished." Tetelestai- complete, finished, accomplished. He nailed it not in part but the whole

#7 Jesus Christ cried with a loud voice, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit" Luke 23:46, 27:

#### How Should We Respond?

We have laid the doctrinal foundation of Christ's perfect life of faith.

- 1. We must keep our eyes on Jesus in the Christian race.
  - a. If you are unsaved, you need to enter the Christian race. Jesus Christ is the only means of salvation in the world.

- 3. We must know that nothing can ever separate us from God's love.
- 4. We do not have to be afraid of the dark

Faithfulness in the darkest hour reveals our Christian character and brings great pleasure and glory to God. God the Father rejoiced in the completion of His Son's race, and He is pleased in the faithfulness of his saints.

Bro. Johnson closed with saying we need to have no fear because God will be near. Have faith in darkness.

Bro. Carver endorsed the message and ask for a song. Bro. Morris Watson came and led the congregation in singing I Must Tell Jesus assisted on the piano by Sis. Teresa Kemp.
